STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL 2

Ensure exemplary and aligned PS-12th grade Christian education across all schools that is taught by teachers who embrace mastery and productive Christian citizenship for all students.

BRAD MOCKABEE — GRCHS PRINCIPAL

We commit to high levels of learning for all students at Grand Rapids Christian. This means that we encourage all students to consider taking AP classes. This year, nearly half of our students took at least one of our 15 AP classes, giving them the opportunity to experience a college-level course and potentially earn college credit.

This summer, many GRCS educators will participate in a workshop called "Teaching as a Christian Practice." This workshop is taught by David Smith, Professor of Education and Director of the Kuyers Institute for Christian Teaching and Learning at Calvin University. There are many layers to Christian education, but this workshop focuses on how our faith impacts our pedagogy. It asks the question, "How does our faith impact the way we teach?" We are thankful for this partnership and for the opportunity for many of our faculty to be refreshed and to refocus their work over these two weeks.

GRCHS doesn't shut down for the summer! During the month of June, students continue learning in our Summer Session. Nearly 200 students will take one of our seven Summer Session workshops or classes. Taking summer classes gives students flexibility when creating semester schedules, allowing them to add electives or other courses that might typically be difficult to schedule.

SARA SETH — GRCMS PRINCIPAL

There are two significant projects that our seventh and eighth graders participate in as they wind down the school year. Our 7th graders work very hard in both their science and English language arts classes to research and present a health topic of interest or importance to them. Through this final cross-curricular project, students learn how to do accurate research, put their research into clear written form, fine-tune their presentation skills, collaborate with classmates while learning about an important health condition.

The 8th graders are asked to bring together their learning throughout the year by making a number of cross-curricular connections to a chosen theme. The students are challenged to review their notes from their 8th-grade classes, dig deep into what they have learned, and make meaningful connections to an important theme they took away from their 8th-grade year. As their final task in middle school, students present their theme, visuals, and class connections to an 8th-grade teacher. It is a well-designed project that helps prepare students with important skills for their continued learning in high school.

BEN BUURSMA — ROCKFORD PRINCIPAL

We are grateful for faculty, staff, students, and families who all worked together to make in-person learning possible this year. We are even more grateful that we could still learn in person, but outside of school! Off-campus trips at Rockford Christian provide an invaluable opportunity for experiential learning opportunities. Our 4th graders spent a week at John Ball Zoo studying a specific animal; 5th graders worked together for three days in the woods at Camp Roger; 6th graders explored Sleeping Bear Dunes; 7th graders camped at Ludington State Park; 8th graders biked all over Mackinac Island. Each of these experiences gave students a different view of God's world and a deeper understanding of our Creator God.

Team Two students met virtually with students from the Calvin University Math Methods class. The Calvin students prepared math lessons based on math standards and then met with the Evergreen students over zoom to teach the lessons. Each Evergreen student participated in four math lessons led by college students.

Teachers, grades K-4, completed their final data analysis for the 2020-2021 school year. Teachers work through this process with administrators and student support coordinators three times each year. The assessment data showed student growth this school year.

Teachers had the opportunity to work with the technology staff on May 28 to further our learning and understanding about SeeSaw, which is the Learning Management System that we use in our preschool and elementary classrooms.

With our year-end, our teachers, Inclusion and ESS Coordinators, and our support staff from Grand Rapids Public Schools held meetings with parents to update them on how their kids are doing throughout this year. In many cases, we get the honor of continuing support for some students, and in some cases, we were able to graduate students from receiving services. In all cases, we were thrilled to share students made great growth, which is due

to a fantastic partnership between our teams at school and parents. We are blessed to have such a wonderful partnership with parents, as partnership is foundational to each student's success in all things regarding school.

Also, Teachers had the opportunity to work with the technology staff on May 28 to further our learning and understanding about SeeSaw, which is the Learning Management System that we use in our elementary classrooms. Teachers will be spending the next year and beyond furthering their familiarity with Seesaw.

There were many changes as support was planned and put into action due to the learning needs because of Covid. Teachers, inclusion coordinators, and inclusion support staff adapted to meet the needs of students receiving inclusion services. Student-centered planning continued to address the unique needs of students and their families. In-person, virtual, and hybrid instruction was offered as we focused on how best to support students. It was great to see individuals doing what they could to provide individualized instruction that was engaging. It was great to observe how everyone partnered during this unique school year.

The Spanish Immersion sixth and seventh graders had the opportunity to visit various places on Grandville Avenue and learn more about the history of the area as well as the Hispanic culture right here in Grand Rapids. They supported local Hispanic establishments; they used their Spanish to communicate with the store owners/workers. They learned about opportunities to contribute and volunteer through the Cook Library or even take Latin dance classes. AMY ORR — EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF ADMISSIONS AND MARKETING

The Admissions team remains focused on responding to inquiries, moving prospective students through the admissions process, and converting as many inquiries as possible into Continuous Enrollment Contracts. Once the enrollment contract has been received, we have been working with new families through the onboarding process of setting up their ParentVUE account, completing the verification process, and explaining what they will need to do to set up their Smart Tuition account.

Our lead goal data for May shows that there continues to be interest in our schools similar to, and in some cases in excess of 2019 (pre-COVID).

Enrollment continues to progress toward the projection goals set for our team. Some campuses have already achieved and even exceeded projections. STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL 5

Ensure a business model for financial sustainability that supports the educational program and advances the mission of Grand Rapids Christian Schools.

JIM PRIMUS — CFO

Through the first ten months of the 2020-21 fiscal year, the GRCS Operating Budget continues to track well with respect to both budgeted Revenues and Expenses. The budget includes an Operating Reserve of \$1,700,000, which, if unused, will be applied towards operational debt.

GRCS continues to wait to hear confirmation on the forgiveness of the PPP Loan received in April 2020. In February 2021, the SBA requested GRCS resubmit the Forgiveness Application without including Eagle Impact payroll costs.

GRCS has been working on additional funding opportunities as it relates to the health pandemic.

GRCS qualifies for the **Employee Retention Credit** (ERC) and is working alongside Synergi (specializing in tax credit and incentive recovery) in the application process. GRCS qualifies for the credit in 2020 and in the 1st quarter of 2021.

Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools (EANS) is available to GRCS and other non-public schools that did not apply for the 2nd PPP Loan. The GRCS Business Office has completed and submitted the EANS applications for all five campuses. Those applications have all been approved. It is expected the funds will be released in June 2021, with reimbursement for qualifying expenses occurring after that.
