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Dr. Powell Farewell Interview

Dr. Powell is the current president of our school and soon to be president of Frederick Community college beginning on August 16th. He was also previously a president at a University in West Virginia and Mount Saint Mary's. Prior to that, he was first a professor at the University of Connecticut for 7-years, then became a dean at Montana State University and a University in North Carolina. Dr. Powell has worked in many places, but he says, "Out of all the places that I've ever worked, I

think Saint John's was clearly the best and I regret that I didn't spend more time working in a high school setting."

Dr. Powell has also lived in many places over the country, but the first place he lived after high school was Alaska. During his time in school, the country was divided primarily because of the Vietnam War, and many young people were leaving the United States.

Dr. Powell married his high school sweet heart with his principal as the priest, and most of his

high school present to watch the ceremony. Afterward, Dr. Powell and his wife promptly moved to Alaska, where they bought 55 acres of property and built a log cabin. Their only access to technology was a tiny radio, and they lived entirely off the grid; their closest neighbors living 6 miles away. Winters in Alaska are bitter cold, and Dr. Powell says, "When we would go to bed at night, we had a stove, and if we didn't get up to get the fire going again, everything was frozen, even the water."

They lived in Alaska for several years until they moved to Montana. Dr. Powell attended Montana State University and earned his bachelor's and master's degree to pursue his dream of working with children with severe disabilities. Dr. Powell says, "I started my career in education when I was 5-years old, kindergarten. I loved school so much I never left." After earning his Ph.D. at Vanderbilt University, he knew he wanted to be a professor.

Dr. Powell and his wife also love children and recently adopted four kids from an orphanage in East Timor, a small, poverty-stricken Island located above Australia.

The adoption took a total of four years and numerous trips to the island. When they would arrive, after the long flight and

14-hour ferry ride, they had to walk through the water to get to the island because the ferry could not take them all the way. When they had made it to land, they then had to hike up to the top of the island's peak, where the orphanage was located. Before Dr. Powell fully retires, with more than 40 years of university experience, he will spend one more year working as the president of Frederick Community College. There, Dr. Powell will lead and guide the school to greatness. But he will always cherish the time he spent with Saint John's Catholic Prep and its community.

Q: What was your favorite part of the process?



The American Sign Language Club is Kalia's passion project that began in late April. This club has enriched students' communication skills and understanding of this dynamic and necessary language.

Kalia first began learning sign language towards the end of her sixth grade year in order to communicate with a transfer student, who then become her best friend. Once she began learning ASL she quickly fell in love with the language and the culture. She found that the language came to her naturally and so she continued to learn and grow in her signing abilities. When she transferred to SJCP she was placed into ASL 4 and planned to continue taking the class: until she discovered that the teacher would be retiring next school year and that incoming freshmen would not have the opportunity to take any ASL classes. The ASL club was conceived to fill this void. Another reason for the founding of this club Maryland is home to such a large deaf population that deserved to be recognized.

Kalia was unsure whether or not she could start the ASL club, having never started a club before, but she knew the importance of the deaf community and understood that it is a language that people should at least be familiar with. With reassured confidence Kalia brought her idea to Mr. Knotek and Mrs. Ballenger, the clubs official coordinator. With their approval the preparation for the club began and it is currently a great success.

The club currently has eleven members, who meet before school in the utilities room between 8:15 - 8:55 on Wednesday.

There they all eat breakfast, doughnuts, and discuss new signs. The club does not just focus on the language itself. it also teaches students about the deaf culture and how to interact with a deaf person. Currently there are no trips set in stone; however, Kalia is hoping to take the club on a field trip to the Maryland School of the Deaf. She also discussed the idea of the club interpreting a song at a Cabaret night. As a part of the members practicing their sign language they are encouraged to start conversations with deaf people in order to become immersed in the language.



1. A Tale of Two Cities.

Long classic books are boring to read, am I right? No, not in the case of this novel by Charles Dickens. The story of love, growth, forgiveness, and guillotines takes place in both France and England in the time before the French Revolution. The lengthy exposition might cause some readers to lose interest but if you stick it out, the connection of the many narratives in the story will combine to form one of the earliest and most tragic plot

twists in literature. The book runs about 450 pages for the unabridged version but one can find shorter versions (although I will let my bias slip in to say to read the unabridged version for the full effect). Tom Hazard may look to be a 41-year-old man, but he has been alive for centuries, a closely auarded secret. As a member of a society of people with the same condition, the Albatross Society, Tom can travel the world and make the most of his extended life as long as he follows one rule. do not fall in love. When a whim comes over him, causing him to return to England, his place of birth, Tom meets an inquisitive French Teacher who will change his life, and make him question the one rule he has to follow. This is a great love story about rebellion, learning to live, and embracina chanae. At around 330 pages, How to Stop Time is a quick-paced easy read for any reader.

3. Slaughterhouse-Five

In this anti-war novel, Billy Pilgrim spends his time switching between World War Two, his life post-war, and his abduction on the planet of Tralfamadore. While on Tralfamadore, he learns about how fluid the passage of time is to the Tralfamadorians and its change to his perspective on life. This is a relatively short novel (100 pages), making a good read for those with a big imagination.

4. Les Misérables

The longest novel on this list, Victor Hugo's Les Misérables tells the story of Jean Valjean, a man imprisoned for 19 years because he was caught stealing a loaf of bread to feed his family, and his time leading up to the French Revolution. Valjean's story follows his development alongside the stories of many other characters such as his daughter Cosette, Cosette's husband Marius, Cosette's tragic mother Fatine, the ruthless prison guard Javert, and the cruel family, the Thénardiers. This story of redemption, development, love, friendship, change, and tragedy takes up a lengthy 1,000-1,500 pages but is well worth the read.

5. Flowers for Algernon




How many legs does this elephant have?
