What a school year! We had a superb start and finish with our convocation and graduation respectively, but what happened in between was one for the record books. A typical Barbers Hill year of continued success rocked along until spring break took on a whole new meaning. Life as we know it was put on hold and our nation grappled with how to perform essential tasks in the midst of a life-or-death pandemic. Our spring UIL activities were

canceled resulting in no spring state championships for the first time in the University Interscholastic League's history. Yet, in the midst of uncertainty and fear, Barbers Hill ISD continued to meet the needs of our students, staff and community, and we kept the focus on the contagious nature of hope.

Our staff served over 20,000 meals to students in need even at peril to their own health. All of our teachers gathered in person (at an appropriate distance) for a day of training to help implement an outstanding distance learning program with the help of Assistant Superintendent Kristen Davis and her superb technology department. Many Barbers Hill employees worked throughout the pandemic keeping our grounds and buildings maintained. Assistant Superintendent Becky McManus and her department helped execute the first-ever bond election to take place in the midst of a pandemic! The record voter turnout and an 87% approval gives powerful testimony to the phenomenal support our community has always demonstrated for our schools.

We concluded the year with an in-person graduation in a spectacularly organized and safe way, with most of our senior class attending. We Can, We Will... was never a more appropriate description of our school and community while the rest of the nation contended with -- and often failed to work in a concerted effort to overcome -- COVID-19. The Barbers Hill Board of Trustees and the Mont Belvieu City Council worked together to maintain operations and meet needs. I don't have 20/20 eyesight, but the year 2020 drew sharp focus on our ability to adapt and overcome, and I have never been prouder of our staff, students and community. The Barbers Hill brand was enhanced during arguably the biggest crisis of a lifetime, but just between you and me... I'm ready for some normalcy!

Building Cyber Schools

When global stories of havoc wrought by the COVID-19 began to reach the U.S. in early March, Barbers Hill ISD instructional technologists began to plan, even before school was canceled.

That planning soon enabled them to assemble the elements of distance learning for more than 6000 students in kindergarten through 12th grade, in the daunting span of 10 days.

BH instructional technologists, under the direction of Asst. Superintendent of Technology Kristen Davis, spent hours tweaking the plan from Friday to Sunday over spring break.





The team first turned to an education Facebook page for global feedback on how teachers were adapting classrooms in other countries. Their guiding principles in online platform selection were simplicity, familiarity with platforms they had previously given instruction on, and consistency between subject matter and grade levels, since many parents would be helping more than one child.

With those principles and fresh global input, they settled on four online platforms: Google Classroom (for grades 4-12), SeeSaw (for PreK - 3), Zoom, and Screencastify.

But even as the instructional technologists prepared to train teachers, they recognized limitations.



"We could help the teachers learn how to use the new platforms," said Suzie Wilburn, instructional technologist for elementary grades, "but we couldn't tell them what they needed to teach."

So the team met with district leaders, including campus principals, academic deans, campus technology personnel, central administrators and curriculum specialists, for many hours that weekend. Each person had a role in helping to prepare teachers to flip their classrooms to digital instruction.

"It was truly a collaborative environment," said Middle Schools Instructional Technologist Jennifer Stephens. "We could not have done this without the support of so many others!"

40 Days to Learn What Matters Most


