Here at the CAIU, we have our own Application Development or "App Dev" team, consisting of developers and business analysts. Our business analysts (BA's) Amy Cserny and Ben Berry translate the client's needs into requirements that are used to create the application. The developers, Royce Brown, Corey Gelbaugh, Dan

Conway, Jack Rentzel, as well as contractor, Damian Salgado, take those requirements and create the program, by writing the computer code that makes the app run.



Together, BA's and developers take the project from the planning stage, to development and launch seemingly like magic!

The CAIU application development team does so much to make the work of the CAIU and our partners easier. Some of the programs used every day were built in house,

enhanced, or supported by our App Dev team:

AgendaManager: online meeting

- management system • Track: student information and time tracking for our ANPS team
- **OASIS: Operations Access Student Information** System (in development), a comprehensive student information and billing system for student services
- CAOLA Invoicing: analyzes the data in the CAOLA team's invoicing process to ensure accurate results
- 48 CARATS: professional development approval and tracking system, used by CAIU and many of our districts

January 6 was National Technology Day. The day was established to recognize the advancements in technology and how they impact our way

of living. I guarantee every one of us has used the line "When I was younger I had to do it this way....and your generation is lucky to have...." This line usually has a reference to technology and how much easier it is to accomplish tasks these days. In today's society we take for granted solutions like the Internet, digital assistants like Alexa and Google Home, Smart Phones, GPS units, drones, and one of my personal favorites, robotic vacuum cleaners.

Technology is something that continues to evolve at a fast pace, and school districts are embracing technology and integrating it into the classroom. In order to make all of the new technology work, you need to have a few key components in place. First, a solid infrastructure needs to be established. This would include having the proper network (routers, switches, wireless, etc.) with the proper cyber security measures to keep students and data safe. Next, you need the correct team in place to manage and monitor the infrastructure. You often hear about



the stuff that makes things work, but it is also important to recognize that the team behind the stuff is equally important. At the CAIU, our technology team consists of three main sub teams, Network Operations, Application Development and Helpdesk support. These teams help support software and hardware infrastructure both here at the CAIU and to our member school districts.

The Network Operations Team is responsible for overseeing the daily operations of the CAIU data center which provides numerous services for the 24 school districts and two technical schools. These services include server hosting, wireless hosting, Internet services, Voice over IP, disaster recovery, content filtering, next-generation firewalling, network monitoring, spam filtering, email archiving and various other services.



The Application Development Team provides custom software development services. These services include project management, coordination and collaboration with stakeholders to understand and document software requirements, and software development services.

The Helpdesk Team includes Application Support Specialists and Technology Support Specialists. These staff members provide application support, maintenance, and troubleshooting to CAIU employees and external customers. These services include support for the applications we develop and configuration, deployment, and maintenance of all CAIU desktop and laptop computers as well as phone support, remote support, video conferencing, and audio/visual support for all internal CAIU staff.

Tech Tip of the Month

Having trouble with your computer, smartphone, digital assistant or any of your other electronics? Start by restarting it. Yes! Actually, restart it. It is not just a joke, but a common practice when an electronic device is not working and is the first step to take before contacting your IT person. That puts the device in a boot up mode and will often fix a problem.

serves the specialized transportation needs of both Early Intervention and school-age students in our region. The goal is to provide safe, efficient, customer-friendly service that complement the school day, and ensures that all students are transported to and from the home and the classroom in a professional manner.

The Intermediate Unit does not hire our own drivers but we work closely with six different transportation companies to provide these services. Len Kapp and his support team of Dori Dorritie and Crystal Jenkins lead the work of our transportation department. They are responsible for maintaining all of the contacts with over 100 drivers per day and at least 40 different points of contacts at the schools we serve.

As the holiday season comes to an end and a new year is beginning, many people are indulging in retrospection and reevaluating some of their life choices. New Year's resolutions are the perfect opportunity for a new start.



Chances are, more than a couple of the most common resolutions will look familiar to you: Exercise more, lose weight, get organized, live life to the fullest, save more money, quit smoking, spend more time with family and friends.

January marks the beginning of the third quarter of our Wellness Calendar. In an effort to support you in meeting your wellness resolutions, our focus will be on Nutrition and Heart Health during the months of January – March.

Make the simple steps below part of your life for long-term benefits to your health and your heart.

- A variety of fresh, frozen and canned vegetables and fruits.
- Whole grains choose fiber-rich whole grains for most grain servings.
- **Low-fat dairy products** select fat-free (skim) and low-fat (1%) dairy products.
- Skinless <u>poultry and fish</u> Choose poultry and fish without skin. Eat a variety of fish at least twice a week.
- <u>Non-tropical vegetable oils</u> Avoid foods containing partially hydrogenated vegetable oils to reduce trans-fat in your diet.
- Limit Sugar Cut back on beverages and foods with added sugars.
- Limit Sodium: Choose foods with less sodium and prepare foods with little or no salt. To lower blood pressure, aim to eat no more than 2,300 milligrams of sodium per day.
- **Limit alcohol** If you drink alcohol, drink in moderation.
- **Portion control**: Follow the American Heart Association recommendations when you eat out, and keep an eye on your portion sizes.
- Live Tobacco Free Don't smoke, vape or use tobacco or nicotine products and avoid secondhand smoke or vapor. Learn more about quitting smoking.

Education Trends and Ideas Worth Leaving Behind in 2019

For public education, 2019, like previous years, brought its share of the good, the bad, and the ugly. On balance, there was plenty of good news, made largely possible by the 2018 mid-term elections of pro-education candidates into office. Much of *that* energy was drawn from the #RedforEd movement, and we are headed into the new decade stronger than ever.

Betsy DeVos' Voucher Plan – In her three years, DeVos has focused on championing school privatization, and weakening oversight into everything from civil rights protections to fraudulent student loans. DeVos continues to push a proposal which would divert already scarce funding away from neighborhood public schools – where 90 percent of children go – and give it away to private schools, which are not accountable to taxpayers.

'Money Doesn't Matter' - The debate whether increased funding actually improves student outcomes is "essentially settled." Bruce Baker of Rutgers University acknowledged that money had to be spent wisely to produce better results, but, in direct tests of the relationship between financial resources and student outcomes, money matters.

'Lunch Shaming' - It's hard to believe, but children across the country are still denied nutritional meals because they have negative balances on their meal accounts. The good news is that we may actually not hear too much about lunch-shaming incidents in 2020. In addition to individual states passing laws, a federal bill, the <u>Anti-Lunch Shaming Act</u>, is moving closer to becoming law.

Dress Codes That Discriminate - Across the country, black girls are more likely to be punished in school for their clothing or appearance, including natural hairstyles. School dress codes often include bans on hair extensions, braids, and dreadlocks. While young black males are also victimized by dress codes, girls are more likely to be "dress-coded" by school officials.

Leave it to the Machines - Baltimore school officials felt when it became clear that the county's "one-to-one" laptop program didn't produce the anticipated improvement in student performance. Other districts have reached the same, and very expensive conclusion: Technology is a tool and a useful one, but it's not a panacea.

Arming Educators - In 2019 there were approximately one school shooting a week. As for the response of arming teachers, most law enforcement experts agree that school staff should not carry guns because they lack the tactical knowledge of handling weapons that trained law enforcement personnel receive on a regular basis, and poses too high a risk to school safety.

'Stress is Just Part of the Job' - In addition to spotlighting the urgent need to reinvest in public education, the #RedforEd movement has also drawn long overdue attention to the <u>demands and pressures educators</u> face every day. Too many educators are burning out from workload pressure and other anxieties and are not receiving the support they need, particularly those newer to the profession.
