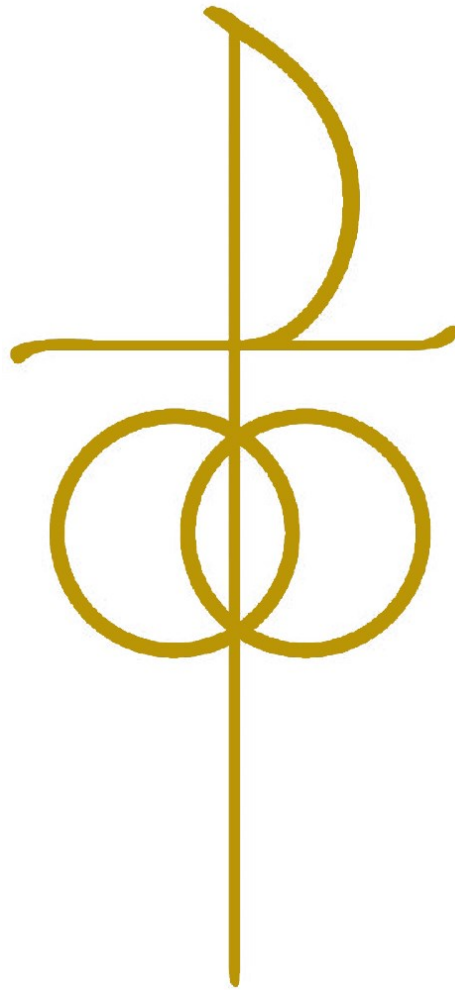

WEDDING GUIDELINES

Your marriage is one of the most important steps in your lives. The OLGC Community stands ready to assist you to make this important day a most memorable one. We are here to help you in the months and days prior to and the day of the celebration of your wedding. These guidelines were developed to assist you. It is our hope that following these guidelines will help make your wedding a prayerful and joyful celebration.

PREPARING FOR YOUR MARRIAGE

The Diocese of Arlington requires couples to begin Pre-Cana preparations **no** less than six months prior to the wedding. This period of time begins with your initial contact with a parish priest. It is important to contact the parish priest as soon as possible after your decision to enter into the Sacrament of Matrimony to ensure that you will have your choice of date and time for the celebration of this sacrament. Be sure to schedule your wedding date and time with the priest assigned to your wedding (herein referred to as priest) BEFORE making any commitment to a reception hall.

Please note, that in order to schedule your wedding at OLGC, at least one of you must fulfill at least **one** of the following criteria:

- (1) are registered at the parish (or)
- (2) live within the boundaries of OLGC (or)
- (3) received one or more of your sacraments at OLGC (or)
- (4) have a close blood relative who lives within the boundaries of OLGC

SETTING A DATE AND TIME AT OLGC

Saturday weddings are scheduled at 11:00 a.m. or 1:30 p.m. Weddings may also be scheduled Friday evenings for 6:00 p.m. Weddings on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation are not permitted. The space you are using (chapel OR church) will be reserved for one (1) hour **before** your wedding and a half-hour (30 min.) after your wedding.

If you are inviting 175 or more guests, your wedding will be in the church. If you are inviting 149 or fewer guests, your wedding may take place in either the chapel or church.

CHOICE OF RITE

The Celebration of Matrimony within Mass - If both of you are Catholic, you are strongly encouraged to celebrate have a Wedding Mass: out of the conviction that you believe in the Eucharist as being the most important sign of the unity you are declaring in receiving the Sacrament of Matrimony. If receiving Holy Communion at Sunday Mass has not been your practice in recent months or years, your personal faith preparation for receiving the Sacrament of Matrimony should include your return to full participation in the life of the Catholic Church and parish community, as well as regularly receiving the sacraments (Holy Communion and Penance).

The Celebration of Matrimony outside of Mass – If one of you is not Catholic, you are strongly encouraged to have a Wedding Ceremony, so as not to cause division between families in reference to the reception of the Eucharist. Holy Communion is **not** distributed during a Wedding Ceremony. The Wedding Ceremony includes the Liturgy of the Word, the Rite of Matrimony, and the Nuptial Blessing.

Interfaith Marriage

Regarding Matrimony between persons of different faiths, you will have to share those beliefs which your faiths hold in common, as well as those beliefs which differ. Concerned understanding and loving cooperation will be needed to respect and honor important convictions. The choice of Rite would be a ceremony outside of Mass.

PRE- CANA PROCESS

Your preparation for marriage will call on both of you to deepen your relationship by sharing with one another your thoughts, feelings, beliefs, doubts, strengths, and weaknesses about some of the key aspects of married life. The following Pre-Cana requirements will assist you in this endeavor:

The Prenuptial Investigation - In the initial meeting with your priest, you will each complete a short questionnaire, which will include your background information and will help your priest assess whether there are any impediments to receiving the Sacrament of Matrimony.

FOCCUS (Facilitating Open Couple Communication, Understanding, & Study) - As a couple, you will be given a *Setting Up Your FOCCUS Online Inventory* form. After each of you receives your parish log-in code from the Diocesan Office for Family Life, you will be able to complete the online inventory. The FOCCUS contains a number of questions pertinent to the married life (i.e., religion, finance, communication, sexuality, parenting, etc.). Your priest will discuss your answers with you at your next visit.

Diocesan Preparation Program - The Diocese of Arlington requires that engaged couples attend one (1) of the two marriage preparation programs provided:

Option 1: Catholic Engaged Encounter

This is a weekend retreat with other engaged couples that gives you the opportunity to focus exclusively on each other and the commitment you will make in marriage. These weekends are held at various locations in the area and begin on Friday evening and end on Sunday afternoon.

Option 2: Conference for the Engaged

This one (1) day conference offers presentations by priests, married couples, and counselors on topics important to marriage. These conferences run from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., on scheduled Saturdays throughout the year.

While you must participate in one of these programs, you are free to choose between them. Your priest will give you further information on each of these programs. We recommend that you make reservations as soon as possible, as both programs fill up quickly. Go to <http://www.arlingtondiocese.org/Marriage-and-Family/Conferences-for-the-Engaged/>. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS NEEDED FROM COUPLE

The following documents must be given to your priest **as soon as possible** but no later than one (1) month before your wedding:

1. Four (4) Affidavits of Free Status to Marry – Your priest will give you these forms. These affidavits, two (2) for each of you, must be completed by someone who has known you for at least six (6) years (i.e., parents, siblings, relatives, friends, etc.). The affidavits must be signed in the presence of a priest, deacon, minister, or notary public and written in black ink.

2. Baptismal Certificates

For Catholics:

You will need to contact your church of baptism to request a Baptism certificate, that is **dated** within six (6) months of your wedding and includes the parish's seal. Please ask your church of baptism to include all notations (i.e., Confirmation information, etc.) on your updated certificate. If you were confirmed and your Confirmation information is missing from your Baptism certificate, you will need to contact your church of Confirmation to request a separate Confirmation certificate. (It is acceptable if your First Communion and First Penance information are not recorded on your updated Baptism certificate). Please request that your certificate(s) be mailed directly to you, so you can find any errors before giving it to your priest. If an error is found, please contact the church who issued it and request a corrected certificate. Only an official Baptismal certificate dated within 6 months of the wedding date will be accepted by your priest. A photocopy is **not** acceptable.

For Baptized Christians:

A photocopy of your original Baptism certificate is acceptable. It should include your Baptism date, place of Baptism, and the city and state (or country) of your place of Baptism. If this information is missing from your certificate, please inform your priest.

3. Certificate of Attendance – You will need to provide a photocopy of your certificate of attendance from the Diocesan Preparation Program (e.g., Catholic Engaged Encounter or Conference for the Engaged) to your priest.

4. Civil Marriage License - Without a valid Virginia Marriage License, no marriage can take place at OLGC. Your marriage license may be obtained from any county in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Virginia Marriage Licenses are **valid** for 60 days, from the date of issue. It **MUST** be given to your priest no later than two (2) weeks before your wedding.

Sacrament of Penance As an engaged couple, you should also receive the Sacrament of Penance as a part of your preparation for the Sacrament of Matrimony.

PLANNING YOUR WEDDING

CELEBRANT

The priests of OLGC are happy to officiate your Celebration of Matrimony. However, if you wish to have a visiting priest officiate, please ask him to contact your priest to coordinate your wedding preparation at least six (6) months before your wedding. The visiting priest must present a “celebrate” from his diocese and also be licensed to perform weddings in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Director of Liturgy will provide the visiting priest with information concerning our parish guidelines.

LITURGY PLANNING

Guided by your priest and the Director of Liturgy, you are encouraged to select the scripture readings, and blessings to be used in the liturgy (see pages 12-37). The Director of Liturgy will contact you to set up a meeting to assist in the planning of your wedding. Both the bride and groom need to be present at this meeting, so both of you can fully participate in the planning of your wedding. Other members of the family are not encouraged to accompany you.

It is our hope that you will invite family members and friends to participate in the liturgy as readers and gift bearers. If you have any questions concerning the liturgy, please contact the Director of Liturgy, at 703-896-7411 or liturgy@olgcva.org.

Some couples choose to provide a worship aid or program for their guests. Although these are not supplied by OLGC, it is important that the Director of Liturgy review the personalized programs to assure their completeness and accuracy before they are printed. Equally important is obeying copyright laws, which apply. If you choose to print music in your program, you are required by law to pay for the right to do so. Sample programs are available from the Director of Liturgy at the time of your meeting.

MUSIC AND MUSICIANS

Music at the celebration of the Sacrament of Matrimony serves the words and actions of the Rite of Matrimony to help one express more effectively the faith celebrated in the liturgy. Music does more than simply provide a “nice touch” to the liturgy. Sacred music invites all who are present at your wedding to actively join in the celebration, by raising their voices in prayer through song. (see pages 38-43)

All of the music used in the celebration of the Sacrament of Matrimony must express the Catholic faith and be liturgically appropriate. Therefore, music selections are to be truly religious or appropriate classical compositions and not contemporary, romantic songs from stage, screen, or pop sources.

WEDDING COORDINATOR

OLGC provides a Wedding Coordinator for every wedding. Our coordinators are knowledgeable in what is appropriate for a Catholic wedding as well as what is permitted specifically at OLGC and will assist you in planning the logistics and details of your wedding, run your rehearsal, and ensure that your wedding goes smoothly. For these reasons, outside wedding coordinators will not assist with this aspect of your wedding preparations.

REHEARSAL

A rehearsal is required for every wedding and can be scheduled by contacting the Liturgy Assistant, at 703-896-7418, who will also inform your officiant. Your rehearsal should be scheduled at a time when all of the participants in the ceremony can be present. This includes the bride and groom, your wedding party, parents, readers, gift bearers, and anyone else who will take part in the wedding. Your wedding rehearsal will start at the scheduled time. The Organist and Cantor will not be present for the rehearsal. If a visiting priest officiates at your wedding, we strongly recommend that he attend the rehearsal as well, so he can become familiar with our facilities.

Your Wedding Coordinator will guide you through your wedding step by step. The Sacrament of Matrimony is a reverent and solemn occasion. Therefore your wedding rehearsal needs to be conducted in a like manner. A respectful attitude needs to be maintained in the chapel or church, surrounding areas, towards the church staff, and towards each other.

CHILDREN PARTICIPATION

OLGC does not provide babysitting services. Therefore, please make sure that there are enough non-participating adults present at both your rehearsal and wedding to supervise children.

All children participating in your wedding must be able to walk down the aisle. If a child cannot perform his or her assigned role at the rehearsal, an adult may need to accompany or assist them. Ring bearers do not carry the actual rings, and flower girls are not allowed to throw petals.

DECORATIONS

We welcome floral arrangements for the altar in the chapel or church except during the seasons of Advent and Lent. The Wedding Coordinator will show you where flowers can be appropriately placed in the chapel or church. Please note the church and chapel are specifically decorated for the Christmas and Easter Seasons. Respect is to be paid to the environment that is in place for these seasons.

Pew bows are allowed in the church and chapel. Plastic clips are used to attach the bows to the pews. OLGC will provide 9 pew bow stands to be used in the chapel as clips cannot be used on the fabric chairs. Flowers in water cannot be hung from these stands.

The chapel and church environments are not movable. This includes the drape, or altar cloth, as well as banners, piano, organ, altar, or podium.

PRAYER AT THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY STATUE

The practice of the bride (and groom) visiting the Blessed Virgin Mary should reflect a sincere devotion to Mary, Mother of the Lord. No reference is made to this devotional practice in the Rite of Matrimony, and it is not a necessary part of the Nuptial Mass or Wedding Ceremony. If flowers are presented to the Blessed Virgin Mary, they are to be placed at the statue either at the prayer after Communion in the Nuptial Mass or after the Our Father in a Wedding Ceremony.

PHOTOGRAPHER/VIDEOGRAPHER

The photographer and/or videographer you choose must adhere to the rules of OLGC and know how to be unobtrusive and have a sense of decorum and dignity. Their task is to memorialize, not to direct, delay, or interrupt the ceremony. They should not be a source of distraction. Prior to your wedding, your Wedding Coordinator will give specific instructions to your photographer and/or videographer, along with a map of the chapel or church, showing where they are permitted to take pictures.

The photographer will remain behind where your guests are seated. They may not walk up and down the center aisle, in front of the pews, or up in the sanctuary area. They may take pictures from either of the side aisles of the church or from the right aisle of the chapel. They may use flash during the procession and recessional but not during the ceremony itself.

You will have a half-hour (30 min.) after your wedding to take pictures in the chapel or church. Your Wedding Coordinator will bring the bride, groom, and wedding party back into the chapel or church, once your guests have exited. Only pictures of those participating in the actual wedding ceremony will be taken. If you wish to have your picture taken with the celebrant, please coordinate with your photographer that this will be the first picture. Pictures with friends and relatives who were not part of the actual wedding will be taken at the reception.

The videographer may set up to one side of the sanctuary or behind where your guests are seated and remains stationary throughout your wedding. It is important that videographers follow our rules, so that future couples can use their services.

CHURCH DONATIONS AND FEES

Wedding fees are payable to OLGC and are to be given directly to the Director of Liturgy at least three (3) months in advance of your wedding date. The amount of the fees are left up to what the couple can afford. Please note that the fees ordinarily cover the organist and cantor and the altar servers, and the Priest. In addition, flowers for the altar may be purchased through the church for a fee of \$300.

ALCOHOL POLICY

To marry, one must be able to exercise FULL CONSENT OF THE WILL. Drinking would impair the person's ability to consent and could invalidate the marriage itself. Therefore, if either the bride or the groom is intoxicated for either the rehearsal or the wedding, the wedding will not take place.

Therefore ABSOLUTELY NO ALCOHOL is permitted on the OLGC campus, for either the evening of the rehearsal or the day of the wedding. The bride and groom is responsible for reminding their drivers, ushers, guests, etc. that we will not tolerate any alcoholic beverages on the OLGC Campus.

FOR YOUR SAFETY

We have adopted certain policies at OLGC to ensure your safety and the safety of your guests and out of respect for those who work here, and those who worship here and for our property.

- Please advise your guests that **NO RICE, BIRDSEED, FLOWERS, OR CONFETTI** may be thrown. This is out of concern for the safety of church visitors and out of respect for the sacredness of church property.
- **AISLE RUNNERS ARE PROHIBITED.** They are dangerous underfoot, particularly for guests with disabilities and during the procession to receive Holy Communion.
- **NOTHING MAY BE THROWN OR DROPPED ON THE AISLE.**

PLEASE REMEMBER:

Everything concerning your wedding must be received by the appropriate person at OLGC at least one (1) month BEFORE your wedding.

The bridal room will be locked during the wedding to secure personal possessions. However, items of value (purses, jewelry etc.) should be locked securely in the trunks of locked cars. OLGC cannot take responsibility for any personal property lost or stolen.

Receiving Lines are not allowed.

OLD TESTAMENT READINGS

First Reading - 1

Gn 1:26-28, 31a

A reading from the Book of Genesis

Then God said: "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness.
Let them have dominion over the fish of the sea,
the birds of the air, and the cattle, and over all the wild animals
and all the creatures that crawl on the ground."

God created man in his image;
in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

MUSIC FOR YOUR WEDDING

Once you have chosen the Scripture Readings for your wedding, it is time to move on to choosing the music.

Some things to consider:

Liturgical Seasons – Music selections should be in keeping with the liturgical seasons.

Recorded Music – The liturgy is a complex use of signs expressed by living human beings. Music, being preeminent among those signs, ought to be "live". Recorded music is never to be used within the liturgy to replace the congregation, the choir, the organist or other instrumentalists. Therefore, in keeping with what the Church teaches about music for liturgy, recorded music is not allowed for weddings at OLG.

Marian Devotion – It is hopeful and encouraged that a couple has a spiritual devotion to the Blessed Mother as part of their married life together. The practice of bringing flowers to the statue of the Blessed Mother takes place simply after the Prayer after Communion and can be accompanied by a Marian Hymn, such as *Hail Mary/Gentle Woman* or *On This Day O Beautiful Mother*.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR MUSIC FOR YOUR WEDDING.

*These musical selections are suggestions. However, if there is some other piece of music which has special meaning to you, do not hesitate to request it. We will try to accommodate your wishes if we can. *indicates selections for Wedding within the Mass.*

Prelude

Prelude music should foster an atmosphere of prayer while members of the assembly are gathering and being seated. Several selections may be used; combining instrumental as well as appropriate vocal pieces.

Procession/Entrance Song

Music for the entrance song should focus the assembly's attention on their role as active participants of the liturgy. The procession and entrance song should be appropriate. Whether instrumental or sung, the entrance song should be an appropriate hymn of praise or a hymn of petition, asking God's blessing on the couple to be married.

Psalm Response (after 1st reading)

The Responsorial Psalm is ordinarily sung. The musical setting of any psalm is appropriate here, provided it is responsorial in style, i.e. the cantor sings the verses and the assembly responds with the sung refrain. Psalms 33, 34, 103, 112, 128, 145, and 148 are very appropriate for weddings. Songs based on psalms which paraphrase the text of the psalm are not to be used in place of the Responsorial Psalm.

Gospel Acclamation (also known as the **Alleluia**)

The gospel acclamation should always be sung. An appropriate setting of the "Alleluia" or acclamation of praise during the season of Lent can be chosen.

***Preparation of Gifts**

Because in the context of a wedding this ritual action does not take a long time, it is important that music not be so long as to interrupt the flow of the liturgy. Often solos will do just that and place undue importance on this part of the liturgy. Instrumental music is highly recommended for the preparation of the gifts.

***Mass Acclamations** (including Holy, Memorial Acclamation, Amen)

The Preface Acclamations, Memorial Acclamation and Concluding Doxology should be chosen from settings that are familiar to most practicing Catholics. As a matter of course, guests who make up the assembly often come from different parishes. Keeping in mind the active, full, and conscious participation of the assembly, the setting of these acclamations should be familiar and easy for the assembly to sing.

***Communion**

The music for the communion procession should be Eucharistic in nature, i.e., expressing praise and thanksgiving and stressing our oneness in Christ. Ideally, a short, simple refrain to be sung by the assembly with the verses sung by a cantor should be selected.

Closing/Recessional

The music at the Nuptial Procession is traditionally instrumental and joyful in nature. The style may vary from traditional to the avant-garde or from stately to dance-like. The operative words here are appropriate and dignified.

This includes completing all of your paperwork, Pre-Cana requirements, and paying of the appropriate fees associated with your wedding. **Everything concerning your wedding must be received by the appropriate person at OLGC at least one (1) month BEFORE your wedding.**

Deadlines Checklist:

6 months prior

- ___ Confirm your wedding date and time the Director of Liturgy.
- ___ Confirm your rehearsal date and time with the Liturgy Assistant.
- ___ Sign up for one (1) Diocesan Preparation Program.

3 months prior

- ___ Pay your OLGC wedding fee to the Director of Liturgy.
- ___ Meet with the Director of Liturgy.
- ___ After meeting with the Director of Liturgy, meet with the Wedding Coordinator (at least one (1) months prior to your wedding).

1 month prior

- ___ Turn in the following documents to your priest:
 - ___ Baptismal certificates
 - ___ Certificate of Attendance from your Diocesan Preparation Program
 - ___ Affidavits of Free Status to Marry
 - ___ Give your marriage license to your priest.
 - ___ All information regarding your Mass/Ceremony to the Director of Liturgy
