## AP Language and Composition Summer Assignment 2021

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## **Rationale:**

## Assignment:

- The Spirit Catches You and You Fall Down by Anne Fadiman
- The Warmth of Other Suns by Isabel Wilkerson
- Beautiful Boy: A Father's Journey Through His Son's Addiction by David Sheff
- 2. Identify a central theme, problem, or current issue that emerges from the book.
- 3. After reading the book, write a 1-2 page letter to your teacher in which you address the following questions. Please write in narrative form rather than a list of numbered questions. You will turn this in during the third class of the year.
  - a. Why did you choose this book from the list?
  - b. What are your NEW understandings or insights about the theme? How are you thinking about this problem or issue differently than you were before? What questions came up for you while reading this book? What would you like to learn more about after reading this book?
  - c. Would you recommend this book be on next year's summer reading list? Why or why not?
  - d. What are your academic goals for AP English Language and Composition?
  - e. Is there anything you would like me to know about you that it would be helpful for me to know right away that might help me better understand and support you as a student?
  - f. Anything else you want to share or comment on as we head into another school year?
