Summer is an opportunity for students of all ages to enjoy reading in a relaxed and leisurely setting. Summer reading is also a vital way that students keep their skills sharp for the upcoming school year. Maret recommends that students spend at least 20 minutes reading each day during the summer. Students should select books and other reading material that interest and challenge them, and families should consider ways that they can read together or make discussing books a part of their lives over the summer months. We recognize that there is a range of readers at each grade level. If books on this list do not match your child's reading ability, you may choose to read them aloud to your child. *Ada Twist and the Perilous Pants by Andrea Beaty: Ada must rely on her curious mind, her brave spirit, and her best pals Rosie Revere and Iggy Peck to solve a mystery in her own backyard.



*The Vanderbeekers of 141st Street by Karina Yan Glaser: Told that they will have to move

out of their Harlem brownstone just after Christmas, the five Vanderbeeker children decide to change their reclusive landlord's mind.



*Bayou Magic by Jewel Parker Rhodes: Visiting her grandmother in the Louisiana bayou, ten-year-old Maddy begins to realize that she may be the only sibling to carry on the gift of her family's magical legacy.



*In the Shadow of the Sun by Anne Sibley O'Brien: Mia and Simon set off on a harrowing journey to save their father and escape North Korea.



*A Properly Unhaunted Place by William Alexander: In a world full of ghosts, Rosa and Jasper live in the only unhaunted town--but must spring to action when they realize the ghosts are lying in wait to take the town back.
