Dear Program Participants and Family Members,

This brochure is to assist you in choosing a service provider in Kitsap County. The providers listed in this brochure are eligible to receive long-term and short term funding from Kitsap County Human Services for adult (21 years of age and older) employment and community access services.

There are other agencies in the county who provide similar functions but they are ineligible to bill Kitsap County for these services. If you would like a full list of all providers please call our office (360-337-4622) and request a Resource Guide.

As a Kitsap County Funded program participant, you are assigned a monthly funding allocation (average \$540.00) to purchase employment or community access services from one of the agencies on the list of approved providers. If, after selecting a service provider you are not satisfied with the services you are receiving you may choose to change providers at any time. We request you give the provider and your DDD Case Manager a 30-day notice.

ABLE OPPORTUNITIES

CARF-accredited Able Opportunities, Inc. seeks to empower individuals with disAbilities in achieving their highest level of autonomy in all aspects of life. Serving Kitsap County and the Puget Sound region, Able Opportunities, Inc. specializes in two primary areas:

- Vocational Services, including Independent Living Skills Evaluation and Training, Work Skill Assessment, Person-Centered Planning, Job Development and Placement, Job Coaching, long-term Supported Employment and Job Retention, enabling individuals to realize their full potential in both the workplace and their communities; and
- Communication Consultation, for individuals who do not use formal language. Alternative strategies training is provided to individuals with disAbilities, their support teams, schools and employers. "Nonlinguistic Communication Strategies," a two-day hands-on, participatory workshop, has been praised for providing participants with functional, easy-to-use techniques and system materials that can be implemented immediately upon completion of the training.

PATHWAYS TO EMPLOYMENT

Pathways to Employment, LLC (PTE) works, in the Kitsap community, to create and support employment opportunities for citizens challenged by disability. PTE provides a broad range of vocational services. Person to Person services, Assessments, Supported Employment, Intensive Training, Job Coaching, Retention, and Independent Living assistance are among the services provided. PTE is dedicated to the principles of choice and person centered planning in each phase of all of its programs.

The Co Directors of Pathways to Employment work directly in the vocational rehabilitation field as Employment Specialists, working with individuals and their support teams to support and assist consumers with their individual vocational goals. PTE Job Coaches provide skilled employment training support for task mastery and long term support for job retention. PTE works with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR), the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) and the Division of Services for the Blind (DSB).

Believing that a strong community creates and supports opportunity for all of its citizens, PTE works within the Kitsap community to support the needs of both consumers and local employers. PTE's programs include outreach, networking, and education to the local business community as part of an overall effort to increase vocational opportunities.

PTE works closely with the district schools to help transition students and their families prepare for the transition from school to work.

Power and Choice - Making our own choices and directing our own lives;


Relationships - Having people in our lives whom we love and care about and who love and care about us;

Status/Contribution - Feeling good about ourselves and having others recognize us for what we contribute to others and our community;

Integration - Being a part of our community, through active involvement. This means doing things we enjoy as well as new and interesting things;

Competence - Learning to do things on our own or be supported to do things for ourselves; and

Health and Safety - Feeling safe and secure, and being healthy.



PENINSULA SERVICES

Peninsula Services mission is to assist persons with developmental disabilities, mental illness and other challenges, in developing skills and capabilities by providing a wide array of rehabilitative and supportive services. The agency provides assessment, rehabilitative work training, job placement and employment options to persons with disabilities in Kitsap County. Peninsula Services has been in Kitsap County since 1971 and is currently serving approximately 200 people each year. Delivery of these services is accomplished in a number of ways including the procurement of actual contracts to serve as training or employment sites, the direct job placement of individuals with employers in the community, or through productive work training opportunities established by Peninsula Services itself. Peninsula Services is accredited by (Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities) CARF and is certified to provide services to the Division of Developmental Disabilities, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Dept. of Labor and Industries and the Veteran's Administration. On the job training, use of the latest technology, as well as accommodations that may be needed for individual participants, promote excellence in work performance. All services may be provided on a group and/or individual basis. It is the philosophy of the organization that all persons have the capacity to work, grow, and excel.

KITSAP APPLIED TECHNOLOGIES

Kitsap Applied Technologies (KAT) incorporated in 1984 as a private nonprofit organization provides vocational training, employment, community access and retirement services to adults with profound developmental disabilities. KAT implements these services in five programs; 1) Specialized Industries (Prevocational Services) providing vocational training and employment to individuals who perform subcontract jobs in an industrial setting. 2) Group Supported Employment providing vocational training and employment to small groups of 3—6 individuals within a community business. 3) Individual Supported Employment providing individuals with competitive community employment and direct support training. 4) Person to Person provides development of a pathway to employment planning, community exploration in pursuit of pathway goals and ongoing 1:1 support for successful community integration. 5) Retirement/Community Access providing opportunities for elderly individuals to participate in a variety of community activities. Training programs and goals are designed to each participant's needs. Staff are skilled professionals who train the participant to promote the individual's self-esteem, confidence and work independence. KAT recognizes each participant as an individual first, entitled to the privileges and respect which follow from the highest ethical standards with rights to privacy, personal choice, independence, individuality, and management of his/her own life style; and as an adult and citizen of our community entitled to the opportunity to work as a contributing member of our community.

Available Services

Individual Supported Employment: Services are part of an individual's pathway to employment. These are placement and follow-up services necessary to help persons with developmental disabilities obtain and continue integrated, living wage employment in the community, in business or industry. This service may include creating work opportunities, support to the supervisors and/or peer workers to enable them to support the person on the job, on-the-job training, and modification of work site or tasks.

Group Supported Employment: Services are part of an individual's pathway to employment. These are supervised employment and training opportunities in regular business and industry settings leading to an individual being able to secure gainful employment earning a living wage. Group Supported Employment is located in an integrated community business/industry employing groups of no more than eight (8) workers with developmental disabilities.

Community Access Services: Services that assist people with developmental disabilities who are 62 and older who have retired and choose not to work. Services will assist individuals to participate in activities, events and organizations in the community in ways similar to others of retirement age.

Person to Person: Services are part of an individual's pathway to employment. A combination of services and supports may be needed to assist people to: develop and implement self directed services, develop person centered employment plans, prepare individualized budgets, live, recreate, volunteer in the community and/or obtain generic community resources needed to achieve integration and employment.

Available only by Exception to Policy through the Division of Developmental Disabilities

Prevocational Services/Specialized Industries: Services are part of an individual's pathway to employment. These are sheltered employment and training opportunities leading to an individual being able to secure gainful employment earning a living wage. Specialized Industries (often called sheltered workshops) generally train groups of nine or more people with disabilities in the same setting.

HOLLY RIDGE CENTER

Holly Ridge Center's Adult Employment Services (AES) is a rehabilitation agency providing community based employment services to adults with disabilities. The AES programs provide a variety of employment services through contracting with Kitsap County Developmental Disabilities, Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, school district contracts and through private pay support agreements. Our programs have been recognized for 43 years of service in the community. The center offers three program formats: 1) Group Supported Employment which staffs an onsite, skilled vocational trainer who supports up to seven individuals in performing their community based jobs. 2) Independent Supported Employment (ISE) is competitive employment opportunities by local business. The ISE Placement team assist the employer in understanding and providing the accommodations needed for their employees' success. 3) High School Transitional Employment which are AES contracts with individual school districts developed on a specific student plan basis. The focus on each program is meeting the individual need, abilities, and goals of the participant. Holly Ridge Center has on staff a team of skilled professionals, trained to assist individuals with disabilities achieve and maintain successful and meaningful employment.
