am thoroughly enjoying my first six months in the role as Head of Frensham Schools, getting to know the community and the rhythm of this special place.

The vision and inspiration of Winifred West, so central to Frensham Schools, underlies a mission, ethos and values that resonate entirely with my own educational philosophy, and with what research tells us is important to model for and instil in our students. Miss West's vision, bold and courageous in the social, cultural and political landscape of the early 20th century, remains vitally relevant in 2021.

As we are busily preparing for this year's Birthday Celebrations, the first we have celebrated in person since 2019, I have been reading and reflecting on some of her addresses over the School's 108-year history. She wrote these poignant words, on the occasion of the School's first birthday, June 1st, 1914:

However important the staff and the girls may be, the school is more comprehensive:

It is more intangible More lasting More impersonal than a collection of individuals It has its own soul Its own life And we hope will continue in years to come, (when we individuals are no longer here) An influence making itself felt in the world.

Already I have a very strong sense of the intangible 'soul' and 'life' of Frensham, perhaps most strongly reflected in the Fellowship community. The ties that bind Frensham girls together during their years at school seem to last forever, and often continue through generations, with children and grandchildren following in their mothers', aunts' and grandmothers' footsteps. These cross-generational connections, combined with an open and welcoming school community, make for a very warm, open and welcoming school community.

As a music educator, I was drawn to Frensham's strong music tradition, and it is a joy to begin each day in song with the whole school at Morning Prayers. There is something extremely special about voices being raised together – in unison or with some of the beautiful descant lines enhancing the melody. The symbolism, of young women confidently raising their voices in gratitude and praise, is striking. Whilst we are not yet able to welcome Old Girls back to our Sunday Services, due to COVID restrictions, we are so looking forward to welcoming our first reunion group in over 12 months, the Five Years On Class of 2016.

Fellowship plays such an important part in both the history and the future of Frensham Schools - I look forward to joining with you at the AGM in June and to our strong association over the coming years.

Address to Julie Gillick by Cath Brennan

y speech to you today Julie, is the result of reading 20 years of Chronicle Reports written by you as Head of Frensham and Head of Frensham Schools. Through this, I also came to appreciate that I have been an active member of the Frensham community for 15 of your 20 years, firstly through my niece Matilda Raynolds (2003) and then through my daughters Lucy (2008) and Eliza (2015). Reading your reports, three key themes stood out for

> Firstly – Challenges. Setting challenges and managing challenges. Secondly – *Creating new traditions*

Thirdly – Cementing foundations for future growth

Challenges

You always sought to raise the bar, never one to rest on your laurels. In 2000 you reported on embracing the technology challenge through the implementation of K-12 Information Technology while balancing this with Social Competency, the need for connection and developing emotional intelligence.

In 2008, the focus was on nurturing three significant leadership qualities – tenacity, integrity and resilience. The excellent academic results from the 2008 Year 12 (Lucy's year) placed Frensham 21st in the top 200 schools based on percentage of Band 6 results and was ranked 18th of all the schools based on results in English (the only mandatory subject). These results continue to be matched.

I recall your concerns of the mandated publication of NAPLAN results in 2010 to assist parents in their educational choices. How could other schools be compared to be 'like' Gib Gate and Frensham? Frensham is a small school (300 students) and very large in terms of boarding (70:30). What other schools are like this?

The Evaluating Excellence in Independent Schools (EEIS) project reviewed Frensham, Gib Gate and Sturt and led to clear agreed goals impacting the professional learning of students and staff. As parents we heard often about *meeting the individual learning needs of students*. Other goals were to maintain a growth mindset in a whole of school approach to care and wellbeing, to develop leadership capacity across the school and to build a learning community that is world class and embraces innovation.

2013 – new curriculum and resources to support the STEM programme with Sturt Design Studios developed. 3D design and CAD machines – the girls produced some outstanding work.

In 2017 it was all about innovation and adaption. You wrote, committed to developing in staff and students a spirit of enquiry and a love of learning with a future focus and the capacity to discern.

You managed many challenges outside of your control – floods, fire, drought and in 2009, significant financial crisis. You wrote in recognition of the commitment the parents and members of the extended family made to the education of their daughters as an ongoing priority during this difficult period. In 2016 you supported the whole school, family and friends after the tragic death of Year 12 student Olivia Inglis. And then in your final year as leader of the Schools, a global pandemic!

New Traditions

In your second year, you referred to creating new traditions to complement existing traditions. Introducing Jasper and Bronco (two white Shetland ponies) dressed in purple rugs with green trim emblazoned with the words *Winifred West Schools' Mascots*.

In 2003, introduction of Frensham Studies to the core curriculum for Year 7 students, the Year Eliza commenced.

Acknowledgement that to understand the present it is important to appreciate the past in preparation for the future. We saw the return of the Fleishmann's Deer Sculpture to the Harbison Fountain in 2003. The Blessing of the Pets Service photo in the 2009 Chronicle collage included a cow, hamster, dog, very large goat and guinea pig. What a fitting new tradition to introduce to the school.

Global Studies was introduced to Year 9 students in 2014 to immerse girls in consideration of real-world issues and to inspire them to 'think globally' whilst learning to 'act locally'. I felt this built on the School motto of *In Love Serve One Another*. New sports uniform for the Firsts and Seconds teams in Hockey, Netball and Tennis in 2011. So flash, so modern!

Cementing foundations for growth

Major renovations and development of boarding and learning facilities, along with grounds and gardens continued throughout your tenure at Frensham Schools. The list of new and upgraded facilities is too long to mention. Frensham got a pool – who would have thought that would ever happen!

2013 Centenary Year! *Frensham 100 Years On: A Reflection 1913-2013* editor Susan Flaxman wrote, despite the enormous changes that have occurred in the last 100 years – across the world, in Australia and indeed at Frensham – what has not changed is the ethos of the School, its moral and spiritual core.

So much happened during this year. The Back to Frensham Weekend and the 100th Birthday Weekend were enormous undertakings. Centenary Trail, Centenary Bridge, Centenary Pool project commenced, and Centenary Sculpture installed. What a momentous year.

Values and traditions have been maintained and built on. You have benchmarked Frensham nationally and internationally to meet the current and future needs in the 21st Century.

In closing, I would like to read back to you what you wrote in your first report in 2000: It is important to remind you, as others have noted to me, that one really never leaves Winifred West Schools.

Once touched by the Winifred West Schools' spirit, it seems that one is imbued with a special challenge for life.

1 Susie Arnott (Margaret Taylor, 1959)

Member since 2014

Member since 2020

After leaving Frensham in 2003, Kate completed a

Bachelor of Medical Radiation Science at Charles Sturt University in Wagga. Upon graduation, she obtained a position as a Radiographer at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital while she continued studies for a Masters in Medical Imaging of Computed Tomography (CT) at Sydney University. 
