

# Let's Begin the Summer Reading Adventure!!!




Read through the list of tips to help you get started.

- Challenge yourself when selecting the activities and most importantly, have fun!!!


  Our goal is for you to read to learn and to love to read!

# Reading Response Activity Board for Fiction



As you read your book, take time to answer the questions below in your reader's response notebook. Make sure to answer in complete sentence and use details from the story. Have fun and be creative.

Identify the setting of your story? Remember the setting is the where and the when the story takes place.	Who is the main character of the story? What does the character's actions/choices tell you about him/her? Use evidence from the text?
Would you recommend this book to a friend? Write a book review to convince your friend to read the book?	If you could rewrite the ending of the story, what would you change and why?
Which character from the story do you have the most in common with and why?	Illustrate your favorite part of your book?
Write a summary of tonight's reading.	In this point in your book, have any characters changed and how?
Which character did you like the most in the story? Why?	List some examples of conflict that the main character(s) experienced. Are the conflicts realistic? How did the conflicts get resolved?

# To Access NewsELA:

- Go to <a href="https://www.bufsd.org/myapps">www.bufsd.org/myapps</a>
- From District Subscriptions, select NewsELA
- It may ask you to enter your District Microsoft Office Login.
- Once you are on the site, you will see Latest News on your screen. These are the most updated current events.
- Select one by clicking onto the title. Remember you can also change the Lexile to match your most recent RI score.
- If those topics are not speaking to your interest, you can search the different articles within topic areas along the left side.
- When you are done, take the quiz. Use the Choice board on the side to dive deeper into the text. Answer a few question in your notebook.


