



During its first year with its 24 members, the SJCP BSU has managed to produce several activities dedicated to educatina and increasing student participation. Such activities include creating the Black Student Union speaker series with guest speakers Alexis Bakos, Director of Concer Prevention and Research at NIH, and Aje Hill, CEO, and leader of the youth mentoring program "I Believe in Me Inc.." The BSU held student discussions and even got the chance to celebrate Black History Month by acknowledging an influential African-American each day during the month of February. To finish the school year, the Black Student Union will be partnering with the non-profit organization "I Believe in Me Inc." for a school-wide food drive and distribution providing relief to Frederick residents.

Needless to say, the Black Student Union's first year has been successful, with many more exciting opportunities to come.
