

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MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Board:

I trust you and your families enjoyed Spring Break! Though there is snow in the forecast this week, it is so refreshing to be able to experience the change in season. Warmer weather and nature coming back to life has been a joy to experience and watch unfold.

GRAND RAPIDS

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This month's Board Report replaces the scheduled April 19, 2021 meeting due to the time between today and last month's board meeting; no action needing board discussion and approval is necessary at this time. In addition to committee Minutes that are included in the board's monthly packet, below is an update on items relevant for the board's review and information in lieu of our scheduled meeting.

Admissions for 2021-2022

Amy Orr, in her update on the status of 2021-2022 admissions below, reports that admissions inquiries appear to have returned to or even in several cases surpassed 2019-2020 school-year interest, which is a great indication that we may be on track to enroll at our historical new-student levels. Though we are still in the process of moving families forward from interest to enrollment, we are certainly encouraged by the enthusiasm being expressed by a high number of families and students. As we close up the school year, we continue to monitor new student enrollments and provide much encouragement to those who desire to enroll for the fall.

The good news is that, in most cases, we have room for new students. There are several grades at specific campuses where we are closely monitoring "open seats" due to strong existing enrollment and limited space availability for new students. We will know more as we get closer to summer break.

Chief Advancement Officer Search

Brian Jensen, Vanderbloemen search consultant, traveled to Grand Rapids on March 30 to meet with me and review the status of applicants for the Chief Advancement Officer position. He reported that, to date, he had spoken to and / or received applications from 14 individuals. He and I discussed the qualities and characteristics of "ideal" applicants. Brian reported that he will continue to actively seek applicants in order to complete the search process as early as the end of April. He and I will confirm a final slate of applicants to interview, which may be as early as the second week of May.

Emergency Assistance for Nonpublic Schools (EANS) Funds

As an update on Emergency Assistance to Nonpublic Schools (EANS) funds and GRCS' application for those funds, GRCS submitted its application on behalf of each of the five school campuses on April 13, 2021. The funds have not yet been released at the state level due to legislative logjams. Based on information we have received from Kent Intermediate School District's legislative lobbyist and the Michigan Association of Nonpublic Schools (MANS), we are hopeful that the legislative process will result in the funds being released as a part of the state budget negotiations in early June.

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Superintendent's 2020-2021 Assessment

Thank you to board members for completing the 2020-2021 superintendent assessment survey last month. Patti Harris, on behalf of the Executive Committee, compiled feedback received on this year's assessment, which was sent to all GRCS teachers, board members, direct reports, and designated business partners. The Executive Committee reviewed the data as well as received an overall summary of comments made by respondent groups. The full board will receive an executive summary of the results at its June board meeting.

The Executive Committee commended Patti for her work on this annual assessment as board secretary over the past number of years. With her board term expiring at the close of this school year, Tim requested that she walk alongside the incoming board secretary to assist with the evaluation process in the coming year.

Status of PPP Loan Forgiveness

As of April 19, 2021, we have not heard back from the SBA relative to the status of our PPP loan forgiveness. We did resubmit the application in February, per the SBA's request, and anticipate receiving a final determination in the near future. Jim Primus remains in close contact with Macatawa Bank to monitor the status of forgiveness. Hats off to the Business Department staff for outstanding work throughout the submission (and resubmission!) process.

COVID Plan — Remainder of 2020-2021 School Year

County superintendents continue to meet weekly with health department officials to review the status of the positivity test rates in Michigan and, in particular, within Kent County. Though the state continues to "strongly urge" schools to re-establish virtual learning, we have determined to move forward with in-person instruction, continue implementing the health and safety mitigation efforts the board approved in August 2020, and do all we can to finish the year strong! That determination is supported by the health department as well.

As a point of reference, we have no known active staff cases and two known active student cases as of April 19, 2021. In addition, the vast majority of our staff and faculty have now been fully vaccinated.

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STRATEGIC PLAN GOAL 2

Ensure exemplary and aligned PS-12th grade Christian education across all schools that is taught by teachers who embrace mastery and productive Christian citizenship for all students.

BRAD MOCKABEE - GRCHS PRINCIPAL

Creating powerful *Winterim* experiences for students this year was challenging. In years past, at least one-third of our students have been off-campus learning in other settings, either on a school trip or doing while interning in the community. COVID made traveling impossible and although 85 students were able to secure internships, finding placements was very difficult. For the first time, our counseling office created a college visit *Winterim* experience. Roughly 75 students visited eight colleges or universities each. With each college visit, they filled out a detailed account of their experiences and how the school potentially fits into their future plans.

Around 45 students who preferred a virtual learning option took online courses through Coursera with topics ranging from "Fashion Design" to "Using Python to Access Web Data."

Winterim courses are a great way for students to dig deeper into areas of passion. For example, students who love science could take "Playing with Fire", "Science in the Real World" or "CSI: Grand Rapids." We are thankful for all these opportunities for students to explore God's world!

Over the last few months, our students have been selecting courses for the 2021-22 school year. At GRCHS, our scheduling process is student-centered, meaning that we choose what courses to offer based on student choice. We do our best to not only provide each student with required courses for graduation but also with the opportunity to take a wide variety of elective courses that uncover gifts and passions. After students have completed course selections, we create a master schedule and staffing plan to serve their needs. We hope to have this completed in the next few weeks!

SARA SETH - GRCMS PRINCIPAL

Middle School students are gearing up for their third round of NWEA MAP testing. We feel blessed that we have been able to have students in school throughout the school year to allow for our three testing sessions (fall, winter, & spring). This information is used throughout the school year for teachers to look at student learning patterns, meet students where they are in their learning, and reflect upon their teaching strategies to understand what is best for students.

2021-2022 GRCMS schedule alignment- In October (2020), we worked closely with Mr. Simon Jeynes, cofounder and Executive Director of Christian School Management, to do a school-wide analysis of the middle school schedule. During our week with Simon Jeynes, we dove into scheduling regarding our mission as a school. Scheduling at GRCMS connects teaching that is spiritual, child-centered, holistic, and the best use of the time that God gives us with middle school students. As a result of these goals, we worked to align our schedule from 5th-8th grades while also preserving the specific needs of adolescent development at each grade level. This alignment allows us to best use our resources and space to meet the needs of as many students as possible. Much time, conversation, teacher & student input, brainstorming, and collaboration was put into revising our schedule for next year. Many elements remain the same; however, they have been carefully planned and rearranged to work together.

The week after Spring Break marks iXplore at RCMS and a chance for students to dedicate classes in areas of interest, such as photography, outdoor recreation, woodworking, and more. iXplore offers a memorable, experiential learning experience for students, as well as an opportunity to live into a variety of the Portrait of a Graduate attributes. Students get off campus and practice being thoughtful neighbors and lifelong explorers. They communicate and collaborate in new ways. Most importantly, they demonstrate the varied ways we can live as disciples of Christ.

The partnership between parents and school is a critical variable in the education of each student. At Iroquois, we have developed several ways to partner with parents, one being communication regarding student academic growth. We want parents to know how their child is making academic progress, or if academic progress is not going at the pace we hope for. We talk about what is going well and dig in to learn more about each student to find the optimal level of support each student needs. This month, our ESS teams have been working hard at reviewing data and looking specifically at the growth of students. I am happy to say, our students are doing awesome! Our teachers and ESS teams are doing awesome! By collecting data and having conversations, the partnership between families and school is optimal, and our kids benefit, which is exactly what we want. Thank you to parents, teachers, and staff for working hard at cultivating positive partnerships that are what is best for our students.

One of the points of data is an assessment called AimsWeb Plus. This assessment is only given in our lower grade levels. It charts student growth and ultimately guides the instruction of our teachers. AimsWeb Plus was given to students this past month, and the data is currently being used by our teachers and ESS teams.

KIM PRIMUS — INCLUSION DIRECTOR

Under the leadership of the Director of Inclusion Services, Inclusion Coordinators plan for students receiving inclusion support as they transition from grade to grade and campus to campus. During the spring semester, goals and objectives are written for each student for the upcoming school year. When students transition from one campus to another the Inclusion Coordinators meet to discuss individual student strengths and struggle areas. We strive to ensure student learning and growth continue from year to year. Academic, spiritual, physical, social, and emotional supports are put in place to support students.

Implement a comprehensive advancement model where admissions, development, marketing, and communications, and database management work cohesively to advance Grand Rapids Christian Schools' mission.

AMY ORR — EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF ADMISSIONS AND MARKETING

Having hosted our preschool and kindergarten admissions events in December and January, our team's focus for early childhood shifted to registration in February. We are encouraged by the fact that preschool and kindergarten registration numbers currently meet or exceed projections. Now, our focus has turned to converting all of the registrations into Continuous Enrollment Contracts.

Upcoming admission events include four more Future Eagle Days in April and May at GRCHS, Virtual Showcase at GRCMS on March 18, and four visit days at GRCHS in April and May — two specifically for Ada Christian 8th graders.

The Continuous Enrollment opt-out deadline was February 20. To date, we have received 64 opt outs for next year as well as three contract suspensions. Admissions staff continue to follow up with families who are on suspended contracts to confirm their enrollment for 2021/22, connect with current preschool students who have not yet registered for next year, and contact current 8th grade students who have not yet submitted a course request for GRCHS.

In addition to having sent Continuous Enrollment contracts to new preschool and kindergarten students, we have also sent them to Ada Christian 8th graders who have scheduled for next year as well as to all applicants whose application for admission has been approved. To date, we have received 134 contracts for new students PS-12th grade. Our work continues. Inquiries continue to come in at a steady pace. We expect elementary, middle, and high school inquiries to increase over the spring and summer, perhaps later than normal, as parents finish the year at their current school and look ahead to 2021/22 with a bit of a wait-and-see attitude with regard to COVID protocols. The admissions team remains committed to providing excellent customer service to all families who inquire, providing opportunities for families to see and experience our schools, and to doing all we can to achieve the projected enrollment goals set before us.

JIM PRIMUS – CFO

Through the first nine months of the 2020-21 fiscal year, the GRCS Operating Budget continues to track well with respect to both budgeted Revenues and Expenses. The budget includes an Operating Reserve of \$1,700,000, which if unused will be applied towards operational debt.

GRCS continues to wait to hear confirmation on the Forgiveness of the PPP Loan received in April 2020. In February 2021, the SBA requested GRCS resubmit the Forgiveness Application without including Eagle Impact payroll costs.

GRCS has been working on additional funding opportunities as it relates to the health pandemic.

GRCS qualifies for the Employee Retention Credit (ERC) and is working alongside Synergi (specializing in tax credit and incentive recovery) in the application process. GRCS expects to qualify for the credit in 2020 and in the 1st quarter of 2021.

Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools (EANS) is available to GRCS and other non-public schools who did not apply for the 2nd PPP Loan. The GRCS Business Office has completed the EANS applications for all five campuses and will submit to the MDE before the April 30 deadline.
