We appreciate the support of our community to help fund improvements in South Kitsap Schools. Our Capital Levy was approved by voters in 2018 and will be collected over four years. Timing of the projects is based on cash flow and limiting interuptions to instruction. Here is what we've accomplished so far and what improvements are planned over the next several months.




REMOTE LEARNING - COVID19

Response to COVID-19 forced the closure of school this spring and South Kitsap staff reinvented instruction delivery to a remote learning model.

During this time, connections are essential for student and staff well-being. Students rely on social interaction at school with their peers and teachers for a sense of belonging. Wrap around support for students goes beyond instruction and includes food service, child care, and wellness checks. South Kitsap Food & Nutrition Services implemented grab & go meal distribution at thirteen school sites and provided approximately 26,000 meals each week.

Equity is always a critical consideration and staff quickly realized that many South Kitsap families do not have adequate access to technology. This barrier was overcome in two ways: more than 2,300 Chrome Books were checked out to students and paper packets were mailed to students who lack internet access.



Remote learning is challenging for all involved and we are working to get better every day. We are grateful for the partnership of our families throughout the process. We will keep you posted as more is known about the 2020-2021 school year.

Graduation and end of the year events have a different look this year due to social distancing requirements. The pride we have for the accomplishments of our students has not changed. In fact, we have even more to be proud of this year.

Career Connected Learning and Future Success

The Apprenticeship Program at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard (PSNS) is a prime example of career-connected learning at South Kitsap High School.

Congratulations to Kameron Harden, Beth Silberman, Karley Wilson, Zowie Pangelian, Ethan Christianson, and Nathan Hodges on their hard work in the apprenticeship program at PSNS. The students applied to the program as juniors and are finishing up the work study phase of training as seniors. They will move into "Helper" positions at PSNS.

STATE RECOGNITION - SERVING STUDENTS

East Port Orchard Elementary, Sidney Glen Elementary, and South Colby Elementary have been recognized for closing achievement gaps and serving students during the 2018-2019 school year. South Colby showed growth for students identifying as Hispanic and students in the free and reduced lunch program. East Port Orchard closed achievement gaps for one or more student groups. Sidney Glen closed achievement gaps for one or more student groups and showed growth for students identifying as Hispanic.



This is the second phase of the new State School Recognition System. The State Board of Education (SBE) along with the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) and the Educational Opportunity Gap Oversight and Accountability Committee (EOGOAC) have re-imagined school recognition in Washington. Recognition is based on state-level and local information. This recognition framework selects schools along the entire continuum of support and highlights positive systems changes happening in schools around our state.

Schools are recognized for:

- Closing Gaps: these schools close opportunity gaps for specific student groups, e.g. Hispanic students and make systems changes to improve outcomes for all students.
- Growth: Schools recognized for growth show progress one year to the next.

DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT 2019-2020



This report is a 'snapshot' of South Kitsap School District for the 2019-2020 school year. It captures information about student demographics and test scores. Smarter Balanced Assessment is a comprehensive system designed to measure how well students are learning the Washington State K-12 Standards in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. This assessment is given in grades 3-8 and high school.

SKSD had 97.8% of 3rd-5th graders participate in the SBA ELA assessment and 97.9% in Mathematics. For 11th grade we had a 85.0% participation rate in ELA and 84.7% in Mathematics.

DISTRICT FINANCE - SCHOOL FUNDING

South Kitsap School District takes pride in operating in a resourceful and responsible manner. Our annual operating budget is approximately \$156.8 million and most of our spending directly supports classroom instruction. Our resources, equipment, and technology sustain innovative programs and instruction to support safe and successful learning environments for our students. We use public tax dollars efficiently to equip our students with the knowledge and skills to succeed in an ever-changing global society.

Where Does Our Funding Come From?

The budgeted General Fund pays for day-to-day operations and is funded by a variety of sources:

State Dollars

78%\$118.984.535

The largest source of funding for local schools comes from state tax dollars.

Local Levy Dollars

12%......\$17,598,893

Enrichment levy funds are collected from taxpayers and must be approved by local voters. The funds are used for day to day costs and are collected over a set number of years.

Federal Dollars

8%......\$12,456,993

Over 99% of federal dollars are strictly allocated, meaning the district can't use federal dollars to make up for shortages in other funding.

Other - Including Donations

2%......\$2,768,920

All other funding sources include local gifts and donations, which are used to fill very specific needs.

How the Funding is Used

The focus is on instruction. On average, 68% of the money goes to our teachers and their support, 10.5% to school and district administration.

Teaching, Teaching Support, School and Central Office Staff

83%......\$130,392,120

Last school year, we spent 81¢ of every dollar on teaching and teaching support, which includes librarians, counselors, and classroom assistants.

Custodial, Maintenance, & Grounds

6%.....\$9,081,270

Just over a 5¢ of every dollar we spent last year was on school maintenance, custodians, and ground crews.

Nutrition Services

3%.....\$4,038,484

Just over 3¢ per dollar went to provide students with nutritious meals.

Transportation

4%.....\$6,924,933

4¢ per dollar was spent on buses and drivers, who safely transported around 9800 students each day and traveled 1.33 million miles last year.

Utilities

2%.....\$3,138,778

Just over 2¢ per dollar was spent on power, water, and sewer for our 16 schools and seven additional buildings.

All Other Support Services

2%......\$3,237,944

Everything else that goes into keeping our schools running, including technology, cost just over 3¢.
