A Special Meet and Greet



In recognition of Black History Month, Anaise, a student at **East Middle School** was assigned a Wax Museum project. She researched and became the live version of a pioneer of her choice. Anaise chose boxer Claressa Shields for her project.

Claressa Shields is a two-time Olympic Gold Medalist boxer. Winning her first Olympic Gold Medal at the age of 17. Claressa is the most accomplished amateur boxer in U.S. history – male or female. Shields's boxing gloves are enshrined at the International Boxing Hall of Fame. A trailblazer for women in the sport, she headlined the first women's boxing main event for premium

television in just her second professional fight. Growing up in poverty in Flint, Michigan, Claressa represents a beacon of hope for a working-class city that has struggled with violence and everyday essentials. As a vocal advocate for social causes, including the ongoing water crisis in Flint, women's rights, and campaigning against sexual assault, Shields was given the Key to the City in 2012. Among her many awards and accolades include *Sportswoman of the Year (2016)* by *Women's Sports Foundation*, founded by Billie Jean King. She was recently named to the Board of Directors of the GENYOUth organization.

After hearing about the project, Anaise, her teacher Jeanine Rotolo, and her mother, Ana were invited to the Shields vs Hammer press conference in New York City. Special thanks to GENYOUth, Claressa Shields, and her manager Mark for this amazing opportunity.

May is BETTER HEARING & SPEECH MONTH!



Speech and Language Disorders Are Experienced by Many Children—But Are Treatable

BUFSD parents are encouraged to learn the warning signs and seek help early during "May Is Better Hearing & Speech Month."

With speech and language disorders ranking among the most common disabilities in children, parents and caregivers are encouraged to learn the signs—and seek an evaluation—if they have concerns about their child's ability to communicate. **Brentwood Union Free School District** *speech-language pathologists* offers timely guidance for families because May is recognized nationally as Better Hearing & Speech Month.

Good communication skills are critical, helping with behavior, learning, reading, social skills, and friendships. It is much easier, more effective, and less costly to treat speech and language disorders early— and May is a great time to educate parents on this important point."

Speech and language disorders are evaluated and treated by speech-language pathologists. *Speech* is the ability to produce speech sounds using the mouth, lips, and tongue. A child may say sounds the wrong way, repeat sounds and words, or be otherwise difficult to understand. *Language* is the ability to use and put words together—and to understand others' words. A child may have trouble understanding questions, following directions, or naming objects. Early speech and language treatment sets a child up for future school and social success.

Although treatment ideally begins early—in the toddler years—it is never too late to get treatment. The large majority of parents report significant improvement after treatment.
