Enrollment

- Opened in 2006 with 20 students in Grades K-2
- Today, we have 222 students
 - 90 students in Lower School (Grades K-5)
 - 74 students in Middle School (Grades 6-8)
 - 53 students in High School (Grades 9-12)
 - 5 students in the Next Steps Transition Program

Average class size:

- 15 Lower School
- 14 Middle School
- 10 High School

Faculty and Staff

- 109 faculty and staff members
- 30% faculty of color, as compared to 15% average of all NAIS member schools
- 83% lead faculty with advanced degrees
- 8 Lower School therapists and counselors, all with advanced degrees
- 8 Upper School therapists and counselors, all with advanced degrees
- 3:1 student teacher ratio in Lower School
- 4:1 student teacher ratio in Upper School
- 2:1 Student Teacher ratio in Next Steps

Overview:

- The Next Steps Transition Program is a postsecondary option designed to meet the needs of a range of students
 - Students for whom college or other postsecondary opportunities might be appropriate after additional preparation
 - Students for whom independent living and career skills are the priority
- Students can attend for one, two, or three years
- The program promotes independence by engaging in community activities
- Next Steps is individualized to the participants in the program
 - We work with students and families to create goals
 - We meet the range of all students in academic classes and internships
 - Our program is student-interest driven
- Next Steps faculty work with students to increase academic, social, and vocational readiness



Student-run businesses:

- By the Way Bakery collaboration
 - Neighborhood kosher, gluten-free bakery
 - Weekly cupcake ordering and delivery coordinated by Next Steps students
- Students run a school store where they:
 - Plan, purchase, and price items to sell
 - Develop marketing skills
 - Advertise, practice, and apply graphic design skills
 - Manage inventory, build customer service skills, and operate a cash register
 - Review the store budget and monitor profits
 - Cultivate regular and meaningful customer relationships















Partnerships:

- Job Path
 - Lead staff professional development
 - Co-teach vocational planning classes
 - Present parent workshops
- BTW Bakery
 - Collaborate with students on a weekly cupcake delivery service
- Horace Mann School
 - Provide a variety of internship opportunities for students
- B'nai Jeshurun
 - Provide internship opportunities for students in the hospitality field
- A local college with a specialized, inclusive program
- Other local postsecondary programs
 - Plan social events with other programs with build interpersonal relationships



Parent Programming:

- Numerous introductions to inclusive colleges throughout the year
- The IDEAL Speaker Series
 - Presentations on a number of topics related to services and opportunities for young adults with disabilities



Why are OPWDD and ACCES-VR necessary?

OPWDD

Required for obtaining waiver services (Supported Employment, Day Hab, Comm Hab, Respite, etc.)

- Application process is lengthy, best to start several years prior to graduation
- · Medicaid is required for enrollment

ACCES-VR

Most employment programs require an open case with ACCES-VR

- · Provides funding for job development and first 90 days of work, then OPWDD funding kicks in
- · Links to training in a number of areas related to work-readiness



Internships:

- Students complete a career interest assessment
- Students participate in internships based on their interests
- Students explore a variety of skills and fields
- Students work with a job coach to increase independence
- Internships are individualized to meet the range and needs of all students
- Students practice work-related social skills
- Students receive support in writing resumes and cover letters as appropriate
- In 2020-21, two students engaged in internal internships









Transition Support Professionals

- Transition Support Professionals assist students:
 - with vocational assistance at internship sites
 - in academic subjects
 - with daily living skills
 - when navigating the community
- Transition Support Professionals provide a high staff to student ratio in order to give individualized attention

- Participate in IDEAL's extracurricular drama program






Music
