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Welcome From the Headmaster

Dear Aggie Community,

What an amazing couple of months we have had at Saint Agnes School! We teachers and administrators have had two lonely months without any in-person interactions with students—we miss the students and parents so much. The school building has felt so empty during the April and May months; in fact, it feels like summer break, but without any of the down time that normally comes with it. And as if the consequences of COVID-19 and its economic toll and social isolation were not enough, we have had to finish the school year with the tragic death of George Floyd and several nights of looting and rioting in Minneapolis and St. Paul. We have experienced disruption after disruption to the normal flow of the end of a school year. We have endured it to the best of our ability; thank you for your support—especially your prayers!

I am so proud of the ways in which our Saint Agnes School community has responded to the challenges of a new virus and its attendant job losses, responses of support, and requirement to move to distance learning. I hope you have seen at least a couple of our videos and communiques via email or our Aggie Facebook page. Our teachers have been creating mountains of online content for our students, while balancing the amount of screen time with individual families' needs/abilities to manage.

As you will see by the contents of this issue of the Aggie Archives, Saint Agnes School remains a prolific community in so many ways. Distance learning comes with a learning curve, especially when we believe the best approach to education is live, in color, and in person between teachers and students. We have had to become prolific in creating video content for our students, our families, and our donors. Some of our younger teachers had to teach some of our more seasoned teachers just how to do that. Some faculty members made movies of themselves and their colleagues singing and dancing to a Rick Astley song for the class of 2020. All of them have worked as hard or harder than they did when students were in the building, and without the reward of being in the classroom with their students! Such has been the nature of distance learning, Aggie-style—may its life be short-lived here.

CORONAVIRUS:

An Unexpected Journey

The Minnesota Department of Health began testing for the coronavirus. There were no positive cases in Minnesota.

Parent/Teacher conferences are amended to protect parents, teachers and students. Conference are moved to classrooms to limit the number of people gathering, no shaking hands, and conferences by phone are scheduled for any parent with respiratory illness or compromised immune systems, or for those who have traveled recently by plane. Maintenance team develops procedures in the event of suspected/confirmed COVID-19 presence on campus. Protocols are being established in the event school needs to be shut down, if required/recommended by the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) and/or Center for Disease Control (CDC) in conjunction with the Archdiocese.

Dr. Ferdinandt informs school families that the school is monitoring the Minnesota Department of Public Health (MDH) and the Center for Disease Control (CDC) websites for information and guidance for schools regarding Covid-19.

Recommendation is four-fold: stay home when sick, cover coughs and sneezes with elbows, keep frequently touched surfaces clean, and practice good hand-hygiene (washing hands with soap and water). He asks that parents err on the side of caution when making a decision to send their child(ren) to school if they are not feeling well.

- Governor Walz declares a peacetime state of emergency to ensure the state is able to respond more rapidly to issues as they arrive.
- After the Governor's press conference, it is not recommended to close schools. School is planned to be held as normal the following week but preparations to move to alternative delivery strategies/modes for instruction have begun.

Governor Walz authorizes the temporary closing of all public K-12 schools from March 18 through March 27. Governor Walz orders the closure of bars, restaurants and other public places. These businesses were allowed to serve customers by take-out or delivery orders only. President Trump issued guidelines to limit gatherings of more than 10 people.

Monday, students report and bring all necessary books and curricular materials home at the end of the day in preparation for a possible longer-term closing. Dr. Ferdinandt addresses all students in small groups encouraging them to pray, hope, and do not be afraid. He assures the seniors that he is committed to making sure that they will graduate, and they all prayed together. All sports and activities are postponed. The spring musical is cancelled.

After Governor Walz announces the closure of all public and charter schools on March 18, and news from the Archdiocese that we would need to pause from school this week to plan for distance learning, Dr. Ferdinandt makes the announcement that Saint Agnes School will close on Tuesday, March 17. Being that spring break is scheduled for Mar23-27, school will effectively be closed until March 30. Faculty members will continue to report through the week planning for distance learning beyond spring break if necessary.

Dr Ferdinandt sends a message to all alumni and supporters outlining how the faculty and administrators are preparing for possible longer-term closing and asking for continued prayers. Archbishop Hebda suspends all public Masses. Father Moriarty enlists the help of staff and volunteers to acquire the necessary equipment to begin livestreamed Masses. All meetings, Lenten devotions and activities in the parish are cancelled.

Teachers Zita Larson, Sam Thompson, and Sami Burr launch a weekly *Aggies at Home* electronic newsletter for students in grades 7-12. Weekly student news, challenges, shout outs, craft ideas, and testimonials are geared directly to upper school students.

Dr. Ferdinandt announces that Saint Agnes will move to distance learning on Monday, March 30 lasting through May 1st at least. Links and tutorials are sent to parents and students to familiarize themselves with the distance learning websites. Only essential workers are allowed on campus. Parish and school staff are furloughed, driven by essential functions necessary to facilitate distance learning processes for teachers and students and critical maintenance and finance functions.

Mr. Hendrickson and Mr. Adkins, along with their respective faculty members, create distinctive distance learning platforms in a very truncated time using Outlook Group and Microsoft OneNote and Teams. Platforms are introduced to families to prepare for likely distance learning on March 30. Of highest importance was allowing families to customize their schedule to fit family needs and facilitating distance learning, not online learning, where much of the work could be completed without electronic devices at a time that works best for the family.

Governor Walz extends the stayat-home order through May 3. Bars, restaurants, and other public accommodation closures are extended through May 3.

Typically a time of reenrollment, Dr. Ferdinandt and Mr. Olson discuss online what's changed and what stays the same in admissions, enrollment, tuition agreements and financial aid.

The Holmstadt family not only keeps busy during distance learning, but helps the community by 3D printing ear stress relievers for local health care workers. They get requests for hundreds and send them to local clinics and hospitals.

The show just couldn't go on this year, so on opening night of the spring musical, Director David Johnson sent a message to the cast of "Crazy for You." He applauded them for all the hard work they had already put into the show, the skill level they had attained, and

they had attained, and announced that dates for next year's show, a repeat of "Crazy for You." Governor Walz extends distance learning for public schools until the end of the academic year. He allows some non-critical workers to return to work if they have safety measures in place and their job does not require direct contact with customers. MSHSL and CAA cancel all spring athletics and activities for the remainder of the school year.

Administration members begin a weekly Facebook live event to keep family members and the Saint Agnes community updated on the state of the school, giving them an opportunity to ask questions in real time.



After public schools are closed for the remainder of the school year, and the Archdiocese recommends Catholic schools do the same, Saint Agnes is not ready to give up hope that there can be some final in-person schooling the final week or two of school. Furloughed employees are brought back to work in various capacities either from home, or on campus with social distancing.

After making personal calls to all our families, it is determined that many were experiencing financial hardships due to job loss, furloughs, or reduced hours. The Saint Agnes Coronavirus Assistance Fund is established to help families with groceries, tuition, and other necessities.

Governor Walz extends the stay-at-home order until May 17. Closure of bars, restaurants and other public accommodations is extended until May 17.

After receiving much input and weighing the possibilities, risks, and details necessary to make a prudential judgment, Fr. Moriarty, Dr. Ferdinandt, and administrators decide to continue distance learning through the remainder of the school year for all students in grades Preschool-12, with a school year end date of May 29, as originally planned. All senior year activities (including Academic Convocation, Senior Banquet, and Baccalaureate/Graduation) will be (re)scheduled during the week immediately following Memorial Day (i.e., 5/26-29).

With no students in school, the Sisters perform the traditional May crowning during the livestreamed all-school Mass. Families are encouraged to have their own May crowning or devotionals at home.

Aggies on the Run week! Along with the students, the Aggie Bull is up for the challenge of the yearly mile run test. Miss Ennis, 6th grade teacher and track coach, challenges the community to a virtual 5K run.

senior class. They are invited to attend in "drivein" style while the rest of the classes participate from home.

Stay-at-home order is allowed to expire on May 17. Peacetime emergency is extended through June 12. Temporary closure of bars, restaurants, and other public accommodations extended until May 31. Businesses may open with a covid-19 response plan in place to protect workers and customers. Small gatherings of 10 or less family and friends is permitted.

Governor Walz meets with Archbishop Bernard Hebda and other Faith leaders. Governor Walz prohibits gathering of 10 or more people at inside or outside worship services. Archbishop Hebda and the Minnesota bishops announce they will allow parishes to open on May 26 despite the Governor's order.

> Dr. Ferdinandt announces that the 2020 Baccalaureate Mass will take place on May 29th as previously scheduled with safety measures in place, as a fitting way to honor the graduation class and end the school year.

A car parade is planned to honor the seniors, along with an outdoor, socially distanced assembly, in order for faculty member to pay tribute to each senior. In the aftermath of George Floyd's unjust treatment and death, looting and violence breaks out a bit over 2 miles away in St. Paul's Midway area, causing the immediate cancellation only minutes after it has begun.

Continued unrest in the community results in postponement of the Baccalaureate Mass until mid-June, unfortunately after the Archives goes to print. The last day of school for all Saint Agnes students is one of the strangest and saddest ever experienced, yet the Saint Agnes community remains ever faithful and resilient.

The Sisters invite families to pray the rosary with them in their chapel via Facebook to ask for strength for our community and peace for our families who have been most affected.

Lower school virtual field trip day! Distance learning takes a new turn as families are asked to take a virtual, or live, field trip instead of academic work. Lists of opportunities are compiled for families. Virtual ideas include museums, monuments, aquariums, National parks, and zoos. Bike trips, hikes, scenic drives and state parks are also encouraged.

After meeting with faith leaders, Governor Walz announces that places of worship can open on May 27 at 25% capacity, with social distancing and other health guidelines in place. The Baccalaureate Mass preparations continue.

Families are asked to return books and supplies using curbside drop off. Students items left in classrooms and lockers are also bagged and returned at the same time. Faculty members sort and catalogue books in an effort to wrap up the school year. The motto adopted by the school rings even truer, "Pray, hope, and don't worry. Worry is useless. God is merciful and will hear your prayer." St. Padre Pio, pray for us.






MASS, CONFESSIONS AND DEVOTIONS During the Pandemic

The faithful are aware of and can sense the presence of God in our churches, especially the presence of our Lord, Jesus Christ in our Catholic Tabernacles. For over 40 days Saint Agnes Church and School have been eerily empty. Not hearing the pitter-pat of footsteps in the hallways is very unsettling when these

buildings should be a hive of activity. To be separated from our sacred places and from our fellow worshipers, and most of all, to be separated from the true presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist has been a unique loss and challenge.

Yet, just as learning is occurring at a distance, so is worship. And a new kind of presence is becoming more common place, the virtual presence of the faithful attending Mass via livestream. I am grateful for the many employees and parish volunteers who immediately stepped forward to offer their knowledge and equipment to make livestreaming of

Masses a possibility. We used different devices and techniques of transmitting audio and various web-based platforms in order to offer our at-home families a better picture and clearer audio. Interestingly, now people from all over the nation can see what is happening in

a beautiful Tyrolean Baroque church in Frogtown!

Both Deacon Nathan Allen and I recorded audio only podcasts of St. Alphonse Liguori's Stations of the Cross. Individuals can pray along with us in their cars or families can join us in their homes, which was especially well received during the Lenten season. As expected, Deacon's version is more popular than mine! I've always said I have a face made for radio and a voice made for silent pictures.

In April, we began livestreaming an all-

school Mass on Wednesday mornings so our students could continue the routine of weekly school Masses and make a spiritual communion along with their classmates. By Easter, church and local civil

authorities allowed outdoor Masses while still requiring precautionary regulations, the most significant of which was not being able to distribute Holy Communion. The north terrace of Saint Agnes church has provided a beautiful backdrop for Holy Mass, albeit more exposed to the weather. At least the distance between the flock and the Good Shepherd has been reduced!

A special weekday "drive-in" Mass was offered for our senior class in mid-May. Our seniors have had their last year of




high school upended like none other. Being able to gather in prayer in their cars alongside their classmates, while the rest of the school tuned in from home, gave them a small sense of community and spiritual belonging.

In these unprecedented times, human creativity and technical know-how has reduced to some extent the separation caused by the precautions. But to be clear, Christ wants us to personally encounter

Him in the sacraments. Most Holy Communion cannot be received in a virtual manner. Hopefully, this time has allowed people not to take the sacraments for granted and help them hunger more for the graces obtained from the mysteries of the Faith.

Junior Brigid Boyle has joined an elite list of female basketball players at Saint Agnes, the 1000-point club. And she still has one more season to play. I called Brigid on the phone, since we're social distancing these days, and asked her about her experiences as a student-athlete.

The first organized sports team Brigid played on was soccer in kindergarten with the Eagan Athletic Association, because everyone plays soccer in Eagan! "The following year I joined the basketball program, and boy, was I terrible. But I enjoyed the sport and basketball became my passion."

From 4th-7th grade she played basketball for both Eagan traveling and Saint Agnes. It was not an easy schedule, but she loved the game and wanted to play as much as she could. The summer before 8th grade the varsity coach saw potential in this wiry teen and decided to pull her up to the varsity squad, where she has played the last 4 years. Once the winter season ends in early March, she's lacing back up a few weeks later to start her AAU Club season, which goes through July. She has played AAU basketball for four years with the Minnesota Stars out of Bloomington, MN. Girls on her team are from all over the state and they travel to tournaments around the country to play the best of the best. This has been a difficult spring, as many of the tournaments have been cancelled and there are no team practices being held. She tells me, "I miss my teammates and coaches, and this will be my last season to play club ball. But I have been working out at home, running, lifting weights, and of course, shooting hoops in the driveway with my sisters."

After playing four years of varsity basketball, Boyle tells me this season has been filled with rebuilding and rewarding experiences. "It has been both my most exciting and my most challenging season thus far. I hadn't realized I was so close to making 1,000 points when we were playing Cristo Rey. I wasn't feeling well that day at school, even as game time approached, and my focus was on winning. So, it surprised me when my teammates and the fans jumped up and cheered and surrounded me on the court after I made the shot. When the feelings sank in, and I had time to reflect, I realized that if you put in the time and work hard, you can accomplish great things. The hard work on my driveway, being pushed and encouraged by my Dad, it was paying off."

Though hitting 1,000 was very exciting, it was a challenging season for the team. They struggled with a young and inexperienced roster and the number of players was significantly down. Those two factors led to difficult games as the girls continued to be plagued with illnesses and injuries. Brigid, herself, had to push through with ankle problems and knee issues. But even in disappointment, there were things learned. "Failures don't change who you are but give you a chance to appreciate the good moments even more. I realized I can only control what I am able to, and I still need to give 100% and put forth my best effort to be the best version of myself."

It was during middle school that Brigid first dreamed of playing in college, like her mom, who played at St. Ben's. She attended Ruth Sinn's Tommie Pride basketball camp at the University of St. Thomas and had so much fun interacting with the college coaches and players. "I saw what great people they were and how

much they loved basketball and just being with one another. I could see myself in their shoes and it pushed me to improve my game and strive to play in college."

"Playing in the AAU circuit has exposed me to college recruiters, and I was approached this past fall by Wayne State College in Wayne, NE. I liked the size of the school and the Biology program, but what impressed me the most was how the small city rallies around the school's sports and the support they give their student-athletes. When visiting campus, I went out to lunch with some of the players at the local diner and the waitstaff knew the players by name and welcomed me as "the new girl". They have great attendance at games and the basketball team has maintained a high GPA the last couple of years. I was looking for an academic challenge, as I am interested in

becoming a physical therapist. It checked off many boxes in what I am looking for in a school and program."



"I also liked the fact that Wayne State is just far away enough away without being too far. They play in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Every game will be a challenge and I am excited to play at a higher level. Many of the teams in our conference are in MN so family and friends can still see me play. I plan to sign my letter of intent this upcoming fall."

When asked about her experiences as a student-athlete, Brigid remarks, "Sports have taught me a lot of valuable life lessons such as perseverance, discipline, and leadership. It has forced me out of my comfort zone and given me confidence. But most of all, I love the relationships I have built with my coaches and teammates throughout the years. I have met so many great people in the basketball community and I will cherish those friendships forever!"

From a shy, wiry 8th grade player to a college-bound confident athlete, Brigid has great things ahead in her future. A strong work ethic, passion, high academic expectations, and drive to succeed will reap her many rewards. Lucky for us, we get to see her play one more year as an Aggie before she leaves to become a Wildcat.





SAINT AGNES COMPLETES FIRST YEAR IN NEW SKYLINE CONFERENCE

Saint Agnes left the Tri-Metro Conference where it has been a member since 1988. "It was sad to leave the Tri Metro Conference" said AD Mike Streitz, "We have built great relationships and rivalries with the student bodies and administrations of those schools but this is a move we needed and were excited to make given the current direction of the Tri Metro Conference."

Why Change Conferences? For years, the Tri
Metro was a perfect fit for Saint Agnes until the
schools that had similar enrollments- Blake, Breck,
Minnehaha Academy, Mounds Park Academy, St.
Paul Academy and Providence Academy- left to join
the Independent Metro Athletic Conference (IMAC)
leaving Saint Agnes and Concordia Academy as the
two smallest schools in the conference.

Current Tri Metro Conference schools average 328 more students than Saint Agnes and Concordia Academy. "The move to the new conference was in the best interest for our school and its students and will provide a place where our students can succeed and be challenged in a conference with other similarly-sized schools," said Streitz.

What will stay the same? Post season play did not change. Those assignments are governed by the Minnesota State High School League (MSHSL). Football continues with District play. Districts replaced conferences 3 years ago to place schools with similar enrollments in the same group. Wrestling continues to participate as an associate member of the Tri Metro Conference. The boys and girls swimming co-ops and the boys and girls hockey co-ops will remain as is.

The eight schools in the new conference are Concordia Academy and Saint Agnes from the Tri Metro Conference, Maranatha, St. Croix Prep, New Life Academy and Trinity at River Ridge from the Minnesota Christian Athletic Association, and Cristo Rey Jesuit and Nova Classical Academy from the Twin Cities Athletic Conference.



This year's high school band has something special to brag about. They have earned a superior rating for the 4th consecutive year at the MN State High School League's Region 4A Large Group music contest this past February.

Led by Mr. Rick Peters, members of the band have been preparing pieces from the list of required music put out by the MSHSL to perform before a panel of three judges. Judges are professional musicians and music educators who have been trained and tested in order to qualify as a judge. The band is judged on eight categories: tone, technique, intonation, articulations, interpretation, choice of music for the group, emotional involvement and other factors. With five possible points per category, a band must score at least 35 points from two judges in order to receive a superior rating. Not only did they record over 35 points from two judges this year, but the last three years they scored over 35 from all three judges! Saint Agnes was one of only four schools in region 4A to receive a superior rating.

Besides competing in the large group contest, the Saint Agnes band presents two major concerts each year and plays at homecoming and pep assemblies. They also hold concerts at local elementary schools and are looking to organize a band trip next spring. Though winning awards and public performances are highlights of being in the band, the intangible perks are just as important. In addition to learning to read music and play an instrument, life lessons such as learning to work as a team and understanding you are a part of a greater whole are important to discover. Students need patience and stamina to stay with the piece until it is perfected, and, of course, they make life-long friends.

Mr. Peters pointed out that there are unique complexities for a band director. "I generally have 35-40 students in the high school band. The characteristics, strengths and weaknesses of each group changes from year to year. Being able to pick the right music that works well and at the same time challenges an entire group, that often has many different levels of ability, takes time and creativity. Think of it as being a coach. Do I put in a system for my basketball team that is more of a running game or ball control game? Small ball in baseball or wait for the big home run because you have a lot of sluggers? It depends on the personnel and talents. Do I highlight the woodwinds or brass or percussion? Which section is stronger?"

Mr. Peters must be doing something right. As a young Hamline College grad, one of his first band director positions was right here at Saint Agnes from 1979-1981. It was in 1981 that the band won its last superior rating. (Keep in mind the band was defunct for a number of years.) Mr. Peters pursued his profession on the east coast before returning to Saint Agnes in 2015. One year later, the band began its four-year run of superior ratings. Coincidence? Perhaps. But Saint Agnes is happy to have him back for the latter part of his career.

"I love being at Saint Agnes and teaching such great students. Working with an administration, faculty and staff that I have the utmost respect for has been a joy and I couldn't have picked a better place to end my career... whenever that occurs."

A special shout to the seniors who became the first Aggie fouryear band students to receive four consecutive superior ratings as members of our Saint Agnes band: Julia Hamlin, Kelsey Miller, Andrew Brownell, Timmy Rosno, Danielle McLaughlin, Jacob Coyne, Kelly Gomez, and Luke Wallisch.





It's Time to Give Back

Mike Parizino never imagined he'd find himself where he is today. A State Champion hurdler and finalist in the MN State High School Track Tournament in both his junior and senior year, as well as a 4-year football and basketball player at Saint Agnes, the first memories that come to his mind when looking back on his Aggie days were the camaraderie of the football team, the mental toughness taught by Coach John Heller and the homecoming festivities. He also fondly remembers the head cheerleader from St. Bernard's! Dating someone from the arch-rival school could get a boy in serious trouble with his friends, and though he kept the relationship hidden as long as possible, he couldn't deny his feelings and the Bulldog cheerleader eventually became his wife. With four grown children and a successful business, Mike and Mary Parizino decided it was time to give back.

One of Mike's favorite teachers in high school was Mr. Joe Silvia. Not only was Mr. Silvia a good teacher, but he found the senior year business class material very interesting. It was also the first investment Mike ever made. Each member of the class brought in \$10 and researched companies in which they could invest. Though Mr. Silvia had always helped the students make profitable choices, the market didn't cooperate that year and the stock the class had purchased saw a loss in value. Feeling badly, Mr. Silvia bought the stock from the kids and took the hit himself. The sign of a dedicated teacher.

After graduation, Mike earned his bachelor's degree in business and finance from St. Thomas University and quickly landed a job with St. Paul Companies writing surety bonds for contractors. A few years later he moved to Philadelphia, attended the master's program at Villanova and was employed by Cigna Insurance Co. A relocation landed him in California where he has lived since 1990. He eventually left the insurance side and became a broker, writing policies for large contractors such as major hospitals, bridge projects (Stillwater bridge and I-35W bridge), and sports stadiums. He became a partner in a private equity company about nine years ago.

As his career and investments improved and his children grew into adulthood, he realized it was time to give back to those who helped him get to where he is today. He credits Saint Agnes School, its teachers, and the life-long friends he made there, to be at the top of the list. He and his wife proceeded to set up a donor advised charitable giving

It was both his love for athletics and his high-school friendships that steered him toward investing in the athletic department at Saint


Agnes. He had been gathering his buddies to play in the Aggie Open golf tournament for a number of years and invited them to relive the glory days at his Wisconsin cabin. When reminiscing about the number of talented athletes Saint Agnes produced in the late 70s and 80s, and the lack of equipment and enviable uniforms, Mike decided that is where he would like to show his support. He vividly remembers showing up at the State high school track meet, along with the Saint Agnes relay team, in baggy gray sweatpants. Looking around at the other big schools with their matching track jacket and pant sets, bags, and footwear made him conscious of just how little

> the Saint Agnes athletes had. By race time, all the schools ended up stripping down to similar shorts and t-shirts, but the image of those fancy track suits made an impression.

> Mike has great respect for Saint Agnes Athletic Director Mike Streitz and the work he has done over the last 15 years and wanted to support those efforts. He has made a \$250,000 commitment, paid over 10 years, to be the major sponsor of the Aggie Open Golf Tournament in support of Aggie athletics and is directing those funds to be used for uniform upgrades, specialty equipment, and other items that may be outside the athletic budget.

On top of COVID-19 making a worldwide impact, the civil unrest and peaceful protesting in the aftermath of the unjust death of George Floyd has directly affected our nation and communities. With her limited resources, she agonized about how she would provide food for her family and was concerned about her ability to keep her high school son at Saint Agnes. We were able to deliver groceries and gift cards and assured her that we would do all that we could to keep him in our building. Not just these families, but so many lives have been changed forever.

Lives changed forever, needing YOU now more than ever. Miss Minnesota Honors **Mrs. Donna May**

We had the great pleasure of recognizing Mrs.
Donna May as the 2020 Red & White honoree.
Mrs. May served as elementary religion and music teacher at Saint Agnes from 1994-1998, and junior

and senior high choral director from 2002-2017. She took our choral program to new heights and traveled around the world with our students—singing everywhere from Carnegie Hall to the Vatican. She directed our Children's Choir, continues to direct our parish Chamber Choir, has worked with our spring

musical leads, and has built a well-reputed choral program during the course of her tenure.

Father Moriarty and Kathryn Kueppers, 2016 and the reigning Miss Minnesota, put together a few words to "sing" the praises of Mrs. May. Here are a few excerpts:

- Over 20 years of dedicated service to our church and school are evident. She gave so many young people the opportunity to be united with some of the deepest mysteries of the Faith.
- I knew that every day when I walked in her room, I could look at my sheet music and not necessarily

study religion, but I could feel it and follow the notes and words wherever they took me. When you're at that formative age, religion can be one of the hardest things to conceptualize. So, when it is put into the context of notes, and sounds, and tone, and diction, we start to feel it, believe it.

• We felt safe in Mrs. May's class. Safe to mess up that one note, safe to express ourselves, and most notably for me, safe to explore my faith. And as we

> were learning all of this deep, metaphorical stuff about ourselves, we had fun while doing it!

 Mrs. May exemplified an amazing ability of helping her students give of their very best. She encouraged; challenged; remonstrated; cajoled; demanded; bribed and, in the spirit of her
 Sicilian heritage, even

occasionally made them "an offer they couldn't refuse!"

 Mrs. May made us feel capable of greatness. She challenged us to be better versions of ourselves every day.

Mrs. May inspired students to express their gifts through sacred and secular music, instilling in them an ever-increasing interest in giving glory to God through music. Her powerful personality and unwavering commitment to the Catholic Faith endure in the tradition of Sacred Music that has made such a joyful noise here at Saint Agnes.



Alumni Spotlight



Kathryn Kueppers, '16

Speaker. Social Advocate. Jazz Vocalist. Culinarian. Future Educator. Miss America Enthusiast.

This past June, Kathryn Rose Kueppers, class of 2016, was crowned Miss Minnesota 2019.

Kathryn is the daughter of Vicki (Plaster) Kueppers, who was crowned Miss Minnesota in 1983. They became only the 11th mother/daughter pair in the 99-year history of the Miss America Organization to have both won their state titles. Though her mother never pushed her into competition, she did help open her eyes to outstanding opportunities. Kathryn was 14 years old when she first started competing in the Miss America's Outstanding Teen Program for the chance at scholarships, occasions to sing and cultivate her voice, and improve her pubic speaking.

The experience paid off. Kathryn used her talent as a jazz vocalist and became a double preliminary winner, capturing both the talent award and the evening wear/social impact statement award. These honors contributed to over \$29,000 in educational scholarships she has won since her first competition in 2017.

Since being crowned in June, Kathryn has travelled across the state and beyond representing the Minnesota brand of Miss America through speaking engagements, appearances, and community service. She volunteers at a multitude of public events such as parades, festivals, charity walks, and many other community activities. In a word, Miss Minnesota is the ultimate volunteer. She is especially grateful for the time she has spent visiting sick children at Gillette Hospital, a Children's Miracle Network Hospital. She even raises funds for Children's Miracle Network by selling her own line of hand-crafted earrings and candle votives.

She also has used the year to promote her social impact initiative, *The Invisible Crown. The Invisible Crown* highlights all of the women who participate in the pageant and make a difference in their communities long after giving up their title. She markets and promotes the Miss America Organization, and is a mentor and role model, inspiring young women to get involved, do service, and make a difference.

Kathryn credits habits learned at Saint Agnes with keeping her grounded. She starts each morning in a quiet place and offers the day up to the Lord. Much like starting each class with prayer, she prays before every appearance. She also relies on the self-discipline she learned in choir with Mrs. May and the great work ethic instilled by Mr. Whalen. "His was the most challenging and rewarding class I ever had. Yes, he was teaching us history, but so many life lessons were taught right alongside. I learned that being well-rounded is just as important as being smart."

Though the last few months of her reign had been disrupted with the coronavirus outbreak, Kathryn had been busy filming, writing, and preparing for the next young lady to be crowned Miss Minnesota. However, an announcement in mid-May that Miss America 2020 would be postponed until 2021 gives Kathryn another year as Miss Minnesota and more opportunities to volunteer, meet people, and promote The Invisible Crown. She is grateful for the experiences she has had, the scholarship money she has won, and the people she has met along the way. Even with the additional year, Kathryn will resume her studies this fall at Minnesota State University-Mankato, pursuing her degree in Family and Consumer Science Education to add to her Culinary Arts degree. She hopes to work in the area of food education and literacy, teaching life skills to students while continuing to inspire others to give back to their community.

Miss Minnesota is one of 51 licensed state organizations making up the Miss America Organization. The Miss America Organization works to empower young women through education and service. Miss America candidates contribute tens of thousands of community service hours annually and have raised more the \$17 million for Children's Miracle Network Hospitals and Miss America scholarships since 2007.
