Board Briefs from School Board Meeting Dec. 14, 2020. Board Briefs are a communication tool designed to highlight important conversations and decisions made on behalf of students, families, staff, and the larger community by the District 70 School Board at each monthly School Board meeting.

Levy

Every year part of the normal financial process of any school district is the adoption of a property tax levy. John Herrin, director of finance and operations, presented information regarding the 2020 District 70 levy at the Nov. 23 board meeting. During the November meeting, the board requested the levy discussion be carried over to the Dec. 14 meeting.

During the Dec. 14 meeting, Mr. Herrin answered board questions about the levy, which was then unanimously approved. Mr. Herrin will now bring it to Lake County to formally file the required documents.

Policy

The administration and school board use a policy subscription service provided by the Illinois Association of School Boards as the basis for developing, reviewing, recommending, and approving policy language. This service is used by the majority of school districts in Illinois and is known as the Policy Reference Education Subscription Service (PRESS).

Superintendent's Report

Given that D70 schools are open for in-person instruction, we all need to continue to do our individual and collective part by being vigilant about:

- 3 W's:
 - Watching our social distancing;
 - Wearing a mask;
 - \bigcirc Washing our hands
- Being closely in tune with our health and the health of our loved ones who live in our household.
 - Completing the Daily Self-certification (staff and students).
- Staying home when ill.

During these challenging times, we need to model flexibility and grace. One way that D70 is doing this is through honoring families' right to choose between in-person and fully virtual learning. Since November 19, 2020, approximately 1% of our elementary families and 2% of our middle school families have changed their minds and have moved from in-person to a fully virtual experience for their child(ren).

- Elementary School enrollment was at 81% in-person and 19% Virtual
- HMS enrollment was at 69% in-person and 31% Virtual

Review of Calendar

- Winter break is approaching and will be from December 21, 2020 January 4, 2021;
- We will be taking a preventative pause and <u>all</u> students in D70 will engage in remote learning from January 5 January 15, 2021.
 - During the preventative pause, the hybrid schedule will be followed. The rationale behind following the hybrid schedule is to minimize further transitions and maintain consistency for our students and staff.
 - During the preventative pause, eSchool Centers and the Champions Early Learning Program at Butterfield Elementary School will continue to be open.
- There will be no school on January 18 (Martin Luther King Jr. Day) and January 19 will be a non-attendance day for students (Teacher Institute Day);
- We will return to in-person hybrid instruction at the elementary level on January 20 and on January 21 at HMS (Wednesdays are full remote days for HMS students).
