We will also examine common reading comprehension tools and explore differences between measures. Participants will have opportunities to apply strategies to their context. In this session participants will learn about the research around vocabulary knowledge. Best practices for selecting words for explicit instruction by understanding three-tiers of vocabulary words will be applied. Participants will learn about how to use morphology as a tool to expand vocabulary and build networks of words through morphological instruction. Attendees are encouraged to bring student texts from their curriculum to apply procedures for word level instruction. Assessment practices for vocabulary knowledge will be presented with opportunities to learn how to examine data and draw conclusions for instructional purposes. We encourage school teams and/or individuals from multiple disciplines to attend including: administrators, school psychologists, reading teachers, classroom teachers, speech and language pathologists, special education teachers, and other school professionals.

Mental Health First Aid is an internationally recognized mental health awareness program that has been in use since 2001. Mental Health First Aid is listed in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Registry of Evidenced-based programs and practices. The training is eight hours in length and includes a three year national certification. Training is designed to:

- Increase participants awareness of the signs and symptoms of mental illness.
- Decrease the negative stigma's associated with mental illness.
- Empower participants to assist youth who may be struggling with mental illness or challenges.
- Allow participants to better understand the warning signs and risk factors of depression, anxiety, psychotic disorders, trauma, eating disorders, substance use disorders and suicide.
- Teach participants a five-step action plan to help an individual in or out of crisis connect to professional care.

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention System

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention for Schools

Therapeutic Crisis Intervention for Schools (TCIS) is a trauma-informed crisis prevention and management system. The TCIS system helps staff create a learning environment that decreases risk factors while increasing protective factors so both students and staff can feel safe. TCIS provides staff an understanding of trauma sensitive practices and skills (co-regulation) to help students learn how to regulate and manage their own emotions. These newly learned skills encourage a greater willingness and capacity for our students to learn.

TCIS helps participants and schools to:

- Create a trauma-sensitive environment where students and adults are safe and feel safe within their roles as a staff member.
- Pro-actively prevent and/or deescalate potential crisis situations with the students they work with.
- Manage a crisis situation in a therapeutic manner, and, if necessary, intervene physically in a manner that reduces the risk of harm to students and staff.
- Process the crisis event with students and each other to help improve their coping strategies to reduce future risk.

Leadership Retreats

"Alone we can do so little. Together we can do so much." ~ Helen Keller Looking to plan a Summer Leadership Retreat? Allow BOCES Staff Development to help with the planning and facilitation! Oftentimes when Administrative Teams come together, there is at least one person that doesn't get to experience the Retreat fully as they need to be the leader of it all. By partnering with a Staff Developer, we can meet with the leader(s) to learn the goals and objectives for the work, then craft the agenda and activities to best support those goals. Allowing a non-school employee to facilitate the work and conversations allows all members to feel valued by truly being present and contributing.

Teacher Leader Retreats

Using the same concept as the Leadership Retreats, BOCES Staff Development can work with building principals to craft Teacher Leader Retreats. The Retreat can be fully personalized to the needs of the district and may include items like intentional team-building activities, setting of norms for the year, establishing goals, or reviewing data, just to name a few! Again, by bringing in an outside facilitator, this ensures that all team members, including the building administrators can fully contribute to the conversation and work.

Reading Tiered Fidelity Inventory

The Reading Tiered Fidelity Inventory (R-TFI) is a tool that can be used to assess the implementation of a school-wide reading model through an MTSS approach. The inventory allows a school or district team to determine areas of strength and weakness so action steps can be taken to ensure that students are learning to read in a systematic manner that leads to proficiency. Through this service, a BOCES Staff Developer can help administer the inventory, facilitate the conversations among the team and record the data. This work typically needs 3 hours per Inventory (Elementary & Secondary). Follow-up data analysis and systems planning is also available upon request.



For documentation purposes, it is a good idea to have a copy of a certificate from an activity for your files. If the activity that you attend has a print certificate option, please follow these steps to print.

- 1. Log into your Frontline Education (My Learning Plan Account)
- 2. From the home page, the "My Professional Development" should have multiple sections with workshops that you have registered for listed under one:
 - a. Completed
 - b. Enrolled
 - c. Incomplete Pending
- To obtain your completion certificate, the course must be under the **Completed Section**
- 4. Click on the course (blue activity link) you are looking for
- 5. Towards the bottom of the page look for Actions
- 6. Click on Print Certificate
- 7. You should now be able to print or save your completion certificate

WHO?

- Registered and PROFESSIONALLY Certified Classroom Teachers and School Leaders.
- Registered Level III Teaching Assistants.

WHAT?

- 100 Hours of CTLE is required during every five-year registration period.
- At least 15% of PD must address the needs of ELL's. (click HERE for more info)
- Must be delivered by an approved provider.
- You are responsible for keeping track of your hours.





WHERE?



- Professional development must be delivered by an approved provider.
- Wayne-Finger Lakes BOCES is an approved provider.
- Click HERE for a list of approved providers.

HOW?

- Keep a copy of certificates issued by approved providers.
- Click **HERE** to access the state provided template.
- Districts who subscribe to Frontline (formerly known as MyLearningPlan) may have additional options.



WHY?



- At the end of your Registration period, you will be asked to attest to meeting or not having met CTLE requirements on TEACH (click here to access TEACH Online Services).
- You are required to maintain records of your CTLE hours for eight (8) years the five (5) year registration cycle plus three (3) additional years.
