Our in-person session will offer all the traditional activities (social distance style) such as time to reconnect with old friends and make new ones, camp games, songs, arts & crafts, campfire, and a closing campfire ceremony

Day 1 — June 21st

Let's start the Camp Zoom sessions off with a peek into the past, and what it was like to be a child during the 1800 time frame. We will explore some games kids played and what a normal day was like for children. We will also explore what jobs animals do for us, especially how animals helped families during the 1800's when there was much less mechanization.

Day 2 — June 22nd

"What!? There's no fast food?" That's right, the 1800's didn't have fast food options. During this workshop campers will learn about animal production and their uses during the 19th century. Campers will also learn about animal by-products as well as participate in a leather crafting activity.

Day 3—June 23rd

Back in the early 1800's settlers did not have refrigerators/freezers, or large commercial grocery stores to shop at. So how did early settlers manage? They learned how to preserve their own foods. In this workshop we will use a "modern" way of preserving.... freezing. We will be teaching you how to make your own homemade freezer strawberry jam!

Day 4 — June 24th

In this workshop you will learn about the common plants and animals that call Pennsylvania home. You will learn to sight identify common plants based on their leaves, blooms, and location; recognize animals by their characteristics, tracks, and scat; and what State Symbol status some have been appointed.

Day 5 — June 25th

Join us to explore the history of bees, beekeeping, and honey. Learn about the importance of honey bees, the uses of honey, and how the wax bees produce, was utilized to make candles. Join in on the historic journey by making your own beeswax candle with the supplies provided in your kits.

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
