3. Towards the end of summer, **choose your favorite book that you read** and **write a book blurb** that entices or tempts your new classmates to want to read it too! (See the next page for detailed instructions and some student samples.)

4. (Optional) **Creative Writing** - Show off your creative talents and write your own short story or poem.

Summer homework is **due on the first day of school.** Please come to school ready to hand in your book blurb, either on paper or on your computer.

Book Blurbs: What They Are and How to Write One

A book blurb appears on the back of a book to get us to read the book! To write a book blurb, write a well-developed paragraph that includes:

- 1. Situation: main character(s), setting
- 2. Conflict: but don't give away what happens!

3. Make the reader feel the mood and **bring them into the world of the book!** (Give enough details but not too many.)

- 4. Name of book and author (Name of book is italicized. Ex. The Hunger Games)
- 5. Illustrate your blurb by drawing or finding an image!
- 6. Read aloud -- Revise and edit!

How will you be graded? Here is the <u>rubric</u> that teachers will use to grade your work.

Keeper of the Lost Cities



CHOOSE ONE ACTIVITY BELOW:

- 1. **Interview a Character.** Compose six to eight questions to ask a main character in a book just completed. Write the character's response to each question. Bonus if you record yourself doing the interview with a friend or family member!
- 2. **Ten Facts.** Creates a "Ten Facts About [book title]" sheet that lists ten facts that you learned from reading the book. The facts, written in complete sentences, must include details you didn't know before reading the book.
- 3. Script It! Each student writes a movie script for a favorite part in the book you just read. At the top of the script, you can assign real-life TV or movie stars to play each role. Bonus if you record yourself acting out the scene with a friend or family member!
- 4. **In the News.** Each student creates the front page of a newspaper that tells about events and characters in a book just read. The newspaper page might include weather reports, an editorial or editorial cartoon, ads, etc. The title of the newspaper should be something appropriate to the book.
- 5. **Create a Comic Book.** Turn the book into a comic book complete with comic-style illustrations and dialogue bubbles!
- 6. **Characters Come to Life.** Each student creates life-size "portraits" of one of the scientists/mathematicians from a book you just read. The portrait should include a written piece that tells about the character. The piece might also include information about events, traits, or conflicts in the book that involve that person.
- 7. **Picture Books.** After reading the book, create a picture book version of the story that would appeal to younger students in elementary school!
- 8. **Resume Writing.** Create a resume for the scientist/mathematician you just read about. Include in the resume a statement of the "applicant's" goals and a detailed account of his or her experience and outside interests.

9. **"Dear Diary."** Create a diary or journal and write at least five entries that might have been written by the scientist/mathematician in the book just read.
