Step 1: Pre-Write

- A prewrite is just for brainstorming and coming up with ideas.
- You do NOT need to write in complete sentences.
- Just put words and phrases down under each question.
- Remember, you are writing a book report to a person who has never read the book but might want to. Give all the important information but don't give away too much.
- Share this document with your teacher once you are completely finished brainstorming. (Print a copy)

Step 2: Rough Draft

- A Rough Draft is your first attempt at writing your ideas into complete sentences.
- <u>Hint:</u> Use the question as part of your answer.

 (Ex: Where did the story take place? The majority of this storybook place at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.)
- Try to just get your ideas into complete sentences, do not worry about spelling and grammar too much here.
- Share this document with your teacher once you are completely finished turning your brainstorming ideas into sentences. (Print a copy)

Step 3: Final Draft

- This is your Final Draft. Now you need to really look at your work and make sure all of your spelling, grammar and punctuation are correct.
- Ready for the best part? Just delete the questions, and only the questions, and your book report will magically turn into a 3 paragraph book report.
- Make sure to indent at the beginning of each paragraph by clicking the "tab" button.
- Read your work through once or twice when you think it is complete, or have Read and Write read it to you and listen to it. Make any changes you think you might need.
- Share this document with your teacher once you are completely finished. (Print a copy)
