Voters Approve Capital Projects Levy



Election results brought mixed emotions for South Kitsap School District on November 6. Voters approved Proposition 2, a Capital Projects Levy that will address some urgent facility issues, improve safety and security, and upgrade technology. Proposition 1, a Bond to construct a second comprehensive high school, failed to gain the 60% super majority needed to pass. The certified election results are shown to the right.

By passing the Capital Levy, voters approved a total collection amount of \$21,694,378 at an approximate rate of \$0.67 per thousand of assessed home value. Funds from the Capital Levy will be collected every six months over four years beginning in 2019. Because of the collection process, projects will be prioritized, and work will be completed over time.

The Capital Levy will fund projects in three main categories: safety & security (\$2,030,325), identified capital projects (\$18,951,553), and technology for instruction (\$3,712,500). Renovations to the South Kitsap Community Pool will qualify for an estimated \$3 million in State Construction Assistance Funding (SCAP or State Match).

South Kitsap School District is committed to transparency and the efficient use of taxpayer resources. Extensive information about capital projects is available on the District website under the "Your Tax Dollars at Work" section.

on their work and activities. For their part in representing their peers, the student on the Superintendent's Roundtable gain valuable insight to the administrative operations of a school district. In addition, they develop skills in leadership, advocacy, and team building.

Last year's student representatives shared their top concerns via discussions and a survey. The shared priorities included school safety, facility condition, and bullying. The Superintendent and School Board listened to the recommendations of the students and took action. Secure access entrances were added at South Kitsap High School and Crisis Reality Training has been implemented district-wide. Several improvements and repairs are scheduled at all schools thanks to voters approving the Capital Projects Levy.

SKHS Awarded \$1,230,965 Grant

South Kitsap School District was one of only seven school districts in the State of Washington chosen to receive a STEM Capital Grant. This \$1,230,965 grant will provide the funds to modernize and renovate fifteen STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) classrooms to meet safety, graduation, and ADA requirements at South Kitsap High School. Nine science STEM classrooms labs and six CTE/ STEM classrooms will be renovated to ensure instructional STEM content at an equitable level.

"This is huge for us, "said Sara Hatfield, Director of CTE, "These funds are going to allow us to build state of the art lab facilities with modern layouts and vastly improve the technology that many of our courses depend on. All of this will enrich our students learning experience and help them with their careers and post-secondary education."

"Through the STEM Capital Grants Program, we can update classrooms in schools serving students in some of our most historically underserved communities across Washington State, including rural areas and schools in low-income neighborhoods," said Caroline King, CEO of Washington STEM.



Manchester Elementary Designated School of Distinction

Manchester Elementary was recently designated as a Center for Educational Effectiveness 2018 School of Distinction. The annual program recognizes schools that have made the biggest improvement in reading and mathematics during a fiveyear period.

"I am so proud to be the principal of Manchester Elementary. Each day I witness our excellent teachers doing whatever it takes to meet the needs of each student," stated Principal Rachelle Byrd. "Manchester strives to be a place where students learn the skills they need to be successful academically, socially and emotionally. It is wonderful to have our hard work recognized with this designation."

This award is given to the top five percent of schools in each level – elementary, middle, and high school – that, as a result of improving their students' skills, have more students achieving at higher levels on the Measures of Student Progress (3rd - 8th grade), the High School Proficiency Exam in Reading and the End of Course Exam in Mathematics (10th grade).

While many school districts and communities view arts education as a "nice extra", SKSD is committed to providing a superior arts education to all its students. Whether on the stage, in the concert hall, on the football field, or in the drawing and painting studio, students are discovering their own creative language which will help them become contributing members of the world community.

In 2015, congress signed into law the new "Elementary and Secondary Education Act". This deemed the Arts and Music as a "core" subject legitimizing the need for creative and rigorous artistic opportunities for all children. South Kitsap has been on the leading edge of this new paradigm for many years, throughout the state and at the national level.



The District's unwavering commitment to provide a holistic education can be seen in a multitude of programs. Our Visual and Performing Arts Department is one of only three departments out of 295 school districts state-wide. Highline, Federal Way and now Evergreen School District have sent representatives to observe SKSD to learn how they can develop a program like ours.

In 2014, the district committed to implementing a district-wide orchestra program to the already successful band and choir program. Over the past four years the orchestra program has grown from being offered at two elementary schools and one middle school to being available to all students in the school district.

When other districts were cutting visual arts and theatre programs, South Kitsap expanded course offerings. Unlike most high schools, SKHS has two full-time theatre directors and now offers a Shakespeare acting class which is equivalent to a collegelevel acting course.
