ABOUT THE SPRING-FORD COMMUNITY

Spring-Ford Area School District is located in the western portion of Montgomery County. The district is comprised of the Townships of Limerick and Upper Providence and the Boroughs of Royersford and Spring City. The growing community of approximately 52,000 offers the best of both a small-town atmosphere and proximity to metropolitan attractions. The location offers easy access to the cultural appeal of Philadelphia, as well as the warmth and nurturing feel of suburban America.

The district is approximately 20 miles northwest of Philadelphia, 25 miles south of Reading, and five miles north of Valley Forge National Park. The district has a combined land area of 44.4 square miles, and the 2020 US Census population of the district is 50,990, compared to 47,368 in 2010 and 36,483 in 2000.

Spring-Ford is dedicated to providing excellent personnel services by assisting the district's school and departments in hiring and retaining the best qualified applicants. More specifically, the Office of Human Resources supports the implementation of the district's plan of achievement by providing optimal services and support to meet the needs of our students, staff and community.

Spring-Ford AREA HIGH SCHOOL

Spring-Ford Area High School's philosophy is based on the premise that all students should be provided with opportunities to acquire the knowledge and develop the skills essential to survive and prosper in a changing world. The high school is comprised of two buildings: a 9th Grade Center with more than 640 students and a 10-12th Grade Center with more than 1,900 students.

Spring-Ford Area High School has been recognized by Newsweek as one of America's Top High Schools and a U.S. News and World Report Best High School in America. In addition, SFAHS has been recognized eight times as an Annual AP District Honor Roll recipient.

SFAHS course offerings include Advanced Placement, Dual Enrollment, Honors and Academic. A typical Spring-Ford high school student's schedule includes between 6.0 and 6.9 credits per year. Courses are taught on a traditional schedule with fifty-minute class periods. SFAHS has more than 30 clubs that students can join in addition to the many sports, music and theater groups. Many clubs offer social and learning opportunities for students during the day and after school. Some of the club offerings include the Rampage Newspaper, Rambler Yearbook, Academic Team and several community service clubs.

Spring-Ford Area School District is pleased to offer Spring-Ford Cyber Learning (SFCL) all students, grades K-12. SFCL has been developed by the Spring-Ford Curriculum and Instruction Department, and will be taught by the Spring-Ford teachers your child already knows. SFCL offers students the opportunity to engage in personalized education from home, with the added benefit of being eligible to participate in many SFASD extra-curricular activities.

The goal of SFCL is ultimately to provide a seamless blending of online and brick-and-mortar offerings for all students.

What is traditional "cyber school?" Attending cyber school is different from being home-schooled. With homeschooling you buy the curriculum and implement it yourself. You are responsible for reporting progress to the state. In a Cyber School, Spring-Ford will provide the curriculum for you! Once enrolled, your student will be assigned teachers their academic subjects. They can video chat, voice chat, or communicate via LMS messages. If a student needs assistance, they can "go to" the office virtually to speak with their teacher. There may be certain designated times that the office is open or their teachers are available to chat.

What does school day look like? Cyber learning offers individualized instruction and flexibility so that students and families can find a schedule that works best for them. This approach makes for day-to-day schedules that are unique for each student, so it's difficult to pin down exactly what a day in the life of your student is truly like. What might a day look like for your family? That can be up to you to decide!



The oversight of the special education program is coordinated through Special Education Supervisors for the elementary, middle and high school level. The Special Education Supervisors work closely with the building administrative teams, school counselors, teachers and the curriculum office. Building administrators structure the schedules so that students can be included to the maximum extent possible with appropriate support. In addition, building administrators work closely with staff schedules to ensure common planning time for co-teaching. Curriculum administrators work closely with school-based administrators to provide support for adaptations, modifications, and professional development. The supervisors of special education meet weekly with the assistant superintendent to discuss programs and improvements.

The strength of the special education leadership has been to articulate the delivery and purposeful planning of special education programs K -12 within the least restrictive environment. There is continual communication among all supervisors regarding programs, interventions, and state updates which is shared with administrators, staff and parents. In addition, the special education supervisors attend meetings of the Right to Education Local Task Force in Montgomery County as well as county wide Special Education Administrator meetings and trainings at the Intermediate Unit and PaTTAN. Spring-Ford has access to the Montgomery County Intermediate Unit, Approved Private Schools, and other local school districts for additional programs, if needed.

Program Highlight - Unified Sports: The Special Olympics sports project's vision is to allow high school students to collectively represent their school in a sanctioned activity by participating together on a Unified Sports team.

LET'S GET STARTED: how to enroll

When you are ready to enroll your child(ren) in school, please visit our Student Registration page online at spring-ford.net. Pre-registration takes place entirely online. After completing the pre-registration process, you will be provided an opportunity within to schedule an appointment at the District Office or your sending school to complete the process. In addition, you will receive a checklist of the documents you will need to bring to your appointment. Failure to bring sufficient documentation will delay the enrollment of your student.

Submitting the pre-registration information online does not guarantee your student has met the requirements for admittance to the school district. Only a natural parent or court-appointed guardian living in the school district and at the same residence of the student may register a student. Parents/guardians are legally obligated to provide accurate information during the registration process. Any information deemed inaccurate may result in legal action.

The following documents must be submitted at your registration appointment:


- Student's original birth record
- Student's immunization record
- Custody agreement/court order if parents are separated or divorced (if applicable)
- Academic records (transcript if grades 9-12; latest report card if grades 1-8)
- Evaluation Report (ER), Individual Education Program (IEP), Gifted Individual Education Program (GIEP) and/or 504 documentation (if applicable)
- Verification of address
 - o Deed/settlement statement
 - o Current signed lease agreement

Plus one of the following

- Current paid per capita tax receipt
- Current paid utility bill (gas, water, electric or phone)
- PA vehicle registration or PA driver's license
- Paycheck stub
