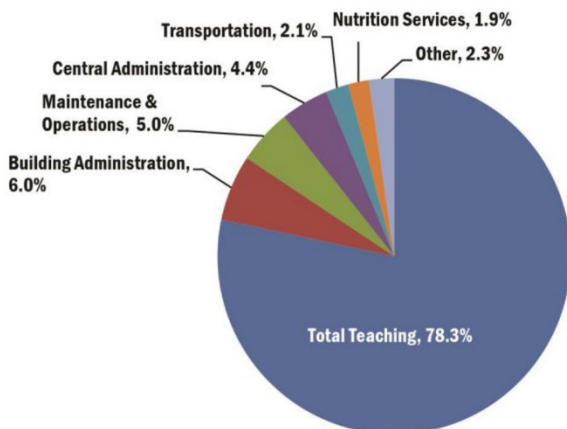
School Description

Juanita High School is focused on the principles of academic excellence and college readiness. Academic rigor is high throughout our classrooms. The ability of students to set high goals and think critically are expectations for all. Students are also expected to have a high school transcript that will open doors to colleges and universities upon graduation.

The tradition of JHS is based on a strong sense of community. The school's culture is based on the core values of personal integrity, a strong work ethic, and a professionally collaborative environment. The atmosphere is personalized so that students of all levels and needs can find a home in our school. Juanita offers a blend of Advanced Placement and college preparatory coursework, including courses sanctioned by the University of Washington and the University of Cambridge. We also use safety net programs, when needed, to help ensure the high school graduation and academic success of each student.

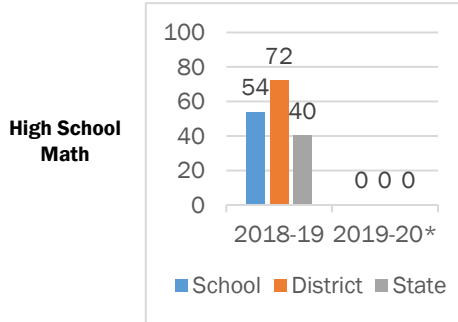
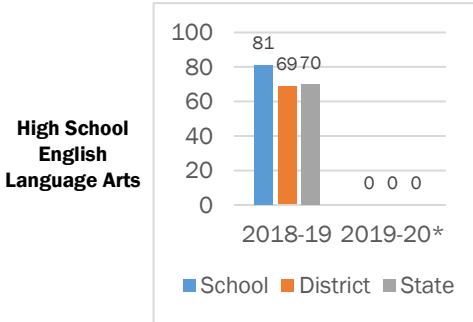


2019 20 School Goals

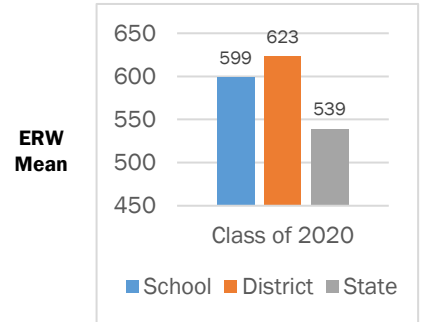
- Literacy: 85% of students at standard on SBA
- Math: 75% of students at standard on SBA
- Science: 80% of those taking the Washington Comprehensive Assessment of Science (WCAS) will demonstrate proficiency with a level 3 or 4, with 65% receiving a 3 or 4 on the Earth and Space Science portion of the exam.
- Achievement gap: Improve the graduation rate for our EL students from 62.5% to 80%.
- On-Track Credits: Our goal will be for 85% of 9th graders and 85% of 10th and 11th graders to be on track for graduation (not credit deficient).
- College & Career Readiness: 100% of the senior class of Juanita High School 2019 will complete their High School & Beyond Plan (HSBP), using the program Xello, by May 31, 2019.
- School Effectiveness: Increase the percentage of respondents who "agree mostly or agree completely" with the statement "School work is meaningful for students" from 58% to 90%
- Attendance: Improve the percentage of ninth graders who have satisfactory attendance from 65% to 85%.
- Discipline: Reduce the number of exclusionary discipline instances from 138 instances to under 100.

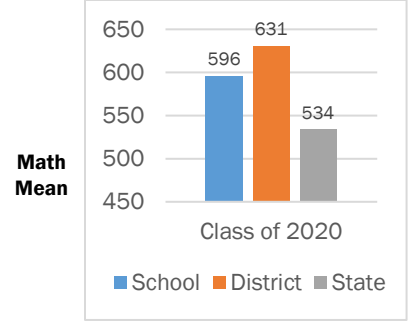
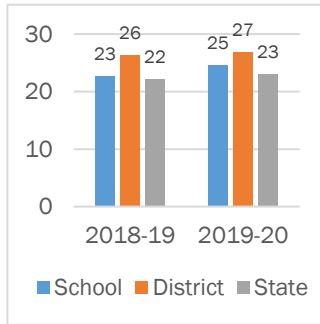
Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA)+



SAT**

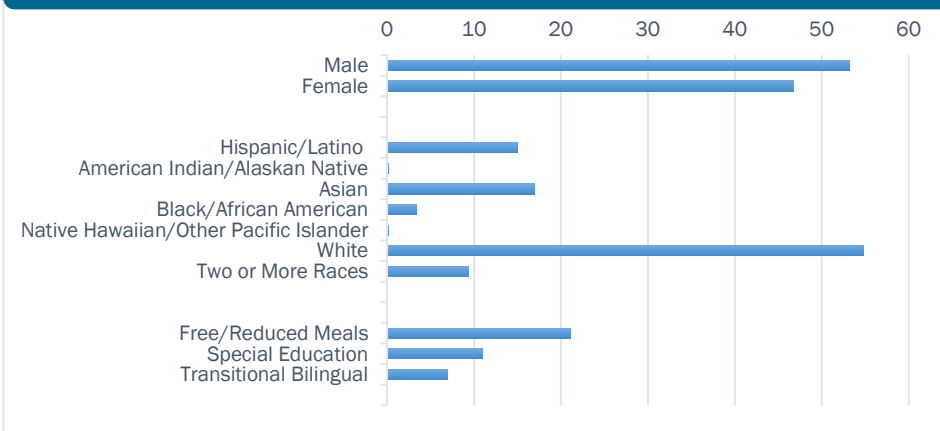


ACT**

+Smarter Balanced Assessment is a Washington state standardized exam. Scores represent percentage of students who met the standards. Students who did not take the test were counted as not meeting standard.

*Scores are suppressed when groups are so small that the information could potentially be used to identify or derive information about individual students. Many 11th grade students refused to take the test: they may have already met graduation requirements through passing the old state tests in 10th grade.

**The Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and the American College Test (ACT) are required by many colleges and universities for admission. Students elect to take these tests. A new SAT was given starting in January 2016. The Reading and Writing sections have been consolidated and now make up "Evidence-Based Reading and Writing" (ERW). As a result, the previous year's data is no longer comparable.
