**Equity in Mathematics: The Mathematicians Project in Region 15** is an instructional series focused on building positive math identities and understanding who mathematicians are and how they unlock the world. Shared a video compilation that involved a collaboration of 11 classes in Grades 2-4 in all elementary schools across Region 15 (R15), involving classroom teachers, students, families, R15 math coach, R15 instructional technology coach, and the Teacher in Residence for Diversity and Cultural Competency.

## Establishment of LGBTQIA+ Working Group, Carrie Chiappetta, Erin Birden and Jen Labriola (Region 15 Parent)

LGBTQIA+ Acroynym: lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, (questioning), intersex, asexual, and agender, ally, + = 2-spirit, pansexual, etc.

Shared the purpose of the LGBTQIA+ Working Group and the 2019 state snapshot of school climate for LGBTQIA+ Students in Connecticut in the GLSEN.

The purpose of the group is to build an awareness, to educate, to train and to support LGBTQIA+ students; to ensure that R15 and the communities of Middlebury & Southbury address the needs of its LGBTQIA+ youth at all levels through:

- Support of educators, families, students and allies in a welcoming and safe environment for students
- A Curriculum that is inclusive of the LGBTQIA+ experience and events
- Policies for school, district, and community organizations (harrassment, bullying, non discrimination, accessibility); and
- Community Support (both school and broader communities) of LGBTQIA+ individuals and Gay Straight Alliances (GSA).

The working group will begin the process of bolstering and extending supports for youth and families throughout the Region, supporting educators, and staff training and tools. Emphasizing the need for school and community support. Will begin planning meetings over the summer. Currently looking for individuals to be involved, who want to learn more and will help promote understanding and compassion.

### R15 Possible Interview Questions for Teachers, Paraprofessionals, etc.

The Council broke up into smaller groups to review the questions that were still not decided upon.

### <u>Update on Work in the Region</u>

- Teacher Residency Program: Carrie Chiappetta shared that there will be two teachers joining Region 15 next year through the CT Teacher Residency Program (CT TRP). This is an alternate route to elementary certification focused on increasing teachers of color across the State of Connecticut. Resident candidates will be enrolled in rigorous coursework for 18 months and serve in a paid residence position in a mentor teacher's classroom for the school year. Region 15 teachers will serve as mentors. (UPDATE: Region 15 was just made aware that currently we will have 1 Teacher Resident and CT TRP will work to find the Region a second Resident)
- Tribury Reads Update: Erin Birden shared that an email has been sent to 82 registrants in the community 72 adults / 10 youth participants. Local librarians from Southbury and Woodbury are assisting with getting copies. Please contact them if you need a copy of the book. Discussion dates are 6/26 and 6/27 with options in-person or via zoom. Currently working on the facilitator guide and expect to have groups of 10 individuals in each book group.

#### • Update on the Administrator Questions:

Carrie Chiappetta shared that questions previously reviewed in the E&I council were used in the interview process for the Pomperaug Elementary School Principal and are currently being used in the interview process for the Assistant Principal position at LMES. Questions were used in various rounds as well as added to the software program in the initial application process, emphasizing the importance and value Region 15 places on equity and inclusion.

- Embrace Diversity Meeting: Mike Syrotiak shared that the high school students meet
  once per month and student leaders have been meeting extra time per month to plan.
  Meetings are student directed and discussions are often about their experience and their
  feelings, positive/negative feelings regarding classroom experiences. Dr. Chiappetta
  recently attended to hear their thoughts. They are planning a book club and details to be
  shared.
- Kindergarten Lesson on Puerto Rico: Erin shared a collaborative lesson shared with kindergarteners across Region 15 with Yamira Raimundi, R15 parent and secretary to Assistant Principal at PHS, about Puerto Rico and her experience on the island. Included a read aloud with each class and students creating their own buildings in the style of Old San Juan while listening to salsa music. Remarked on leveraging the experiences and knowledge from within our school community. Shared a brief video of the lesson.
- The Day You Begin, by Jaqueline Woodson, illustrated by Rafayl Lopez: A lesson shared with multiple classrooms throughout the year, most recently two kindergartens at MES and LMES. Throughout the book the symbolism of a ruler is used to represent measuring ourselves against each other. Following the lesson the students made flowers (a second significant theme in the book) and shared different aspects of their identity to honor their own diversity their similarities and differences.
- PHS US History/4th grade classes: Children's Book: Students in the US History Classes taught by Mrs. Clark and Ms. Saraiva, shared how students have been studying the Civil Rights Movement. Through the development of a collaborative project with Erin Birden, the students were tasked with creating a book that will help to educate the next generation about one individual from this movement. Their assignment was as follows: The Civil Rights Movement was largely a grassroots movement where individuals used their power to push and create change. Although most are aware of larger figures there were countless others whose stories are not always told. Tell the story of one such individual. Create a children's book that is aimed at an elementary school audience to teach children about one figure from the Civil Rights Movements of the 1950s & 1960s. The students shared their books with students in the 4th grade classes from across the district.
