About the Full Diploma and IB Courses



Students may choose to apply to be in the Full IB Diploma Program or may choose one or more individual IB courses. With the former, students work to earn an IB Diploma, and with the latter, they work to earn a certificate for the course/s. Depending on where the student goes to college, s/he may receive college credit for certificates or the diploma. College credit, however, is only an additional benefit: the ultimate reason to take these courses is for students to work on further development of the traits of the IB Learner profile and to become internationally-minded, well-rounded and serious students, which serves to prepare them for college and beyond.

IB Courses:

- are TWO years long
- Are designated either Higher level or Standard level
- involve various kinds of assessments: written, oral, exams, papers, presentations, independent projects with minimal guidance
- have assessments that are evaluated internally (by the teacher) and/or externally (by examiners around the world)
- may lead to college credits (depends on level and college)

For the Full IB Diploma:

- Students take six IB classes, one from each of the six groups
- The six must be composed of 3-4 higher level and 2-3 Standard level courses
- Students also complete CORE requirements:
 - >CAS—150 hours in Creativity, Action, and Service
 - >Complete Independent Extended Essay of approx. 4,000 words, with limited supervision
 - >Theory of Knowledge Course

Students can expect to see a strong emphasis in classes on developing their traits as IB learners. From ibo.org: "The International Baccalaureate® (IB) learner profile describes a broad range of human capacities and responsibilities that go beyond academic success. They imply a commitment to help all members of the school community learn to respect themselves, others and the world around them."
