MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT_



Dear Board:

One year ago, our world and certainly school community was turned upside down. March 12, 2021 marks the one-year anniversary of school closures across the country and around the globe and set us down a path we had never traveled. March 17, 2021 marks the one-year anniversary of our launch of full virtual learning and the beginning of the innovative instructional delivery we comprehensively implemented throughout the year. Looking back, it has been quite a journey. Looking back, it has been a time of uncertainty along with new discoveries. Through it all, God's presence has been felt and, even through difficult times, we have each personally and as a Christian school community realized comfort in the reassurance that His hand has been at work and knowing all things hold together through Him.

As we look forward, we do so with confidence that He will guide our paths. As an administrative team, we continue to discuss ways we can be sources of encouragement to families and students and we seek opportunities to return to our more typical routines. Since January 1, Grand Rapids Christian Schools has seen a total of only eight (8) known positive Covid cases in grades PS-8 (none at Rockford Christian and the Evergreen Campus!). Though there has been a bit of an uptick at the high school, the majority of those cases were contained within our Boys Basketball team. Many of our faculty and staff members have been fully vaccinated and we have definitely turned a corner.

I share this to say that, as we work with the health department and follow CDC guidelines, we recognize new opportunities to slowly relax several of the restrictions that have guided our mitigation efforts since we began school last August. At the elementary level, masks will now become optional while students are outdoors at recess. Participants at meetings will no longer be required to wear masks if each participant has been fully vaccinated. We have moved to a three-foot rather than six-foot social distance rule in PS - 8th grade when identifying close contacts when a student tests positive. I continue to meet weekly with county superintendents and the health department to review health circumstances and health and safety guidelines. And we closely monitor seven-day averages throughout the county in order to track the downward trend we have been praying to see.

It has been a wonderful year in spite of the challenges we have faced. I am thankful for our faculty and staff for their incredible efforts this year. I am thankful for our parents who have persevered and supported us throughout the past 12 months. And I am thankful for you and the support and wisdom you have provided as we navigated the year together.

Monday night's board meeting will focus on looking forward. We will provide a more detailed review of Go Forth, our 100-year anniversary celebration and spend time reviewing each of the five goals of the initiative we are hoping to publicly undertake in the fall. Our meeting begins at 6:00 p.m., will be held in person, and will be in the Hub. I will send out a Zoom invite in the event board members are not able to participate in person.

Enjoy the start of the spring season! Looking forward to seeing you on Monday night.

This early start will provide us with the time we need to carefully consider the qualities and characteristics needed for board service going forward. STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL 2

BRAD MOCKABEE — GRCHS PRINCIPAL

We normally return from Christmas break and enjoy our two-week term, *Winterim*, where students take unique courses, intern in the community, or travel the world. This year we postponed *Winterim* until the two weeks leading up to spring break in an effort to maintain more community partnerships. We are excited to see how our students discover new passions and talents over those two weeks!

After nearly one year of research, GRCHS will transition to a more robust learning management system called Canvas in the fall. We began formal training at our February 18 and 19 professional development sessions. Canvas' website summarizes their product in the following way: "Canvas LMS is an open and reliable web-based software that allows institutions to manage digital learning, educators to create and present online learning materials and assess student learning, and students to engage in courses and receive feedback about skill development and learning achievement." It is a big transition for our staff, but we are confident that it will be a good thing for our students!

Throughout the months of January and February, GRCHS students began the course selection process for 2021-2022. Our counselors meet with students both in groups and individually to consider the best courses for the following year. Our process is completely student-centered, and our master schedule will be created based on the needs of our students.

SARA SETH — GRCMS PRINCIPAL

In February, the middle school staff was blessed to attend professional development led by Dr. Mike Ruyle, who works for Solution Tree. He has served as a classroom teacher, athletic coach, school principal, program director, university professor, and professional development presenter over a 30-year career. Mike came to share with the middle school staff the philosophy around the use of proficiency scales to drive student learning. We are excited to consider how this could benefit student achievement as we move forward. Mike shared a positive mindset on teaching and learning that was welcomed by both staff and administrators. We look forward to seeing how this will impact curriculum work in the months ahead.

Throughout this year, teachers at Rockford Christian have implemented new ways to leverage the outdoors in teaching grade-level essential learnings. Mr. Phil Warners, our Director of Outdoor Education, has collaborated with teachers on specific lessons and units, as well as developing specific outdoor learning spaces for each grade level. During professional development in February, the Rockford Christian Staff hiked, snowshoed, and cross country skied around campus as they toured each outdoor classroom and shared ideas about how to use and improve each space.

We are currently at 81% of the \$1.7M goal for the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

We are incredibly grateful for these contributions to date and extremely thankful for the hundreds of parents, grandparents, staff, alumni, and friends who partner with GRCS to make an investment in our students and further demonstrate their commitment to making Christian education accessible. THANK YOU!

A communication was sent to all donors who've contributed the first half of the fiscal year. This included a THANK YOU postcard and video sent via email. The communication highlighted what we've been able to accomplish this school year through donor support.

Because of donor support:

- We provided \$2.9M in tuition assistance to 514 families representing 860 students, averaging \$3,375 per student.
- We added staff to provide additional instructional support for students of all learning backgrounds.
- We secured additional and innovative technologies to ensure access and deliver excellent instruction to both in-person and virtual learners.
- We increased targeted professional development for faculty and staff from 30 hours a year to 42 hours a year.

AMY ORR — EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF ADMISSIONS AND MARKETING

Having hosted our preschool and kindergarten admissions events in December and January, our team's focus for early childhood shifted to registration in February. We are encouraged by the fact that preschool and kindergarten registration numbers currently meet or exceed projections. Now, our focus has turned to converting all of the registrations into Continuous Enrollment Contracts.

Upcoming admission events include four more Future Eagle Days in April and May at GRCHS, Virtual Showcase at GRCMS on March 18, and four visit days at GRCHS in April and May — two specifically for Ada Christian 8th graders.

The Continuous Enrollment opt-out deadline was February 20. To date, we have received 64 opt outs for next year as well as three contract suspensions. Admissions staff continue to follow up with families who are on suspended contracts to confirm their enrollment for 2021/22, connect with current preschool students who have not yet registered for next year, and contact current 8th grade students who have not yet submitted a course request for GRCHS.

In addition to having sent Continuous Enrollment contracts to new preschool and kindergarten students, we have also sent them to Ada Christian 8th graders who have scheduled for next year as well as to all applicants whose application for admission has been approved. To date, we have received 134 contracts for new students PS-12th grade.

Our work continues. Inquiries continue to come in at a steady pace. We expect elementary, middle, and high school inquiries to increase over the spring and summer, perhaps later than normal, as parents finish the year at their current school and look ahead to 2021/22 with a bit of a wait-and-see attitude with regard to COVID protocols. The admissions team remains committed to providing excellent customer service to all families who inquire, providing opportunities for families to see and experience our schools, and to doing all we can to achieve the projected enrollment goals set before us.

STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL 5

Ensure a business model for financial sustainability that supports the educational program and advances the mission of Granc Rapids Christian Schools.

JIM PRIMUS — CFO

Through the first eight months of the 2020-21 fiscal year, the GRCS Operating Budget continues to track well with respect to both budgeted Revenues and Expenses. The budget includes an Operating Reserve of \$1,700,000, which we hope to use only to address surprise expenses that sometimes occur.

GRCS continues to work with Macatawa Bank, Beene Garter, and the SBA on the PPP Loan Forgiveness application. The SBA requested GRCS resubmit the Forgiveness Application without including Eagle Impact payroll costs. If the Loan is not fully forgiven, GRCS will apply for the 1st PPP Loan for Eagle Impact and apply for forgiveness of that loan at the same time.

GRCS has been working on additional funding opportunities it qualifies for as it relates to the health pandemic. GRCS qualifies for the Employee Retention Credit (ERC) and is working alongside Synergi (specializing in tax credit and incentive recovery) in the application process. Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools (EANS) is available to GRCS and other non-public schools who did not apply for the 2nd PPP Loan. GRCS Business Office staff will continue to work on the application process and keep the Finance Committee, and GRCS BOT informed as it learns more.

TOM DEJONGE — SUPERINTENDENT

Our search for a new Chief Advancement Officer is well underway. Brain Jensen, consultant from Vanderbloemen, recently confirmed the posting is <u>live</u> and, while applicants were initially slow to reach out, individuals are beginning to make contact.

The position has been posted nationally, including on the CESA, CSI, LinkedIn, and Christian School Employment websites. Brian reports that he has also begun to reach out within his network to bring the position to others' attention.

Brian will travel to Grand Rapids to meet with me in person on March 29 for an update and recap of the process and his conversations up to that point. I am looking forward to connecting with him at that time and will provide additional board updates as the search proceeds throughout the spring season.
