





Gregory-Portland ISD Proposed Plan for Use of Funds - ESSER III

- □ In an effort to optimize the facilitation of the ESSER III Grant Program and use of funds, Gregory-Portland ISD is proposing a two-prong strategy approach.
 - 1) Strategy One Grant Application Use of Funds
 - Select Pre-Award Costs in the amount of \$4,081,028 (80% of total award) to be used for offsetting salaries incurred during the pre-award period of March 13, 2020 through the application submission date. This is an allowable activity under ESEA and will enable the district to free-up local funds.
 - Select the minimum required set-aside for learning loss mitigation of \$1,020,258 (20% of total award) and apply funds to allowable COVID-19 expenditures incurred during fiscal year 2020-2021. Offsetting allowable activities incurred, such as technological devices used for intervention, will allow the district to free-up local funds.
 - 2) Strategy Two Local Use of Funds
 - Designate the \$1,020,258 freed up local funds for long term COVID-19 learning loss intervention support by adding these funds to the restricted general fund balance.


Compliance Risk Assessment



ESSER III Compliance Risk Factors

- Pre-Award costs can be supplanted and EDGAR requirements do not apply for costs prior to April 27, the notice award date.
- Over 28 allowable activities, however, depending on the activity there are several components that must be met and may pose a risk in loss of funds due to non-compliance. Examples of required components for some activities may include TEA pre-approval prior to obligating funds, expense not aligning with grant purposes, etc.
- Adopting the two-prong strategy to quickly obligate all ESSER awarded funds, rather than stretching out over grant period, will ensure no loss in funding (i.e. obligating funds in the future runs the risk of not spending the funds within the grant period if an amendment is needed and is not submitted timely).



Every Student Succeeds (ESSA) Grant

ESSA Title I, Part A: Improving Basic Programs

- Title I, Part A provides supplemental funding to state and LEAs. The funding is for resources to help schools with high concentrations of students from low-income families provide a high-quality education that will enable all children to meet the state's student performance standards. Title I, Part A supports schools in implementing either a school-wide program or a targeted assistance program. These programs must use effective methods and instructional strategies that are grounded in scientifically based research.
- Gregory-Portland ISD currently operates a school-wide Title I program at the following campuses:
 - Austin Elementary
 - Clark Elementary
 - Andrews Elementary
- District Allocation: \$616,958

ESSA Title II, Part A: Supporting Effective Instruction

Intent & Purpose

Fitle III, Part A of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), as reauthorized under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), aims to ensure that English learners (ELs) and immigrant students attain English proficiency and develop high levels of academic achievement in English. - District Allocation: \$49,296

Well-Rounded Education

- A well-rounded education focuses on promoting access to high-quality programs/activities for all students.
- Programs/Activities should support and encourage the inclusion of all students, particularly female students, minority students, English learners, children with disabilities, and low-income students who are often underrepresented and underserved in STEM, arts, music, high-quality programs, accelerated learning programs, and after school/before school programs.

Purpose

- Perkins is dedicated to increasing learner access to high-quality Career Technical Education (CTE) programs of study. With a focus on:

 - strengthening the connections between secondary and postsecondary education
 - improving accountability
- ► District Allocation: \$32,502

Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER I) Through TEA

- 1. Allowable expenditures incurred since 3/13/2020.
- G-PISD decided to reclass Elementary Teachers to the grant in the 19-20 school year.
 - a. The March 2020 payrolls were reclassified in the amount of \$545,376.
- 3. School foundation funds were reduced as a result of the ESSER I grant. At near final settle-up, the reduction was \$529,298.
- 4. In December 2020, TEA announced a final award adjustment. The district received an additional \$16,078 for a total award amount of \$545,376. An adjustment to salaries expenditures was made before the audit was completed.

Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF TDEM)

The Texas Department of Emergency Management Grant

- 1. Allowable Expenditure time frame 3/1/2020-5/20/2020.
- 2. The allowable expenditures were:
 - a. Expenses to facilitate distance learning, including technological improvements, in connection with school closings to enable compliance with COVID-19 precautions.
 - a. Chromebooks & Hotspots
 - of educational support staff or faculty responsible for developing online learning capabilities necessary to continue educational instruction in response to COVID-19-related school closures.

CRF (TDEM)

- 3. Meetings were held between finance and curriculum to discuss employees applicable for this reimbursement.
- 4. All POs entered between the designated dates were reviewed for eligibility.
- 5. A survey was sent out to the employees identified that fell under this reimbursement.
- 6. A total of \$793,238 expenditures for Chromebooks and Hotspots were submitted for reimbursement. Only \$748,333 was deemed eligible by TDEM. The reimbursement rate was 75% of eligible expenditures equalling \$561,250.

Operation Connectivity Bulk Order Program

Through TEA and Region 4 ESC

- 1. A bulk order program for technology devices and hotspots for all the LEAs in Texas.
- 2. An interlocal agreement with Region 4 ESC was made to purchase Chromebooks and hotspots at a bulk purchase price.
- 3. Purchased a total of \$181,200.
- 4. TEA covered 50% of the order and we paid the other 50%, \$90,600.
- 5. How many devices in total:
 - a. Chromebooks: 500
 - b. Hotspots: 300

CRF Bulk-Purchase Local Match Reimbursement Program (CRF LMPR)

Through TEA/City/County

- 1. For LEAs who participated in the Op Conn bulk purchase program, paid Region 4 ESC for their local share of the bulk purchase and received CRF funding for connectivity devices from their city/county.
- 2. On September 29th, 2020 G-PISD Officials, after having met with City/County Officials, decided that any further costs of seeking a local match from the City/County would far exceed the benefit of the expected award amounts available to the district.
- 3. TEA matched \$1 for every \$1 received from the county. The maximum eligible amount G-PISD was seeking was \$45,300 from TEA with a local match from the City/County in the amount of \$45,300.

Operation Connectivity - Prior Purchase Reimbursement Program (CRF PPRP) Through TEA

- 1. On November 13th, 2020, TEA held a webinar on a new reimbursement program for LEAs.
- 2. CRF PPRP provides reimbursement funding to eligible LEAs for technology-related purchases made to serve students and staff during the COVID-19 pandemic incurred since May 21, 2020.
- 3. Eligible devices and expenses:
 - a. Laptops, Chromebooks, iPads, Tablets
 - b. Hot Spots
 - c. Fees: Licenses, hotspot data plans, CIPA filtering.

Operation Connectivity - Prior Purchase Reimbursement Program (CRF PPRP)

- 4. A list of POs was generated to review all purchases made between May 21, 2020 through January 31, 2021. All items must be received by February 28th to qualify. Any previous expenditures submitted for other grants or reimbursement do not qualify for this program.
- 5. Expenditures were reviewed by the finance, technology and curriculum department.
- 6. A total of \$990,000 for laptops and Chromebooks was identified and submitted as eligible expenses for reimbursement on December 15th.
- 7. If all expenditures are approved, the district will receive a maximum reimbursement of \$673,500 calculated on ECODIS.
