

Message from Julianne Snider

I vividly recall the afternoon I interviewed with Evelyn Shirk, Principal and Sally Bolter, a then retiring English teacher at Wylie. Halfway through the interview, Evelyn asked if I was applying for the 8th grade English job. "No, I'm applying for the 7th grade science position." We all laughed and I was hired as a science teacher. I have been laughing with colleagues and administrators ever since. I am most proud of the rich collaboration I have enjoyed with so many in our common goal to help children.

Without my supportive administrators who respected my autonomy, I would have never been able to accomplish programs I am most proud of. After six years teaching science, I created a Focus class at Mill Creek called S4, or Skills and Strategies for Student Success (Sara Dansky, one of my many mentors, came up with that!). Ms. Shirk allowed me to grow the program to include research teachings by librarian Linda Livingstone and the technology teachings of focus teacher Sue McCarthy. The inclusion of Linda allowed Sue and I to divide our two Focus classes between three instructors. Linda taught kids how to research, I taught kids how to question and compose, and Sue taught kids how to create a research essay on the computer. Our program was a great success. The three of us even took our show on the road to conferences.

I am also proud to have developed a Book Club program at Mill Creek, engaging students with choice and a simple approach (within the reach of all students) to literature analysis. It allowed students to find fun in reading and enabled every student to actively share findings and opinions in their small group discussion.

The last five years of my DCS career, Dr. Timmis gave me the opportunity to be the lead teacher in developing Dexter Alternative High School. I was well supported by my administrator, Ken Koenig, but I was free to design and carry out our mission with great latitude. When I asked for more social work support, <u>Barb Santo provided it to me</u>, and more importantly, to our students. In five years, we have graduated thirty-six of forty-four students, or 82%; we are still working to get one more over the finish line!. I would describe my collaboration with special education teacher Katie Heikkila, and social worker, Shelley Rychener, as a blitz-krieg assault upon whatever forces keep students from their own success. I will miss the high energy spent to reach and lead our students, and the endless laughs that keep day-to-day life fun, sometimes hilarious, for us and for the kids, whether they appreciate it or not.
