CO-CURRICULAR MANUAL FOR STUDENTS

INTRODUCTION

Becoming involved in at least one co-curricular activity at Notre Dame High School greatly enhances a teacher's and/or a student's school experience. Every activity has its own requirements as well as a social and service component. Each activity affords an opportunity for participants to become acquainted with those who have similar interests. All are welcome to participate. "Organizations which are exclusive except those where membership is determined by academic performance are prohibited. Organizations contrary to the Mission of Notre Dame High School are prohibited." (Student Handbook)

A NOTRE DAME HIGH SCHOOL SPONSORED ACTIVITY CAN:

- a. give students practice in a democratic self-government
- b. extend and reinforce the instructional program
- c. honor outstanding student achievement
- d. provide opportunities for community service
- e. build student morale and positive participation in the school community
- f. offer relevant and authentic learning experiences
- g. promote the wise use of leisure time, including Activity Period
- h. provide a venue for the constructive use of unique talents and skills
- i. promote the development of new recreational interests and skills

CRITERIA FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF CLUBS:

Clubs may be established to allow students with similar interests and ideas the opportunity to become involved in those pursuits which fall within the scope of educational, service or spirit activities.

Students may be permitted to organize clubs within the following criteria:

- a. Students may organize co-curricular clubs provided that the club formation and activities are student-initiated and voluntary.
- b. Membership in a student-organized co-curricular club is open to all students.
- c. A student organized co-curricular club shall have a school moderator who ensures that school policies are observed.
- d. Non-school persons (i.e., persons who are not students) shall not direct, control, conduct, or regularly attend the meetings or activities of student-organized co- curricular clubs.
- e. The activities of a student-organized co-curricular club shall take place only during non-instructional time.
- f. Student-organized co-curricular clubs are contrary to the following:
 - interfere with the orderly conduct of the educational purpose and activities of the school; promote, encourage, or sanction activities that are unlawful; contrary to Catholic Christian teachings.
 - The school's Assistant Principal retains the right to prohibit activities and meetings and to disband clubs.
- g. Student-organized co-curricular clubs must have a club purpose statement which is approved by the Assistant Principal prior to initiation of club activities.
- h. Meetings or activities sponsored by a club may not be held on a Sunday, without the permission of the Principal.

INITIATING A PROPOSAL

Proposals for new clubs should represent the interest of a group of students. School administration will provide a standard format, requirements, and advice on production of the purpose statement. No club can operate without first completing the Club Registration to initiate the approval process. The following are the steps that must be taken to propose a new club:

- a. Student must draft, in writing, a proposal to the Assistant Principal for Student Life or the Assistant Administrator for Student Life.
- b. The proposal must include:
 - 1. The name of the club
 - 2. Suggested moderator
 - 3. The purpose of the club
 - 4. The goals for the club
 - 5. Proposed activities
 - 6. Meeting Dates, times and location
 - 7. Identified service project **
 - 8. Minimum of 12 members

**Choose a project that best matches your club and the ND school community. If needed, see the service coordinator for suggestions.

If approved, the club will function as a provisional club for one year, in order to assess viability.

CLUB OFFICERS***

The club officers are critical to the success of the club. Their time and dedication can help insure that a club will remain viable, will be fun and productive.

Club President

The president is the leader of the club. The club is usually only as effective as the president, who must be committed to the goals and purposes of the organization. The club moderator will work with those students expressing desire in leadership. Each individual moderator will determine the criteria with which to fill leadership positions, i.e. appointed, elected within the membership. Duties:

- Prepare an agenda with other club officers
- Meet with club advisor to review agenda
- Ensure all club members are notified about the time and location of the meeting
- Conduct the meeting

Club Vice-President

The vice president assists the president in carrying out his/her duties. In the absence of the president, the vice-president presides at club meetings and carries out all additional responsibilities normally done by the president.

Club Secretary

The secretary must take accurate notes at all meetings and prepare minutes. The secretary assists the president in keeping permanent records for the club and copies of all minutes and committee reports.

Club Treasurer

The club treasurer is responsible for maintaining accurate financial records for all expenditures. The treasurer reports all money spent and collected and of the account balance. ***Where applicable

ACTIVITY FUNDING

Student Clubs and Organizations may:

- request monies from the operational budget to support activities
- ask the Student Government for funds to support a charitable outreach

BEST PRACTICES

For healthy and balanced participation in co-curricular activities, students should be able to meet the responsibilities and requirements of the activity, while prioritizing and satisfying the responsibilities of his/her scholastic requirements.

Student Conflicts with Meetings/Practices: Students are encouraged to participate in a variety of activities. They should be able to investigate their varied interests and talents. Therefore, when a student has two meetings/practices scheduled for the same time, it will be understood that they will leave one early and arrive at another late. Moderators and coaches will support and guide students in making these decisions. Students should not over commit themselves, but they should be permitted a variety of co- curricular experiences.

Juniors and Seniors will hold only one major leadership position. They may also be involved in other clubs, a sport or a theatrical performance.

Freshmen and Sophomores are encouraged to participate in two co-curricular activities in addition to a sport or a theatrical performance.

CLUB SHIRTS

Clubs may design their own club "uniform" shirt. The shirt must include the approved Notre Dame Logo. Upon approval, of the club design, by the moderator and the Assistant Principal for Student Life, club representatives may contact the School Store for pricing and ordering.

Club shirts may be worn 2 times per month and only on meeting days. Performing Arts Production shirts may only be worn on the opening night of the performance.

INACTIVE CLUBS

An inactive club is one that shows no evidence of activity for one semester. Clubs may become inactive periodically due to lack of student interest or moderator leadership. These clubs are not in suspension and thus may resume active status when there is student interest and/or a moderator appointed. Stipends will be adjusted accordingly.
