SCHOOL HISTORY

Vail Mountain School's roots are closely intertwined with the town of Vail and its namesake ski area. Originally called Vail Country Day school, VMS began serving an inaugural group of four students in 1962 using the home of Vail-founder Pete Seibert as the school's first classroom. Over the next decade, the school grew and moved, among other places, to the Vail Fire House, the Tivoli Lodge, and the Lionshead Gondola Building. In 1973, Vail Country Day was renamed Vail Mountain School, and the next year, the school moved to Minturn. The inaugural class of four students graduated in 1976. Three years later, the school built its first campus near the confluence of Booth and Gore Creeks in East Vail. A generation later, in 2005, construction was completed on VMS's current 92,000-square foot building — which now serves about 440 students.

When VMS was granted the land for our present campus, it came with the caveat that we preserve and maintain the homesteader cabin located on the property. Built by the Baldauf family in 1906, the cabin was moved and renovated twice but remains in its original form as a reminder of the pioneer spirit that built the town, the resort and the West. The image of the cabin is at the center of our school seal symbolizing the same pioneer spirit that built VMS, Vail's first school.

OUR TEACHERS

To achieve our Mission, faculty at VMS are singularly focused on one thing--your child. OUR CURRICULUM

VMS is the only independent K-12 school in Eagle and Summit Counties and, we embrace the freedom this provides. Our rigorous, globally inspired, college preparatory curriculum readies students for challenges both in and out of the classroom. The experience is enriched by athletics, independent projects, service learning, in-depth intraterm classes, winter hut trips, outdoor education, and Ski Fridays. We believe teachable moments are everywhere and we are bound neither by belief nor government mandate to teach in only one way. One size does not fit all, one size fits one.

OUR LOCATION

Our community works and plays together, sharing a love for the active mountain lifestyle that defines us and that has converted countless visitors into lifelong residents. Our location is truly unique, enabling us to provide an education that cannot be found anywhere else in the world. Outside our front door lies the world famous Vail ski resort. Just steps from our back door are trails that lead to majestic 13,000 foot peaks, mountain meadows filled with wildflowers, pristine waterfalls, and diverse ecosystems. Interstate 70 provides quick access to the learning opportunities of Denver and Boulder and the sublime desert playgrounds and rivers to the west.

OUR COMMUNITY

Matching the beauty and elegance of our natural setting, our school community is housed in a state-of-the-art facility with design inspired as much by our beliefs about how learning best occurs in a K-12 environment as by aesthetic considerations. Lower, middle, and upper school classrooms are mixed throughout with abundant open common spaces to encourage cross-age interaction and give students room to move.

Operating on the principle that emotional stability is a requisite for academic success, students start each day at VMS with Homebase, a unique advisory forum designed to build community, strengthen character, and encourage ethical decision making. In partnership with parents, teachers help students confront problems, and set positive, proactive examples, challenging students to be their best in the classroom, on the playing field, online, and outside the school. We pride ourselves on celebrating individual achievements and supporting each other's struggles. The result is a caring community of engaged learners that supports the greatness in one through the strength of many.

Few other schools are so supportive. Very few other schools offer the independence, small class size, invested faculty, and welcoming community found at VMS.

HOMEBASE PROGRAM

Every child participates in the Homebase program, which is a defining element of a VMS education. Homebase is a daily meeting between students and an advising teacher which serves as a time to reflect, plan, prioritize and support each other in a family environment. In addition, the Homebase class provides a venue for "dinner table conversations" which teach ethics and build character through discussions of real-life challenges. As a social, emotional and physical hub to daily life, the term Homebase is used interchangeably to refer to the actual meetings, a group of students within a grade, and the physical space that they call their own. In addition, Homebase advisors are advocates for their students and are concerned Middle school: 114 with all aspects of those students' lives, facilitating communication between students, teachers, coaches, and parents, ensuring a true learning partnership.

PREPARATION FOR COLLEGE & LIFE

Visitors to our school remark that our students are happy, comfortable in their own skin, and look you in the eye. These simple yet timeless virtues are the result of combining rigorous academics with arts, athletics, community service, 21st Century technological literacy, outdoor education, and a unique daily Homebase advisory forum to promote inquiry, knowledge, character, leadership, and citizenship. It's a lot, but so are the challenges of the future. As true preparation for Parents of current and alumni college and life, it is our firm belief that teaching a child how to use information responsibly is just as important as learning the information itself.

The result of this program are young men and women of the utmost social and emotional development -- mature, confident, respectful, grounded, and upstanding, who are comfortable speaking in public, at ease in leadership positions, and happy working independently. Involved in their communities, VMS students display integrity and awareness, and become ready not just to succeed in the world, but poised to actively and positively contribute to it.

Since the first graduating class, every single VMS senior has been accepted to a four-year college or university. They've matriculated at nearly 200 different colleges and universities across the country. Most importantly, VMS has taken great care to ensure that they've gone to colleges that don't just sound good, but that are a great fit for that individual student. That, too, is a hallmark of VMS.

CROSS-AGE EXPERIENCE

Our building, our program, and our traditions are all designed to develop organic relationships between students of all ages. Crossage learning opportunities are abundant through both planned activities, such as All-School Ski Day or Field Day, and though spontaneous and natural interactions within our shared space. We know that a kindergartener can teach a senior just as much as a senior can teach a kindergartener. Not many schools can say that their high school sophomores have a peer group that includes third graders, seventh graders, and their math teacher. Students learn together, play sports together, work in classrooms next to each other, and interact throughout the day. These cross-age experiences help to make VMS not just a school, but a community.



SERVICE LEARNING

Service to others is at the core of the VMS mission and one of the most important lessons we teach. Service is woven throughout our curriculum, with projects ranging from a second grade reada-thon that raised money for a school in Uganda, to volunteering with local non-profits such as Habitat for Humanity. Other longstanding service traditions include serving at a Denver soup kitchen feeding the homeless. As a centerpiece to service learning at VMS, each year, our community honors Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. by spending the holiday learning about his work and working in service to others. This work stays with our students long after they leave VMS, and we are proud to say that our Alumni not only do well, but also do good.



OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Lessons taught in the classroom are complemented by learning in the field and by the knowledge gained about oneself while exploring the outdoors. With our location in the middle of one of the most incredible places on Earth, students have a unique opportunity to witness geology, biology, and snow science firsthand. Equally, if not more important, field trips, orientation trips, winter hut trips, and Ski Fridays provide a structured and safe environment for students to take risks, face and overcome challenges, and build confidence and leadership skills that will serve them their whole life. From canoes and cliff faces, they see the world — the real world — and learn to operate confidently and comfortably in it. Experiences like this also build strong bonds among teachers and students, which serve as the foundation for our rapport-based learning community. This is why, for decades, each school year begins with orientation trips for middle and upper school students.









FLEXIBLE PROGRAMMING

Many VMS students pursue interests outside of school that demand significant commitments of both time and energy. VMS faculty willingly work with students, parents and coaches to ensure that ski racers, athletes, musicians, and artists can compete, train, and perform without compromising academics. These students are expected to be scholars as well as athletes or artists, and we are committed to supporting the highest level of achievement as both. Students and parents keep up with schoolwork and grades via an online course-management system, and by working with two full-time support staff, one of whom is a former ski racer.

As a formal academic partner of of Ski and Snowboard Club Vail (SSCV), VMS is staffed, prepared, and accustomed to ensuring the academic success of snowsport athletes, and to helping their parents with the logistics of competing while keeping abreast of schoolwork. VMS's dedicated liaisons can assist with communication as much as with tutoring, and help students compete or perform internationally, stay on top of academic demands, and make friends at the same time. Few schools offer this level of attentive, proactive support.

TUITION

VMS tuition is competitive with elite independent schools throughout the country that provide a top-notch college preparatory education. Tuition includes daily dining experience, books, most trips within the state of Colorado, and most other fees.

LS PHILOSOPHY

ELITE SNOWSPORT TRAINING

SKI & SNOWBOARD CLUB VAIL PARTNERSHIP

VMS is a proud academic partner of Ski and Snowboard Club Vail (SSCV), which is recognized as one of the best snowsport training programs in the world with offerings in Alpine, Freeski, Freestyle, Nordic and Snowboard. SSCV was represented at the 2014 and 2018 Winter Olympics by currrent or alumni athletes and has been the catalyst for many recruited D1 College Athletes and US ski team members. Our relationship means that a student at VMS can train at an elite level and receive a rigorous college-preparatory education without compromising either. As members of the VMS community, it also means that these athletes will have social, enrichment, and athletic opportunities beyond the mountain.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

During the ski season, SSCV athletes work with full-time tutors, who track their progress and challenges. The tutors help students manage workload, time commitments, and stress. When needed, the tutor acts as a liaison between the student and teachers to help plan their schedule and manage any upcoming assessments. VMS may accommodate students who are competing in Europe or across the state by scheduling exams around travel, providing afternoon tutoring, or allowing students to submit work online.

FLEXIBLE FACULTY MEMBERS


Our faculty understands the schedules and lives of our scholar-athletes. VMS enthusiastically welcomes these individuals, and helps them keep up in class even while competing. Teachers utilize a number of strategies including recording their lessons, posting notes online, Skyping students who are traveling, accepting online submissions of projects and tests, and meeting one-on-one after school.

SUMMER PROGRAMS


Both the middle and upper schools offer classes over the summer that allow students to lighten their third quarter class load. By taking advantage of summer school, students have been allowed to complete 1-2 classes in advance of their travel-intensive competition season.

DAILY SCHEDULE & LOGISTICS

Full-time SSCV athletes train Tuesday-Friday mornings on Vail Mountain, which is five minutes away. In addition, during Ski Fridays, SSCV athletes have the opportunity to dedicate the whole day to training or race preparation. After morning training, VMS provides transportation from the mountain to the school where students attend 4th-7th periods and then work with dedicated tutors after school. The tutoring staff is also available throughout the day to work with students during free and study hall periods.
