Happy Summer and welcome to kindergarten! I love to read, and this summer I am hoping to read a few good books. I am challenging you to read and share your adventures by completing a Book Report in a Bag! It sounds funny, but book reports in a bag are a fun, creative, and an interactive way to share what you have learned from your summer reading. If you do not normally have large paper grocery bags, please make sure to pick one up the next time you head to the store, so you are ready for this project.

To begin, you will need to read at least one of the following books (feel free to read any book you desire- but here are some suggestions):

- Madeline Book Series by Ludwig Bemelmans
- Mo Willems Book Series
- Fancy Nancy Book Series by Jane O'Connor
- Pete the Cat Book Series by James Dean/Eric Litwin
- If You Give a Mouse a Cookie Series by Laura Joffe Numeroff
- Llama Llama Book Series by Anna Dowdney
- The Very Hungry Caterpillar or any Eric Carle books
- Clifford Goes to Kindergarten
- The Night Before Kindergarten

Be sure to plan appropriately, and not wait until the week before school starts to read the book. Remember that you will need time to work on the project!

Book Report in a Bag – Project Directions

- 1. Remember to make sure you have a large paper grocery/gift bag.
- 2. Choose one of the many stories and read it!
- 3. The <u>front</u> of the bag should be decorated with <u>the book title</u> and <u>the author's name</u>. You also need to *draw and color a scene from the story*. Your scene may be drawn on a piece of unlined paper and then glued onto the bag. Be creative! For example, you could glue fake plant leaves onto the front of your bag, if your book is set in nature. Just be sure that any fun extra details are related to your book and make your bag looks great!
- 4. On the **back** of the bag, write a summary of the book. The summary should tell about the main characters, setting, and a brief explanation about what happened at the beginning, middle, and end of the story. Write your summary (at least 3 sentences) on lined paper and then glue or staple it to the bag. The summary should be completed as neatly as possible.
- 5. On the <u>left</u> side of the bag, *draw, cut out, or glue stars to show how well you liked the book*. Four stars show that you loved it. One star means that you did not really care for it. You will also need to write a sentence or two to explain why you liked or disliked the book. You can write your sentences on paper and glue it to the bag.
- 6. On the **<u>right</u>** side of the bag, *pick five (5) interesting words from the story*. Write the 5 words on this paper and glue it to the bag.

7. Put at least four (4) items (that go along with the story) inside the bag. You will have to explain how these items relate to the story during your book report talk.

8. Prepare and practice your book report talk.

Bring your bag with you on the first day of school. We will share them over the first few days of school. I cannot wait to see what you come up with! Be creative!

Feel free to read as many books as you like, but you are only required to complete <u>one</u> Book Report in a Bag. I look forward to hearing all about your summer adventures in reading!

Dear Families of almost Kindergarteners,







Cutting From Shovel to Pail










