Volleyball won a district championship. Boys basketball won the 7th state championship in school history while girls basketball finished 2nd in district. Though the season was cut short, girls swimming had two competitors medal at the state meet. Our spring sports were eager to get back to competition after having their 2020 seasons wiped out by Covid. Girls and boys track each won a district and regional championship, and finished 4th and 3rd respectively at the state meet. The boys golf program earned a district, regional and state championship-which they won by 33 strokes-to add to the long list of accomplishments by the Warriors in the 2020-2021 season. Softball advanced to the area round of the playoffs and at the time of this publication, the baseball team is on the road to Waco to compete in the TAPPS 5A State Semifinals.

Through athletics, our goal is to provide opportunities for our students to grow in their relationship with Christ while achieving their highest potential intellectually, creatively and socially. Almost all (85%) students in middle and high school play at least one sport and over half (54%) of them compete in multiple sports. This has helped us to develop a unified environment that encourages dynamic and diverse athletes who are committed to representing their school, teammates, coaches and families at the highest level.



THE FUTURE LOOKS

THIS WASN'T THE FIRST TIME THE WOODLANDS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY MOVED UP A CLASSIFICATION IN TAPPS, BUT IT CERTAINLY FELT DIFFERENT.

Last fall, the Warriors jumped from 4A to 5A in all sports, which presented an entirely new challenge – how to compete with the best competition in Texas?

"This was a massive shift in the maturity of the other programs we were playing," TWCA Athletic Director Randy Hollas said. "We knew this was coming...and that it was going to have a profound effect on athletics."

The Warriors, though, had no intention to ease their way into the new level of competition. They wanted to compete, and win, immediately.

Mission accomplished.

In its first year of 5A competition, TWCA racked up an impressive number of achievements that include three state championships (boys cross country, boys basketball and boys golf), eight district championships (boys and girls cross country, volleyball, boys basketball, girls soccer, boys golf, boys and girls track) and playoff appearances from every program at TWCA.

That list doesn't include baseball, which at the time of publication was competing in the TAPPS 5A Division II semifinals. This success didn't come overnight. The Warrior athletics program has been gradually building for years, something that Hollas and the entire department has invested a lot of time and effort into.

"What we know here is that we have a captured audience from the time they're in kindergarten up," Hollas said. "We know that we can take our athletes and start to introduce them to sports and fundamentals and culture very The Warrior athletics staff and the school's Senior Leadership Team believe that investing in their students is the best way to build a successful program. Over the past several years, TWCA has added a dedicated athletic period, brought in strength and conditioning coach Tim Walker and built a new weight room in order to instill a "culture of training" among Warrior athletes.

early. We started 'Warrior Leagues' (youth sports program) because we want our kids who come up through elementary to compete in our varsity level sports." "That's how we compete with places that go outside of their school to bring in talent every year," Hollas said. "We embrace the challenge to grow our own."



Head volleyball coach and Assistant Director of Athletics Kori Parker echoed that sentiment.


"Adding the girls into the athletic period was the first big step we took toward success," she said. "It provided year-round training and consistency, both in the weight room and on the field or court. The expectation from the kids in our program is 'this is who we are, now."

Both Hollas and Parker also agreed that having a consistent group of leaders – both players and coaches – has allowed them to "keep doing what we know to be successful, while tweaking small things that we want to improve," as Parker put it.

"I believe we have the best run athletic program in the state," Hollas said. "It's a constant challenge to find the right group of coaches that get on the bus and all work to the same program goal. The group we have now work well with each other, support each other, they care about each other and have sincere care about whether everyone has success. That is extremely unique in sports."

Now, the challenge for TWCA is to build on the success it has enjoyed, something that Hollas doesn't take lightly.

"We're going to continue to do what we do well, but we're never ever going to stop looking at ourselves and think



that we've arrived," he said. "I was told early on that you always seek to become better. You never rest on your laurels."

For Hollas, this includes seeking advice from successful programs across the state, internally accessing how each team within the program can get better, finding best practices and thinking creatively on how to grow the Warriors' success both on and off the field.

"We want TWCA to be a place where our athletes advance to the collegiate level, in whatever sport," Hollas said. "We also want to seek relationships with lvy League and east coast schools that have higher profile academic institutions that fit what we do here academically." Hollas, Parker and the entire Warrior athletic program know that the days of easy competition is over. Every game in district and in the playoffs will feature an opponent that is talented, organized and ready to compete.

"The days of state championships and district championships are going to become more special now," Hollas said. "We're ready to work to make those happen as often as possible."

While the Warriors won't let themselves think they've "arrived," the rest of TAPPS should know by now... TWCA is here to stay.

TWCA Enters the E-Sports World **N By Matt Reese**

WELCOME TO THE NEW ERA OF HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS.

TAPPS, in partnership with Play Versus ("PlayVS"), has aspired to "take video gaming to another level with organized competitive gameplay." Esports has arrived at TWCA.

Head coach and program leader Xavier Eldridge introduced the idea of a Warrior E-sports team back in the Fall of 2020. Over 20 students signed up for the team and it was game on.

The season was split into two halves. In the fall, students competed in Overwatch and League of Legends competitions. The spring saw the introduction of Rocket League to competition, which quickly became the go-to game for the Warriors.

Rocket League can be played with up to eight members per side but is 3 v. 3 in TAPPS competition. It has been described as "soccer, but with rocket-powered cars" and can be played "cross-platform," meaning that competitors can play on PlayStation, Xbox or PCs at the same time.

Though it was only the first year of the program, TWCA finished ninth in the TAPPS league of 26 teams, just missing the playoffs by one spot. Senior



Cedric Cook, junior Keaton Harvey and sophomore Cameron Davis became one of TWCA's best rotations throughout the regular season.

"This was the first time I competed for my school outside of other sports," Harvey said. "It was fun and it helped me meet other people at TWCA that like to game."

"It was different," Davis added. "Usually, you play games just for fun, but playing for your school, it gives you a little different mindset. You really want to win and move forward with your teammates."

This comradery is one of the major benefits TAPPS hopes to achieve by adding esports to its competition. Other benefits include "character development, increased participation, STEM engagement and college scholarship opportunities."

According to TAPPS, "more than 200 colleges and universities [are] offering almost tens of millions of dollars in scholarships" for esports athletes.

With one season under their belt, Eldridge and the other athletes are focused on growing the program for next year, with the hope that 2021-2022 will allow for practices and competitions to be held on campus, rather than remotely as was the case this past year.

Davis believes the competitive nature of the Warriors will encourage that growth.

"You're playing for your school," he said. "It gives you motivation to do your absolute best rather than just playing for fun. Of course, it's still fun to play, but there's that little extra behind representing the Warriors."

With the "Warrior Way" driving them, don't be surprised if TWCA Esports is next in line for a championship.

For TWCA freshman Luke De Leon, he wouldn't want to be anywhere else.


De Leon is an elite athlete who has been competing on the highest levels of the junior gymnastics circuit since he was seven years old.

"It started with my sister," he said. "I used to watch her practice and she got me into the sport. I always thought, 'this is so cool, I should try it.""

The now 14-year old started training at Bannon's Gymnastix – the former gym of the most decorated American gymnast of all-time Simone Biles – and saw immediate success.

He was a state champion in his first full year of competition, which earned him an invite to try out for Cypress Academy led by legendary coach Tom Meadows. Cypress Academy has produced several Olympians, including Houston's own Chris Brooks, Jonathan Horton and Raj Bhavsar. His early success hasn't slowed. De Leon recently finished 7th in the All-Around at the Region 3 Championships for Men's Junior Level 9 Elite competition. This earned him a spot in the 2021 Junior National Championships (formerly Junior Olympics) in mid-May.

A quiet and humble kid, De Leon is not one to tout his individual accomplishments. For him, it's all about the team.



"That's my favorite part about competition, the team aspect," he said. "Having your teammates on the sidelines pumping you up gets me so motivated to go out and perform my best." De Leon and his teammates at Cypress Academy finished 1st overall in the Regional tournament.

Still, De Leon is not lacking individual accomplishments, and often finds himself with gold medals around his neck when the competition is over.

"It's an amazing feeling, standing atop the podium looking at all your family and friends," he said. "It's just a feeling that all of your hard work has paid off."

Speaking of work, De Leon trains nearly every day of the week for the upcoming national championships, leaving school after lunch to head to his gym.

He competes in each discipline – floor, pommel horse, rings, vault, parallel bars and horizontal bar – but says the floor exercise is his favorite.

"There's no feeling that can match it," he said. "When I'm tumbling and flipping through the air, I feel free."

No, Luke De Leon is not like most people.

"Last year, our motto was 'Get Better Together," he said. "It carried over to this season. If we are competing and pushing each other in practice every day, we all get incrementally better. When you all get better, the team gets better."

The formula worked.

Jack Usner (68, 71) won the TAPPS 5A



individual title by three shots and Aaron Pounds (68, 77) finished tied for third. Ethan Bridges, Jake Maggert and Sam McClure rounded out the Top 5.

"Everyone battled through some tough conditions on the course and it was mentally draining for everyone," McNeese said. "But they persevered and got the title."

To get that first state title is taxing. It's surreal and it took TWCA a minute to realize what they did.



The Warrior football and track stadium is one of the tops among Houston private schools... it's named after Tom Earle, who is the legendary cross country and track coach.





FOOTBALL Warriors Sustain Success, Name Multiple To All-State



THE 2020 FOOTBALL SEASON WAS YET ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL CAMPAIGN FOR THE WOODLANDS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY AS THE WARRIORS MADE THE PLAYOFFS FOR THE EIGHTH TIME IN THE LAST 10 YEARS.

The Warriors went 4-3 overall and finished third in District 4 at 3-2 while competing for the first time in TAPPS Division II. TWCA closed the regular season with three straight wins, before falling to Geneva School of Boerne, 50-49, in a heartbreaking bi-district playoff loss.

Five underclassmen played key roles for the Warriors in 2020, including Class of 2023 running backs Roric Hawkins (225 rushing yards) and Ryan Leslie (375 yards, 3 TDs). Leslie was also a standout at linebacker with 4.1 tackles per game and an interception. TWCA's key player to keep an eye on is Class of 2023 quarterback/ running back/defensive back Josh Johnson, who had a breakout campaign in 2020.

Johnson led the team in rushing (397 yards, 8 touchdowns) and passing (1,101 yards, 13 TDs) and also compiled 3.3 tackles per game and seven passes defensed.

A junior class that included offensive lineman Colby Gorman, tight end Sebastian Bryngelson, running back Keaton Harvey, defensive lineman Ezekiel Jurado, linebacker Sean Kane and defensive back Dereck Felder returns to captain the crusade for 2021. Kane led the 2020 Warriors with 10 tackles per game to go with 2.5 sacks.

TWCA says goodbye to senior stalwarts and

program cornerstones like receiver/punter Caedmon Parker, kicker Stratton Butaud and running back Davis Heise. Parker was the team's top offensive playmaker in 2020, catching 34 balls for 789 yards and 14 TDs, and led the team with five interceptions. He also averaged 34.1 yards per punt. He will be tough to replace because of his big-play ability. Butaud averaged 46.6 yards per kickoff with seven touchbacks.

In December, Randy Hollas stepped down as head football coach after four years at the helm. He will focus more on his duties as athletic director. Defensive coordinator Chris McClanahan was promoted to head coach and sustains the continuity and tradition the Warriors had established under Hollas.



STOP US IF YOU'VE HEARD IT BEFORE: THE WOODLANDS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY BOYS CROSS COUNTRY TEAM WON STATE.

Never mind, don't stop us. Because the fact remains coach Tom Earle's boys are still at the head of the class despite moving up in classification to TAPPS 5A. TWCA made it a four-peat as state champion in 2020, as three runners finished in the Top 10. They were first-team, all-staters Ben Shearer, Josh Mueck and Caleb Bigler.


The Warriors also won the district championship for the fifth straight year. Four runners were named as all-district, first teamers: Shearer, Mueck, Bigler, Zach Bagnoli and Lucas Trevathan.

Shearer was dominant all season. He won the McNeil meet in Austin to earn a first-place ranking in Texas, public or private schools. He also won the Desert Twilight meet in Arizona, overcoming some of the top runners in the country from California, Arizona and Utah. That meet championship elevated Shearer to No. 3 in the country.

At the Nike Virtual Nationals, the Warriors finished 16th

overall in the country. The Warrior girls also enjoyed a stellar season.

The TWCA girls finished third overall at state, their ninth consecutive year finishing in the top three. They also won the district championship for the sixth year in a row. The Warrior girls had four all-district, first teamers in Lindsay Worthington, Fern Shirley, Zoe Calimani and Camille Young. Shirley competed against the large private schools in a 5K race and got seventh overall. She also competed against the boys in a 5K race in October and finished 26th overall.

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NEXT MAN UP: McClanahan the Right Man to Lead TWCA Football

CHRIS MCCLANAHAN KNEW HE HAD BIG SHOES TO FILL WHEN HE TOOK OVER THE WOODLANDS CHRISTIAN ACADEMY'S FOOTBALL PROGRAM IN DECEMBER.

But there is confidence that McClanahan, who joined TWCA in the summer of 2020 as defensive coordinator, is the right man for the job, and it starts with his impressive resume.

This year is McClanahan's 21st in coaching, and while TWCA is his first head coaching gig, he has experience in a plethora of roles at many schools for distinguished coaches.

McClanahan started at Fort Bend Hightower as an assistant, then helped open Seven Lakes with the late Kevin O'Keefe, then to Alvin with Trey Herrmann before going back to Hightower as the offensive coordinator and helping the Hurricanes win three district titles.

McClanahan got out of coaching for a few years before returning to the sidelines at Lamar for a season.

Then, finally, Randy Hollas recruited him to TWCA, where McClanahan captained the defense, engineering a switch to a 3-4 base from a 4-3, and ultimately chosen as Hollas' successor as he moved into full-time athletic director.

"It has been a unique experience," McClanahan said. "It has been incredible." And though he has only had an offseason as the man in charge for the first time, McClanahan is prepared. Well, kind of.

"For the most part, it's been what I expected," McClanahan said. "But there are kind of two sides to that coin. The admin and coordinator experience I had prepared me for the football organization and structure of practices and staffing. fundamentals and skills at each defensive position, as well as players and coaches understanding why they are being asked to do things in a different manner.

McClanahan will have talent in 2021. The cupboard is far from bare and it helps that the program's numbers have grown. TWCA had 37 kids in the program going into the 2020 football season. As of late April, the program had 59.

Specific activities, banquets. But it's been a positive learning curve going from a (UIL) 6A school (Lamar) to what amounts to a 2A school."

McClanahan said TWCA is similar to how it was at Seven Lakes and Tays Junior High. Parents are heavily involved and the focus on athletics is significant.

Also, because of the intimate environment a small school offers there is more opportunity to develop relationships with each kid, not only in football but other sports as well.

The offseason has been successful in McClanahan re-teaching some of the

McClanahan credited coaches who care about kids and understand the importance of supporting multi-sport athletes, current players recruiting others because of the positive experience they are enjoying, and winning.

"I believe that word is spreading about the overall positive experience in football at TWCA, and I am thankful to our student-athletes, families, and school community, who are our biggest supporters," McClanahan said.

AROUND THE HIGH SCHOOL AND AAU BASKETBALL CIRCUIT, THERE'S ALWAYS THAT PLAYER WHO THE REAL "HOOP HEADS" ALWAYS SAY, "YOU'VE GOTTA SEE HIM PLAY."

The herky-jerky Austin Benigni from The Woodlands Christian Academy is that guy.

> Benigni is fast and quick. There's a difference. He can get up and down the floor in a straight line but what makes him special is that he's a ball of fast-twitch muscle with a jump shot.

> > "My style is very quick and a series of stop and goes," he said. "It's a bunch of hesitation moves. I can process information really quickly and read defenses, so I usually make the right decision on the court."

That style leads to acrobatic shots and highlight reel spills.

"I welcome the physicality," he said. "I grew up training with John Lucas with college and pro players. I go all out, so I'm used to getting knocked around by bigger and older guys. I've used that in high school to my advantage."

Off the court, he rolls at a different speed.

"Outside of basketball, I'm a really slow person," he said. "I walk slow, I eat slow. It's drastically different than when I'm on the court."

After leading his team in scoring as a sophomore and winning a TAPPS state title a year ago, Benigni's role changed this winter. Backcourt buddy Bakari LaStrap took Benigni under his wing as an underclassman, so when LaStrap went off to college basketball at IUPUI, Benigni was tasked to take on the leadership role.

"Coach (Tanner) Field challenged me to work on my body language," he said. "I wasn't the leader as a sophomore and could get away with some body language a little more. I've really worked on that along with being more vocal. Picking my teammates up and giving them some pointers."

He also has taken another talented backcourt-mate Zion Pipkin under his wing. He's paying it forward for the freshman.

With his resume, you must play with confidence...and Benigni doesn't lack in that department. But he does live by Field's mantra as a balance.

"Coach has this saying 'Be Third' and that has become a huge part of my life," he said. "Putting God first, others second and yourself last. If you live by that, I think you are going to get far in life.

"But don't get me wrong, it was really cool going up a class (TAPPS 4A to 5A) and winning it again," he said. "We thought we were going to win it the entire season. We knew we always had the talent, so we expected it."

So, can we expect a third-straight TAPPS title with four of five starters returning in 2021-22?

"As soon as the game ended, I looked at coach and said we have one more to go," he said. "I want to be a part of the team who wins three straight titles for the first time in school history."

Playing College Sports, a Meadors Family Tradition

MCKENNA MEADORS ADMIRES HER PARENTS, BRADD AND TRISH. SHE LOOKS UP TO THEM. ADORES THEM.

So, when The Woodlands Christian Academy senior discovered that both of her parents played sports in college at Hannibal-LaGrange University in Missouri, she knew she wanted to as well.

> "Growing up, it wasn't an expectation, but it was something that I wanted," Meadors said. "I wanted to be like them."

Meadors, a twosport standout for the Warriors, signed February 1 to play softball at Hill College. She is a right-handed pitcher who also plays first and third base.

"It's so cool to me, because it was real important that I played in college," said Meadors, who also played basketball for the Warriors and was even offered to play both sports in college.

Through the softball season's first 12 games, Meadors hit .512 with 22 RBIs and four home runs for the Warriors with 22 runs scored and a .533 on-base percentage. In the circle, she had a 2.41 ERA with 59 strikes to 21 walks and 13 earned runs in 61 innings.

After the 2020 high school softball season was canceled because of the pandemic, Meadors is grateful to be playing her senior year. "It was a seize-the-moment type of thing," she said. "I'm very blessed for the opportunities that God has provided me with, with us being able to play our season. It really is a blessing and I know God has big plans for my life. Us getting to play this year was a part of that, because I've been able to grow more with my friends and my walk of faith as well."

Playing and going to school at TWCA has aided that purpose, spiritually and athletically.

"It's definitely a lot more freedom that's put on us as students," Meadors said. "I feel like they trust us a lot more. I've definitely grown in my walk with God. That's been a huge part. I feel with it being a smaller school, I've been able to focus more on myself with my coaches, opposed to the 60 or 70 girls that would try to play one sport at a public school. I've been able to hone my skills more."

Meadors used to never see a correlation between athletics and faith. But her time at TWCA showed her that they are more a team than not.

"Whenever you're at a public school, it's not as common to see people living out their Christian lifestyle," Meadors said. "So, whenever you come here, and it's like the norm for everyone, always praying and having a Bible class that focuses on improving in our walk with God ... from a sports level, it had always been separate to me. But through coming to this school, I have combined Christianity and sports and I try and use that."

Benigni was an all-state first-team selection, and Perkins and Pipkin were second-team picks.

The District 5 champion Warriors named four to the all-district first team: Benigni, Perkins, Pipkin and Cedric Cook. Cook is an Our Lady of the Lake signee.

Wyatt Boeker and Giovanni Awasum were named to the all-district second team, and Jack Cole and Josh Bento were named as honorable mention all-district selections.

Still, the Warriors were able to put together some impressive performances at the regional and state meets.

At the TAPPS Division II Regional Meet, The Woodlands Christian Academy girls finished sixth as a team in the East division, scoring 37 points. TWCA junior Isabella Krantzcke was awarded Regional Swimmer of the Meet. She won the girls 200-yard freestyle (1:55.27) and the 500-yard freestyle (5:09.87).

Sophomore Brynnah Stowell finished second in the girls 100-yard butterfly (1:01.78) and second behind teammate Krantzcke in the 500-yard freestyle (5:23.71).

Senior Merritt Ruffner finished sixth in the 100-yard backstroke (1:18.09) and

seventh in the girls 50-yard freestyle (29.53 seconds).

At the state meet in San Antonio, Krantzcke placed first and second, respectively, in the 500 freestyle and 200 freestyle. Stowell placed third in the 100 butterfly and 500 freestyle. Ruffner, who was also competing in soccer around the time of the state meet, swam the 50 freestyle and 100 backstroke and placed 15th and 14th, respectively, posting a personal-best time in the 50 free.

TRACK Track Stars Shine in Spring

BOTH TWCA BOYS AND GIRLS TRACK TEAMS HAD STELLAR SEASONS FULL OF CHAMPIONSHIPS, NEW CAREER MARKS AND MUCH MORE.

Let's start with the boys team. The group won both the TAPPS 5A District and Regional Championship and took home third overall at the TAPPS State Meet in May.

Just like from the fall, the recordsmashing Ben Shearer did his thing. He won the TAPPS 5A State Championship in the 800-meter run, 1600-meter run and 3200-meter run. In the 800, he set a new school record and in the final two races he set a new all-time TAPPS State record. He also ran at the time the 10th-fastest mile (4:08.58) in the nation at the Texas Distance Festival in March (4:08.58) and the No. 3 two-mile time (8:48.90) in March in South Carolina.

Other top state results included Evan Sanni-Thomas, setting a new school record in the 400-meter dash and Colby Gorman taking fourth in the shot put.

For the season, new school records were set in the 4x100 and 4x400-meter relays, in the long jump by Austin Benigni, shot put by Gorman and in the high jump by Jack Cole. On the girls' side, the team also brought home the TAPPS 5A District and Regional Championships and then finished fourth as a team at state.

The 4x400-meter relay won the state championship, which included Mia Torres, Lindsay Worthington, Maddie Steed and Zoe Calimani, and also set a new school record.

Catherine Berger took silver in the shot put, Sarah Chappelle took bronze in the 100-meter hurdles and Megan Hanigan took bronze in the pole vault


TWCA Gets Hot in TAPPS Postseason N By Matt Malatesta




Led by TCU-signee Caedmon Parker, the Warriors were Area and Regional Champions before falling to eventual State Champion Lutheran South in the State Semis.


