Summer Reading Suggestions 2021 Entering Grade 5

Sharing Books with Older Students

Here is a selection of books for you and your family to enjoy over the summer months and a few simple tips to help parents and caregivers nurture a child's love of reading. Many of these titles can be found at your local public library (www.nypl.org) and our school's Sora eBook collection. Students should try to read every day and are asked to read at least five books of their own choice during the summer months. Your teacher will provide one or two of these five books, depending on your grade. You may also want to refer to this list throughout the year when borrowing books from Sora, the school's online eBook collection, as well as the school library.

Make it a family value. Children are expert observers. Whether you prefer to read books, blogs, manuals or magazines, let your child see you enjoy reading.

Make reading a social activity. Talk with your child about what she or he is reading or what you have read together. Start a parent-child book club or attend a book signing at your local bookstore. Which is better: the book or the movie? Sometimes children will be motivated to read a book because they liked the movie. Why not listen together to Roald Dahl's *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, see the movie, and at the conclusion of the audiobook, celebrate by whipping up a dish from Dahl's *Revolting Recipes* cookbook?

Use the books as conversation starters and allow books to lead to other learning. Reading aloud is a wonderful way to bridge discussions on topics that you may not know how to bring up. As children get older, you can choose material that leads into conversations about relationships, choices, current events, religion, and other relevant subjects.

Use audiobooks. Listening to audiobooks benefits all readers! They are an easy way to introduce children to books above their reading level and model good interpretive reading and critical listening skills. Audiobooks can also provide a bridge to important topics of discussion for parents and children who can listen together while commuting to sporting events, music lessons, or other destinations.

Make it part of your summer routine. Try to encourage your child to read 20-30 minutes a day. You can make reading a part of your child's evening routine, or perhaps a morning activity of "breakfast and books" works better for your family. The goal is to encourage your child to pick up the habit of reading.

Animals: Fiction and Nonfiction

*Carson, Mary Kay. Animal Watching: The Definitive Interactive Nature Guide.

Part of the Outdoor School series, this book presents the animal world of North America and sure to encourage readers to go outside and get to know their animal neighbors.

Relly, Lynne. Song For A Whale.

Iris, who is deaf, decides to invent a way to "sing" to a whale that is unable to speak to other whales. There's just one problem: he's three thousand miles away. How will she play her song for him?

*Parry, Rosanne. A Whale of the Wild.

Vega is learning to be a salmon finder, preparing for the day when she will be her family's matriarch. But then she and her brother Deneb are separated from their pod when a devastating earthquake and tsunami render the seascape unrecognizable. Vega must use every skill she has to lead her brother back to their family.

Illustrated by Lisbeth Zwerger (Mineedition Minibooks) A handsome, compact edition of this classic tale, graced with lively illustrations by a legendary illustrator. By falling down a rabbit hole and stepping through a mirror, Alice experiences unusual adventures with a variety of nonsensical characters.
- Green, Richard Lancelyn. The Adventures of Robin Hood. (Puffin Classics Series) Robin Hood, champion of the poor and oppressed, stands against the cruel power of Prince John and the brutal Sheriff of Nottingham. Taking refuge in the vast Sherwood Forest with his band of men, he remains determined to outwit his enemies.

Desbit, E. Five Children and It. (Puffin Classics Series)

When Cyril, Anthea, Robert, Jane, and their baby brother go digging in the gravel pit, the last thing they expect to find is a Psammead—an ancient sand-fairy! Having a sand-fairy for a pet means having one wish granted each day. But the children don't realize all the trouble wishes can cause.

Dolkien, J. R. R. The Hobbit or There and Back Again.

Bilbo Baggins, a respectable, well-to-do hobbit, lives comfortably in his hobbit-hole until the day the wandering wizard Gandalf chooses him to take part in an adventure from which he may never return.

Fantasy, Science Fiction, Spooky, and the Supernatural

*Alston, B.B. Amari and the Night Brothers.

Thirteen-year-old Amari, a Black girl from the inner city, gets an invitation from her missing brother to join the Bureau of Supernatural Affairs and join in the fight against an evil magician.

*Andrews, Christiane M. Spindlefish and Stars.

After her father fails to come home, Clo embarks on a journey to find him, searching a strange island with enchanted tapestries that hold clues to her clouded past and her father's whereabouts.

★Cuevas, Adrianna. The Total Eclipse of Nestor Lopez.

A Cuban-American boy must use his ability to communicate with animals to save the inhabitants of his town when they are threatened by a witch who transforms into animals.



*James, Anna. Pages & Co.: The Lost Fairy Tales.

When 11-year-old Tilly Pages joins Oskar and his family on a Christmas trip to Paris, she and her friend book wander into the land of fairy tales, where someone—or something—is causing chaos.

★★�Keller, Tae. When You Trap a Tiger.

In a wondrous, magic-realist world rooted in Korean folklore, a tiger appears to Lily and offers her a deal that might allow her to save her beloved but very sick grandmother.

★Layne, Aliza. Beetle & the Hollowbones.

Twelve-year-old goblin and witch-in-training Beetle enlists her former best friend, Kat Hollowbones, to help stop Kat's sorceress aunt from demolishing the mall where Beetle's friend Blob Ghost is trapped. (Graphic Novel)

*Lukoff, Kyle. Too Bright to See.

While grieving the loss of a beloved uncle, 11-year-old Bug is haunted by an unfamiliar spirit and spends a summer trying to understand what it's trying to say.

*Simon, Raphael. *The Anti-Book*.

Mickey finds a book that promises to erase whatever is written in it, and after filling the page with all the things and people he dislikes, he finds himself in the anti-world where everything familiar is gone

*Cynthia Leitich Smith. Sisters of the Neversea.

In this beautifully reimagined story, Lily who presents as Native American and English Wendy embark on a high-flying journey of magic, adventure, and courage to a fairy-tale island known as Neverland.

★Soontornvat, Christina. A Wish in the Dark.

This Thai-inspired twist on Hugo's *Les Misérables* follows Pong, who escapes prison hoping to find a fairer world, and Nok, who pursues Pong through a world that makes Nok question every truth she holds dear.


*Zurcher, Andrew. Twelve Nights.

After crash-landing in an alternate world where her father and little sister are imprisoned, Kay has 12 days to rescue her family from Ghast, the land's tyrannical ruler.

Historical Fiction

Levine, Gail Carson. A Ceiling Made of Eggshells.

Paloma travels across fifteenth-century Spain with her influential Jewish grandfather and is required to make personal sacrifices as they struggle to keep Spanish Jews safe from widespread persecution.



★LeZotte, Ann Clare. Show Me a Sign.

It is 1805, and Mary Lambert has always felt safe among the deaf community of Chilmark on Martha's Vineyard, however, recent events have shattered her life; her brother George has died, land disputes between English settlers and the Wampanoag people are becoming increasingly bitter, and a "scientist" determined to discover the origins of the islands' widespread deafness has decided she makes the perfect "live specimen"—and kidnapped her.

♦ \$ Lee, Julie. Brother's Keeper.

Twelve-year-old Sora and her eight-year-old brother, Youngsoo, must try to escape North Korea's oppressive Communist regime on their own in 1950. Includes historical notes, photographs of the author's mother, glossary of Korean words, and timeline.

★Park, Linda Sue. *Prairie Lotus.*

In Dakota Territory in the 1880s, bicultural Hanna (her mother is Chinese-Korean and her father is white) face racism and resistance to change as they try to make a home for themselves.

*Pinkney, Andrea Davis. Loretta Little Looks Back: Three Voices Go Tell It.

Loretta, Roly, and Aggie B. Little relate their Mississippi family's struggles and triumphs from 1927 to 1968 while struggling as sharecroppers, living under Jim Crow, and fighting for Civil Rights.

*Royce, Eden. Root Magic.

In the summer of 1963, Gran dies, leaving 11-year-old Jezebel and her twin brother, Jay, to learn the family's trade—working roots, a Gullah Geechee practice of healing, protecting, and conjuring magic.

Humor

Angleberger, Tom. The Strange Case of Origami Yoda.

Tommy and his friends describe their interactions with a paper finger puppet of Yoda, worn by their eccentric classmate Dwight, as they try to figure out whether or not the puppet can really predict the future. Includes instructions for making Origami Yoda.

Calabrese, Keith. Connect the Dots.

Liar & Spy meets *The Parker Inheritance* in this whimsically complex story about human connection and the power we all have to determine our own fate.

*Harrell, Rob. Wink.

The humorous journey of Ross, a cancer stricken middle schooler, as he navigates the preteen years.

Lai, Remy. Fly on the Wall.

Twelve-year-old Henry Khoo wants his overprotective family to stop treating him like a baby, so he hatches a scheme to prove his maturity and independence. It goes hilariously wrong!

Patterson, James. Middle School: The Worst Years of My Life!

When Rafe Khatchadorian enters middle school, he teams up with his best friend, "Leo the Silent," to create a game to make school more fun by trying to break every rule in the school's code of conduct.

Russell, Rachel Renée. Dork Diaries.


Nikki Maxwell writes in her diary of her struggle to be popular at her exclusive new private school, then of finding her place after she gives up on being part of the elite group.

*Swanson, Matthew. Ben Yokoyama and the Cookie of Endless Waiting.

A fortune cookie convinces Ben he can have whatever he wants if he is willing to wait, but getting paired with eccentric former friend Walter for a school scavenger hunt leads to unexpected rewards.

Tashjian, Janet. My Life as a Book.

Dubbed a "reluctant reader" by his teacher, 12-year-old Derek spends summer vacation learning important lessons even though he does not complete his summer reading list.



*Walliams, David. Code Name Bananas.

1940. Britain is at war with Germany. As bombs rain down on the city, Eric forms an extraordinary friendship with a remarkable gorilla: Gertrude. Eric spends his days at the place that makes him most happy: London Zoo. But when the zoo is no longer safe Eric must go on an epic adventure to rescue Gertrude.

Mystery and Adventure

*Bunce, Elizabeth C. How to Get Away with Myrtle: A Myrtle Hardcastle Mystery.

When someone commits robbery and murder aboard the luxurious train on which Myrtle Hardcastle, her Aunt Helena, her governess Miss Judson, and cat Peony are traveling, Myrtle is determined to find the culprit.

*Haddix, Margaret Peterson. The Messengers.

Told from separate viewpoints, as evil forces from the parallel world invade their home, the Greystones, their doubles, and friends must return to the alternate dimension to save both worlds.

*Gibbs, Stuart. Charlie Thorne and the Lost City.

Charlie Thorne must search for Charles Darwin's hidden treasure in South America—with plenty of enemies hot on her trail.

*Ireland, Justina. Ophie's Ghost.

A sweeping tale of the ghosts of our past that won't stay buried, starring an unforgettable girl named Ophie.

*Lawrence, lain. *Deadman's Castle*.



Mythologies of the World

Buyea, Rob. Because of Mr. Terupt.


Seven fifth-graders at Snow Hill School in Connecticut relate how their lives are changed for the better by rookie teacher Mr. Terupt.


This book celebrates over 50 women who have shattered the glass ceiling, defied racial discrimination, and pioneered in their fields.

This book introduces readers to DNA in a clear, engaging manner, beginning with plants and animals, then connecting to humans.


