INFORMATION FOR CHS STUDENTS TAKING AP EXAMS

Upon our return from spring break, there will be just three weeks until the start of 2021 AP Exams. While we will send additional details about what to bring to your exams along with reminders about when and where to report, we want to provide some information now to help you plan for what to expect during the AP Exam period. Significant things you need to know and consider include:

- 1. Morning AP Exams start at 8:00 a.m., even though the school day at CHS begins at 8:45. If you are taking morning exams, you are expected to arrive at your testing location no later than 7:30 a.m. This is true on late-start days as well.
- 2. Afternoon AP Exams start at 12:00 p.m. (noon). If you are taking afternoon exams, you are expected to arrive at your testing location no later than 11:45 a.m. Since the lunch period does not start until 11:55 each day, students with afternoon exams will be released from their second period class at 11:15 a.m. The cafeteria will be ready to start serving students taking AP exams at that time. NOTE: if you have a morning and afternoon exam on the same day, you will need to bring your own food to eat between exams.
- 3. Some afternoon AP Exams may not end prior to the end of the school day. Students will not be allowed to leave the exam early and should make appropriate arrangements regarding transportation or late arrival to sports practices and/or a job.
- 4. If you have decided not to take a test (for any reason), please cancel your exam in Total Registration by Thursday, April 29, 2021 for a full refund.

Thank you for considering the information we've shared above and for planning ahead to ensure that your testing experience is a positive one. Please continue to read your email regularly, such as exam room assignments, to be sure that you are receiving the most up-to-date information about your upcoming AP Exams.

SUMMER SCHOOL-GENERAL REMINDERS

Indiana Online Academy Summer School Registration: The window for CHS students registering for IOA's summer school opened November 1st and will close Friday, May 28th. (NOTE: registration for PE I & PE II closed on March 1.) IOA summer courses run June 7th-July 18th. To register, go to https:// indianaonlineacademy.org and follow the link to enroll for the summer session. You will need to have your student's CHS ID available when you register. CHS students may register for College Entrance Preparation, any course a student is eligible to take under the CHS retake policy, any course a student has failed, or a math course to get back on sequence (students cannot take a math course to work ahead unless the student is trying to get back on track in math). There is no charge for CHS students taking courses through IOA. At this time registration for PE I and PE II is closed. The registration deadline for PE courses was March 1.

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COUNSELING CENTER SUMMER HOURS

COURSE SELECTION FOR 2021-2022/SCHEDULE CHANGE REMINDER

By now, all of our students have met with their counselors to choose their classes for the next academic year.

The next step in scheduling for the coming year is to build the master schedule of classes. Because the master schedule (and staffing) is based on the number of students who have requested various courses, as the work of finalizing the schedule is in progress, we no longer have the flexibility to accommodate every request for changes to students' course choices. Between March 1 and May 1, changes to students' course selections can be made only if space is available in the requested class. Please note May 1 is the final date for changes in schedules for both the first and second semester classes for the 2021-2022 school year.

Submission of the scholarship confirmation form and notification letters will enable your child to be recognized in the commencement bulletin.

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TESTING INFORMATION


The SAT will be offered at Carmel High School on May 8 and June 5. Juniors should register at www.collegeboard.org by April 8 for the May SAT and by May 6 for the June SAT.

The ACT will NOT be offered at Carmel High School on June 12 or July 17 but will be offered at various locations around the area. Juniors should register at www.act. org by May 7 for the June ACT and by June 18 for the July ACT.


CLASS OF 2022 & THE ACT/SAT

The first SAT will be on August 28. Registration for this test will open sometime in April. The second test date will be October 2 with a registration deadline around September 6. Students can register at the SAT website, www. collegeboard.org.

The first ACT test will be September 11. The registration deadline will be around August 6. You can register at the ACT website, www.act.org.



We encourage you to send your test scores to 4 colleges for FREE within your registration process for the SAT and the ACT. Colleges will ultimately look at your highest test scores submitted to consider you for admission. If you wait to send your scores later, you will have to pay a fee for each college and run the risk of your test scores not arriving by your college application



deadlines. Please note that both Indiana University and Purdue University, among other universities, will require your test scores (both SAT and ACT) to be received directly from the testing company.

Since many colleges are now TEST OPTIONAL with your college application, you can still send your SAT or ACT scores to schools through the registration process and decide later whether or not to submit your scores for admission. Even if you have submitted test scores to colleges, if you indicate you do NOT want test scores considered for admission, then the school will not include the test scores previously sent in your admission consideration.

Be sure to take advantage of the FREE online SAT test prep available through your PSAT scores and the Khan Academy. You can find this information within your College Board account. For additional test prep opportunities, please visit our Canvas Counseling Course.

Requesting Your Final Transcript: Almost all colleges require a final transcript and we DO NOT send them automatically – your student must make the request for a final transcript in Naviance Student and tell us where he/she plans to attend. Final transcripts will be delivered to colleges the last week of June.

Requesting the Final Transcript

- 1. Select Colleges I am applying to
- 2. Select **Edit** to indicate your admission **RESULT** for that college; i.e. Accepted
- 3. Select Save College Application
- 4. Select +REQUEST TRANSCRIPTS
- 5. What type of transcript are you requesting? Check Final
- **6.** Where are you sending the transcript? Click drop-down menu and then select the college whom you would like to receive your Final Transcript.
- 7. Select **Done**

Please note that we do not mail final transcripts to graduating seniors, but you are welcome to stop by the Counseling Center any time after June 30 to pick up a copy. You may call Maria Pacalo at 317-571-5922 Ext. 7431 or email her at mpacalo@ccs.k12.in.us. Parents of graduating seniors may get transcripts through the summer months, but after September 1, only the graduate will be allowed access to any of his/her Carmel High School records. Remember your PowerSchool account will be de-activated shortly after graduation.

PHONE, ADDRESS AND EMAIL UPDATE REMINDER

Parents - please remember to notify the school with updated contact information. This includes home address, primary contact numbers and email addresses. Now that the school is using phone and email communication for most of the important school information and announcements, it is vital that we have correct phone numbers and email addresses. You can contact the Counseling Center with any changes by emailing either Pat Barker at pbarker@ccs.k12.in.us or Julie Van Buren at jvanbure@ccs.k12.in.us If updating your address we will need TWO proofs of the new residence which include a gas or electric bill AND one of the following: lease agreement, settlement statement, warranty deed, homeowner's insurance policy or mortgage statement.

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CLASS OF 2022...NEED HELP UNDERSTANDING THE COLLEGE APPLICATION PROCESS?

Are you wondering what your rising seniors can be doing to prepare for the college application process? Be sure to watch the 10 Things To Do Before You Start Senior Year video presentation. The goal of the presentation is to provide a road map for next steps, no matter where they are in the process of planning for life after high school.

The CHS College & Career Resource Center has created a Class of 2022 Virtual College Application Boot Camp Course in Canvas that covers every aspect of the college search and application process. All CHS juniors will be invited to join the College Application Boot Camp Course after spring break. With this virtual format, you can work through the information, videos, and exercises on YOUR schedule as quickly or as slowly as you'd like! Summer would be an ideal time to work through this boot camp course in preparation for the Fall semester, when many students will be completing college applications. **NOTE:** there are no "assignments" or grades associated with the boot camp course, just a lot of useful information to help take the mystery out of the process.


Prior to the start of the 2021-22 school year, (tentatively scheduled for August 3rd and 4th), we will offer in-person college application and essay help sessions between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. At these help sessions, students can have drafts of their college essays reviewed and get help with application processes and questions. More details about how to sign up for a help session slot will be shared with you and your parents after spring break. While space will be limited during the help sessions in August, please know that additional opportunities to get help will be available!

Additionally, every fall semester, the College & Career Resource Center (CCRC) offers multiple opportunities for seniors to have college essays reviewed and get their application questions answered during SSRT group help sessions and/or individual appointments. The CCRC also sponsors several programs related to the college search and application process, financial aid resources, and more throughout the school year. We promise to let you know when and how to take advantage of these opportunities.

EXPLORING COLLEGES AND CAREERS...WHERE TO START?

Planning for life after high school is a process that requires access to information, opportunities to explore, and first-hand experience. There are many paths that students can pursue, and narrowing down the options can seem daunting. If parents and students approach planning from the perspective of finding a good "fit", the process of identifying college and career options can prove enjoyable...and much less stressful! The following are suggested steps and resources to help students navigate this process:

- 1. Students should take steps to understand how their interests, skills, and personality type fit with the world of work. Students can start this self-exploration step by logging into their Naviance Student account to take career assessments, research careers, and identify educational pathways for a variety of career areas. To access Naviance, students can login to the CCS Student Portal using their usual login information and click on the Naviance icon. There is no separate username/password.
- 2. Students should identify the criteria that is most important to them in finding a college fit. They can do this by using college search tools in their Naviance Student account. These tools allow students to identify personal criteria and provides a list of schools that match that criteria. Also see our Finding Your College Fit quick guide in the Counseling Department Canvas Course.
- 3. Students should gather information about specific college options in order to determine which will prove to be the best fit. College/university websites are a great place to start this research about admissions requirements, majors/academic programs, special opportunities, and scholarships. Students should also take advantage of local and virtual college fairs as well as college admission rep visits to Carmel High School in the fall semester. These opportunities are highlighted in students' Naviance Student account and via social media.





- 4. Students should schedule a campus visit...or two! (see the Campus Visits article) Or if you are unable to physically visit right now, check out the many programs offered by colleges/universities as well as virtual college tours available at www. youvisit.com/virtualrealityexperiences/colleges
- 5. Students should identify opportunities to gain experience in areas of interest. Students can gain exposure to potential majors and careers through their CHS coursework, part-time jobs, internships, volunteer/service work, summer programs, and more! This type of exposure helps students fine-tune their options and gets them excited about the possibilities! Many resources exist for finding these types of experiences including this comprehensive summer program database: www.teenlife.org. INCLUDE CAMPUS VISITS IN YOUR COLLEGE SEARCH PLANS!


Campus visits are an excellent way for students and families to gather information about colleges and move closer to helping students find a good college fit. Parents are encouraged to help their student(s) plan visits to a variety of colleges and universities with the aim of providing exposure to a variety of campus environments (large/small, public/private, etc.) It is never too early to visit colleges, and often these visits serve as powerful motivators for students to strive to do their best academically and improve their candidacy for admissions.

Planning a campus visit is easy. Start by visiting the college/university website. Many visits can be arranged online, while others just require a call to the admissions office to set up the official visit. Most official visits include a campus tour as well as individual or group meetings with admissions representatives. Don't hesitate to ask if you can sit in a class, talk to professors/advisors, or talk to current students. The more information students can gather to make an informed decision, the better!

NOTE: many colleges and universities are starting to open their campuses to inperson visits, but even those that have not yet are offering a wide variety of virtual visit programs. Some schools are offering both in-person and virtual options to allow for greater access to students interested in their school! Check the admissions websites for colleges of interest to learn more about in-person and virtual visit opportunities.

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CHS Counseling Update

CHS PTO COUNSELING UPDATE MARCH 2, 2021

- March 1st was the deadline for students to make changes to their 2021-22 course requests for any reason. Between March 2nd and May 1st, counselors can only make changes if there is room in a course. The final deadline to make schedule change requests for the entire 2021-22 school year is May 1st, 2021. Limited reasons for schedule changes after May 1st are listed in the Carmel High School Program of Studies.
- All AP exam registration and payment has closed for May 2021
 exams. Students who did not register for an exam but wish to do
 so, can be placed on a waitlist, should someone cancel their exam.
 Students currently registered for an exam who wish to cancel their
 registration may receive a full-refund until April 30th. After April 30th,
 no refunds will be processed.
- CHS Social Workers are working to support students and families! The winter months can be a stressful and difficult time for students and families, especially during a Global Pandemic. Please remember that CHS Social Workers are here to help by collaborating with PTO to implement the backpack program; meeting individually with students, in person and virtually, to provide support for mental health, emotional needs, family crisis, and more; providing community resource information; guiding students through organizational and academic concerns.
- Virtual College Exploration Opportunities. While some colleges/ universities are allowing for on-campus visits, the current global pandemic has limited the options for visiting campuses. There is no shortage of virtual college exploration opportunities though! Be sure to encourage your students to check the websites of their schools of interest to join virtual information sessions, student panels, and more. They should also check out these upcoming virtual college fair events:

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In-Person Instruction Update Grades 6-12

Dear CCS Family,

Our administrative team in cooperation with the Carmel Teachers Association has gone through a very detailed evaluation of how we might return grades 6-12 to every day learning. Through this evaluation, we have determined that it is in the best interests of our students to remain in the hybrid model for the remaining 8 weeks of the school year for the following reasons:

CLASS SIZE AND BALANCE

We were not able to combine our student cohorts and keep classes balanced. Excluding typically large classes like band, choir, and orchestra, when we combined classes for everyday learning, CHS had 6 classes with over 50 students, 12 classes with 40-47 students and 8 classes with 35-37 students. We had very minimal opportunities to change student schedules to better balance classes and keep students with their current teachers.

At the middle school level, we had similar issues with each school having 30 to 50 classes with 35-43 students enrolled. The balancing process would result in over 100 students requiring a change of teacher.

SOCIAL DISTANCING

The larger classes noted above make any social distancing unmanageable. At CHS our current average lunch period now has approximately 560 students. Combining our cohorts would result in lunch periods of 1100-1200 in each of 4 lunch periods. This would require expansion into other areas of the building to create 3-6 feet of distance.

In our middle schools, the larger classes noted above make any social distancing unmanageable as well. Our middle school lunch periods currently have an average of about 110 students. Lunch periods would increase to 220-260 students again requiring expansion to other areas of the building to create 3-6 feet of distance.

TRANSPORTATION

Increased ridership as a result of combining the cohorts would result in over-crowding of busses which is already compounded by the shortage of bus drivers. We would anticipate an increase in the number of double bus routes where busses would pick up groups of students early, drop them off at school and go back out to pick up students on another route potentially causing delays in the start of school and in returning students home in the afternoon.

MOVING FORWARD

Our plan moving forward is to maintain the current hybrid schedule for the rest of the school year with the intention of returning to full-time, every day learning in the fall.

We will continue to work with our medical community and follow the safety precautions moving forward. We will also work with the school community at CHS and each middle school to create additional social opportunities and events where students who feel comfortable can safely gather before the end of the school year. In addition, we will continue to help students who may be struggling

academically. Please reach out to your student's school counselor/social worker if you student needs support of any kind.

We are sorry for any additional stress or pressure this process has put on our students, staff, and families. We appreciate the feedback we have received from our school community from all sides. We will continue to communicate in real-time as this pandemic environment evolves and eventually comes to an end. Thank you for your patience, kindness and support through these complex and difficult times.
