The district has been piloting a School Breakfast Program at two of the elementary buildings since September.

Due to the efforts of Jill Orris, our Food Service Manager, her staff, and the building principals, this program has been well received and very successful, and we are going to replicate it at all elementary buildings.

Our goal now is to have a breakfast program in place at each school by the 3rd quarter.

Facilities Update




Newly Constructed Classroom in HS Media Center

Our Construction projects continue to move forward. As of 10/22/14, Rademaker-Miller road is open to the public and the contractor is addressing the parking lot change order for the Transportation office. This work should be completed prior to the Thanksgiving break.

The Middle School work is moving along well, and they are on schedule. The main office area and mechanical rooms will be fully enclosed by the end of the year. This will allow the interior work to continue through the winter to maintain the schedule. The gym walls are also going up, and we may be able to install the roof in this area to accomplish additional work this winter.

The High School construction plans are in place and the bids are due on 11/7/14. The final plans will be determined once the base bid amounts are known and the remaining available funds are allocated towards the alternate items we have included in the bids.
