

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

Congratulations to West Hill for winning and they will keep the sports day cup in their area until 2022.










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ParentPay set up reminder

Miss Atkinson, our Learning Support Manager, received this heartwarming message from one of her Year 7 students. It is always a pleasure to read messages like this as we know how closely our





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








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Lastly, as I leave you with my final words, for this week, term and academic year, I would like to thank you for your endless support of our academy, staff and as always, our students, your children. Throughout this year your honest and informed commentary and feedback has enabled us to reflect upon, amend and inform our practice. I have recently been made aware of a lovely thought, which I believe embodied you, our parents and carers and our academy staff and students. I credit our PiXL Partners for this profound commentary, below, which I feel is worthy of your attention and presented with the best of intent: 'You may not have heard of the Goldsaddle Goatfish: it is a golden fish, although it has the amazing ability to change its colour between yellow and blue and at night, turns a pink colour. These fish are found in the Red Sea. They are not big fish, nothing remarkable in size or stature, they are a similar size to a red mullet, but these fish know how to punch above their weight.



The Goldsaddle Goatfish has various predators which threaten its existence; a small lone fish is often vulnerable to bigger, more threatening prey and this is a challenge they have to deal with daily. Yet these fish have found a clever way round the problem, with some divers starting to report some very interesting behaviour when these fish are under threat.

When the fish see a predator or sense they are under attack, they all group together and swim in close formation so that they have the appearance of one large fish. They form a perfect fish pattern and to the outside world, they appear to be one large and powerful unit, ready to tackle any predator coming at them. They perform complimentary actions as a team to bring down their prey or fend off attack. They work incredibly as a team: when one of them senses a prey fish, other fish join in the hunt and block the escape path for the prey fish, giving their fish partner in crime the best chance of winning.

These fish are alert, they work hard and they work together to fight the threat that is in their midst. They

change up their strategy depending on what the occasion demands and they work as a team, and as individual fish, so they can win. When they are together forming a 'big fish' they feel brave, they feel fearless and they face up to any threat.

BUT...

When the threat is over, the large fish shape dismantles and every little fish falls out of formation and swims their own way, spending their day exploring the seabed and finding food. Our academy, parents and carers have had nearly two years of swimming as a big fish. As individuals we have come together, swimming as closely as possible to manage the threat we faced. Being together helped us feel brave and to feel fearless when we felt anything but at times. The threats have been real,





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the demands have been tough, the changing climate a real challenge.



But...now our summer holiday begins.

Whilst we will have to come back to make ourselves 'big fish' again, as we re-join as one, in September, now is not that time. Now is the time to fall out of 'big fish' formation, to swim free, to ponder, to wander, to rest and reflect – to recover. To live our lives away from the fear of what might be coming to find us or what we have to overcome.

Fall out of formation, our wonderful parents, carers, students and staff. Now is the time to swim free.' Keep very, very well and exceptionally safe, enjoy your well-deserved break and I look forward to welcoming you all again, to our gates, in September
