
These five steps can help simplify the planning process:

# Key Factors that colleges look for in applicants...



Grades in college prep courses and strength of curriculum



Standardized test scores (keep in mind that some colleges are Test Optional due to COVID)



Extra curricular activities, athletics, summer experiences, work experiences



Community Service (did you go beyond the required 40 hours?)



Application essays (personal statement), recommendations, interviews



Level of interest, potential fit, diversity, legacy, ability to overcome obstacles

# College "Match" vs. College "Fit"

### College Match

 Describes your ability to earn admission at a college or university that equals your academic qualifications

# College Fit

 Finding a place that fits your educational and social needs that will best support your intellectual and social development

#### Safety Schools

 Schools with flexible admissions requirements; student will most likely receive acceptance.

#### Match Schools


 Schools that are a good fit for the student; student meets all the general academic requirements.

#### Reach Schools

 Schools which may be the student's top choice but admittance to the school is difficult; student may fall short of academic requirements or competition is high for freshmen acceptance.

#### 2 Year College (Community College)

- Earn Associates Degree
- May transfer to a 4-year college or university to earn Bachelor's degree
- Fulfill general education requirements
- Admission requirements:
  - •HS diploma, application, transcript, placement test





#### 4-year college

- Earn Bachelor's degree in 4-5 years
- Can be Public or Private
- First two years are general education courses
- Admission requirements:
  - •Require a minimum GPA and/or SAT score
  - Includes essay, letters of recommendation, activities, honors and awards







# Starting The College Application Process



Choose your top 5-7 college choices.



Identify admission requirements. GPA, ACT/SAT, etc.



Note the college's application deadlines

Early Acceptance/Commitment/Action
Early Application
Regular Application



Writing and Proofing College Essays.



Letters of Recommendation (if needed).



Transcript sent, along with ACT/SAT.

# Types of Application Deadlines








<u>Early Decision</u> - <u>Early decision</u> plans are binding — a student who is accepted as an ED applicant must attend the college.

<u>Early Application & Early Action Deadline</u> - Early action plans are nonbinding — students receive an early response to their application but do not have to commit to the college until the normal reply date of May 1. The hard sell is coming.

Regular Application Deadline - The deadline for regular decision applications is normally between January 1 and May 1, depending on the college. Get the bulk of your essays done and confirm who will write your recommendations in November, so you won't have a lot of last-minute work to do during the holiday season.



# Undocumented/Dacamented Students

- Students who are undocumented/have DACA do have options for college. Colleges have a specific person/department who will work with undocumented students in order to help get them enrolled
- Undocumented students are not eligible to fill out the FAFSA but can fill out the <u>Alternative Application</u> for financial Aid
- Some states and colleges are more "friendly" than others. <u>IACAC College</u> <u>Advising Guide for Undocumented Students</u>

### How to pay for College

- After October 1st, FAFSA and Alternative Application (for undoc/daca students) will be available to complete
- It's never too early to begin your research of scholarships available to college bound students
  - Joliet Central Scholarships: visit Joliet Central's page to see some of the scholarships posted specifically for Central students
  - College and University Scholarships: begin researching the college/university that you wish to attend to see if they offer scholarships based on grades (merit) or need (income)

- Figure out the cost of college based on your family's circumstances, fill out the Net Price Calculator
