

From the Board Co-Presidents

Greetings to the entire East Woods community! What a wild year it has been! We are certain that you have likely said this phrase more times than you can count over the last year.

First and most importantly, we are hoping that you are your families have remained safe during this unprecedented time. While so much has slowed down this last calendar year, we would like to take this opportunity to update you on the ways that East Woods, through the leadership of Laura Kang, has kept its proverbial "foot on the gas" pedal and has kept forging ahead in a very positive direction, despite all of the distractions and the circumstances of the world around us. We should applaud Laura and her team as East Woods School pivoted quickly in the spring of 2020 to deliver a high quality virtual educational program once New York State was forced to quarantine. To prepare for the 2020-2021 school year, the school installed smart screens, and computers and software in every classroom to educate children virtually, even if families chose to quarantine, or were forced to quarantine at any point during the pandemic. The entire community at East Woods has found new ways to connect, learn, grow, and develop.

It is exciting to share that East Woods remains one of the very few schools on Long Island that has focused 100% on in-person learning since September of 2020, and remains in an enviable position. The enrollment is very strong, with many classes having a "waiting list" of students. Our faculty, staff, and administration did an exceptional job in transitioning to remote learning last spring, and have continued to hone the skills needed to teach virtually. We have balanced both in-person AND remote learning collectively for the benefit of our students, as well as welcomed new families to East Woods who were not finding in their schools the robust educational options we are providing.

The soul of East Woods has been elevated, even during this trying time, by the tireless work ethic of every staff and faculty member, and by the clear focus of our Head Of School, Laura Kang. She has been relentless in the pursuit of student safety while still preserving what the essence of East Woods School is - a caring, nurturing, and challenging environment for our children. The Board of Trustees would like to publicly thank Laura and Assistant Head of School, Alex Carter. We are certain neither of you has had much rest since last March! Your tireless efforts to keep us moving forward during a global pandemic are not unnoticed by anyone in our East Woods community. We would also like to specifically thank Melissa Cedrone who has continued to lead both the business office as

well as admissions throughout this challenging time, creating innovative ways to interact with potential new EWS families and adjusting the ways we showcase our incredible school. We would also like to acknowledge how much we appreciate our amazing teachers. Without them, our children would not be inspired daily to continue to learn in this challenging time. They are working harder and are tireless in their efforts to keep our children inspired.

We want to share with you that East Woods School has completed our first three-year plan for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, led by our consultant, Lawrence Alexander, and have plans in place to continue the formal learning for another three years. The feedback on this initiative has been very positive, and we hope that you all have been able to take part in some of the community groups to discuss these key subject areas of focus. If you would like to know more about ways to be involved in this powerful group, please reach out to us.

We announced last year at this time that we had started our planning for the creation of the next Strategic plan given VISION 2020 was completed in December of last year. Last school year, the Board formed a Strategic Planning Committee led by Luan Doan, a Trustee and current parent in our community. Luan, Laura Kang, and the Board, based upon the advice of experts in independent school governance, elected to develop a four-year strategic plan, rather than a five year plan. This is based upon the uncertainty of the impacts of the current COVID-19 pandemic. In April of 2020, due to the pandemic, the Strategic Planning Committee renamed our plan PRIME, which is an acronym for: *Pandemic* Restabilization, Initiative & Management Effort.

After fifteen months of thought and preparation, we launched PRIME 2025 in the Spring of 2021. This is the Board of Trustees' vision for our next four years, after deep and deliberate work dating back to October 2019, when we met with past parents, teachers, and faculty, to begin planning our road map for the future. The following six key areas are the focus of PRIME 2025: Faculty, Curriculum, Community, Finance, Enrollment, and Facilities.

Although we do not know what the future holds regarding the pandemic, we are prepared for in-person and virtual school. PRIME 2025 acknowledges the need to re-stabilize and grow certain programs and initiatives both during this extraordinary time in history, and after our hopeful return to normalcy. As we commemorate the 75th year of East Woods, we celebrate persistent and deliberate effort by our community to create a new high bar in independent schools. The roots and history of East Woods School began with a small group of committed and engaged parents in 1946 who collectively wanted "more" for their children's education. Our parent body is still enthusiastically moved by this principle. Thank you to all parents, alumni parents, alumni, grandparents, and friends of East Woods who have generously supported the school this year. Our Annual Fund is the most critical fundraiser of the year. It is important for you to know that the funds that are raised go directly to the operating budget to enhance the students' experiences at East Woods. The school is accepting donations for this fund through June 30, 2021.

Please note that we have planned a family friendly virtual fundraising event this school year, scheduled for Friday May 14, 2021. Be on the lookout for more detailed information as we would love to "see" all of you there! There are also plans in place for an in-person celebration of the 75th Anniversary next Fall 2021. We wish everyone continued health and safety in the months ahead as we look forward to emerging from the pandemic as an even stronger school community.


Timely Technology Enhancements

Integrating East Woods School: The Bennett Legacy

In his acclaimed Broadway musical, Hamilton, Lin Manuel Miranda writes in the voice of Alexander Hamilton, "Legacy/ what is a legacy/it's planting seeds in a garden you never get to see." Merriam-Webster defines the word "legacy" as "something transmitted by or received from an ancestor or predecessor or from the past."

When history is written, those who leave legacies labor. Fortunately, **Tracey Bennett '77**, **Dean** Bennett '81, and Christopher Bennett '86 have lived to see the rewards of their parents' sacrifices and of their own courage as the first family to integrate East Woods School.

The year was 1967, a little over a decade after a flurry of cases regarding school integration in southern states made national and international news. Eugene and Celia Renelda Bennett, residents of Huntington, heard about the culture of academic excellence offered by East Woods School. They were sure that this institution was the best option for their curious, brilliant, and tenacious first-born child, Tracey. Thus, they took a chance and enrolled her there. They knew she would be an agent of change, and they knew of all the challenges associated with integrating a school, but they were brave, and the Head of School assured them that Tracey would be in good hands. On a balmy September morning in 1967, Tracey entered kindergarten and became the first Black student ever admitted and the first Black graduate of East Woods School. In subsequent years, the Bennetts enrolled their two sons, Dean and Christopher at East Woods School, thereby creating the Bennett legacy at the institution.

: memories of their time at East Woods School. often never get a chance to see the rewards of their . They speak favorably of their friends and teachers, noting that teachers were integral in making them part of the culture of the school. They recall a strong connection to the institution, as families at the time created legacies through enrollment of multiple children. The youngest sibling, Christopher, remembers the honor he felt as he entered the doors, walking in his older siblings' footsteps and joining the Green Team as his siblings had done in their time at East Woods. He had not attended East Woods while his sister, Tracey, was there, but he felt proud whenever passed pictures of her standing out among her peers. He felt a sense of belonging because his siblings had paved the way for him to persevere and carry on the East Woods legacy.

> While Tracey, Dean, and Christopher are nostalgic about East Woods, they still remember the sting of the challenges associated with belonging, since their differences were amplified when they entered the school each day. They were each the only Black child in their classes, with the exception of Christopher, who had a Black male peer who joined his class and basketball team in later years. Their differences could not be carefully tucked away and hidden, nor could they be ignored. They were aware of their involuntary historical significance to the school and starkly aware of the climate in which they existed as

Black children at school and in the world, at large At home, they were taught self-love, self-worth, and were reminded of their boundless potential. At school, they stood out and as a result, often wrangled with issues of self-image, efficacy, isolation, and loneliness. They still reminisce on what it was like to identify with the culture of the school, but longing for the community of another child who "looked like them" and who "understood them" in their respective classes. They played team sports, played in the band like other children, and commingled with their classmates but eventually, it was Celia's homemade pound cake that granted them full access and acceptance among their peers and with the other families.

For the Bennetts, the children of a labor leader who had attended the March on Washington, attending East Woods School was a revolutionary act. They had dual identities that sometimes collided and contrasted each other. Eugene Bennett was a noble man, who instilled principles of pride and excellence in his children. He spoke to his children often about his activism and ensured that his children had a solid foundation and knowledge of their history. Celia found boundless opportunities to keep the children balanced outside of East Woods. They were members of Jack and Jill of America, active participants in their local church, and part of a strong, well-grounded family. They were expected to succeed-to exude excellence in all endeavors. They were building a legacy, and there: was no room for failure.

The Bennetts excelled at East Woods, not in spite of, but because of the strong commitment and partnership between their parents and the faculty and staff at East Woods School. While social and cultural differences colored their experience, Tracey, Dean, and Christopher Bennett still attribute their success to the firm foundation laid at East Woods School. Tracey Bennett graduated East Woods and then attended the Kent School in Connecticut, Trinity College, and Hofstra University, where she pursued a master's degree and became a history teacher for many years, before retiring. Dean Bennett attended Trinity-Pawling School after graduating East Woods and then went on to Hofstra University for both undergraduate and graduate degrees, and then ran for office in Nassau County, where he is now a county executive. Christopher followed his sister's footsteps to the Kent School, and then attended Tufts University, (where he was initiated

Black children at school and in the world, at large.into the Gamma chapter of the historically BlackAt home, they were taught self-love, self-worth,
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Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated) and then
The Maurice A. Dean School of Law at Hofstra
University. Following their father's legacy of
service to the East Woods Board of Trustees, Dean
was also appointed as a member and served the
school well, in that capacity.

The ethos of "kindness, excellence, and confidence" left an indelible mark on the Bennett trio and today, they remain proud to have walked the halls of East Woods. They are hopeful that East Woods School's faculty and staff are equipped and willing to continue embracing all students' experiences, in order to make them erudite, committed citizens, and critical thinkers. At first glance, the photos in the hallways of the class of 1977 may reflect a past that seems exclusionary. However, with a shift in perspective, one may realize that the pictures in the hallways are no longer relics of a segregated past, but are now trophies of hope, inspiring today's East Woods students to persevere, despite the odds. The Bennett family's legacy is a gleaming example of excellence, a poster of pride, and a wealth of wisdom and courage, and every Black student who has entered through the doors of East Woods since 1967 is a flower in the beautiful garden planted and watered by the Bennett family and the East Woods community.

Similarities In Upper School English And Theatre

At East Woods School, theater thrives even in the The Tempest opens in utter chaos. A lone ship, most tumultuous of times. In a dazzling new way, the Upper School students this year have struck a balance between artistic expression and the limitations of a pandemic. Jeremy Black, director, actor, and East Woods parent, leads this year's students in a production of Shakespeare's The Tempest. This new production utilizes greenscreen technology to film individual student performances safely at home, later to be edited together in post-production with student art pieces created under the direction of teacher Marie Ucci. During the school day, the students examine the story, the characters, and the history behind the text. As a group, they draw connections between the arc of the play and their own year, one in which everything seemed blown off course.

out at sea, is tossed about by a sudden storm. This storm is not understood by the crew or the passengers, and they find themselves unable to navigate the danger. The ship sinks, and its passengers are scattered about an uncharted island. This catastrophe has now isolated the men and separated family members. They find themselves in a bizarre world, at the whims of forces beyond their comprehension.

For East Woods students, the parallel is stark. The sudden school closures, travel restrictions, and confusion of a world grappling with an unanticipated threat are a tempest of their own. The students pour these feelings and experiences into their performances. As they read lonely Ferdinand staggering about the island, they recall wondering when they could finally see their friends again. As they read innocent Miranda discovering a crowd of new faces just outside her door, they channel the joy they felt when East Woods School successfully reopened in September.

The masque in Act IV has acquired a new and emotional significance. The sorcerer Prospero summons spirits of color, light, dance, and music to celebrate his daughter's marriage. The spirits sing blessings for the couple's future: health, prosperity, true love. In this scene, students give

voice to their own hopes for the future as they emerge from the darkness of the past year. The students will be performing new songs composed for this production, their voices and instruments edited together to create a chorus of wishes.

Of course, while beautiful, the masque is only an : "insubstantial pageant," a hazy and uncertain dream. The true ending of The Tempest is that of courage in the face of this uncertainty. The

characters must leave the island and make the journey back home, forever changed by their experiences. As they stand on the precipice, they wonder if they are prepared to navigate the dangerous open waters again. As all students at East Woods face this "brave new world," they can't know what will happen next. Moving forward together, they can only reflect on Miranda's words: "How beauteous mankind is!"

Together We Grow by Susan Vaught

A small chick welcomes the foxes, and all the animals settle in for the night. This rhyming book sends the message that everyone is accepted and welcome, and together we are better, together we grow.

Grades K-3

The Not-So-Great Outdoors by Madeline Kloepper A city girl reluctantly accompanies her family on a camping trip to the (not so) great outdoors, thinking about the lack of electricity and things she will miss from her usual busy life. But as she explores the lakes and mountains of the forest, and watches animals, she realizes that there's a lot to appreciate in these simpler surroundings. The book's full-spread detailed illustrations highlight the beauty of the great outdoors.

Do Your Best Every Day to Do Your Best Every Day: Encouraging Words from John Cena John Cena is a wrestler and entertainer who has also authored several books for children. 

Life during the pandemic impacted all aspects of school life not the least of which was the East Woods School kitchen and meal preparation for approximately 170 students including lunch and snack time. Chef Timothy Chenkin, and his staff Yessica and Flor, have received high marks from parents, administration, and, most importantly, the students, when it comes to food choices, tastiness, and safety protocols during these challenging times.

Chef Tim notes that there were many silver linings to the school's meal delivery service over the past year. Those silver linings included healthier eating habits among the students, less food waste, and an increased interest on the part of students to eating balanced meals. Students and their parents pre-ordered lunch online. The offerings included nine options of entrées and five side dishes. Chef Tim notes that 75% of students ordered carrots for lunch and that he goes through fifty pounds of carrots each week. Meals are prepackaged and there have been three lunch periods in three different rooms to accommodate social distancing requirements. Of course, Chef Tim is well aware of students with allergies and carefully monitors which students are ordering what meals. Sanitizing the kitchen, including the food preparation areas as well as the dining rooms has been of paramount importance during this time.

Chef Tim also began an online cooking class for which he has had a lot of interest among students.

Our (chef's) hat is off to Chef Tim and the kitchen staff and we are so grateful for his diligence and dedication to our students during this time. Thank you, Chef Tim! 
The George and Abby O'Neill Outstanding Faculty Award

Below are the remarks made by our winners of the 2020 James E. Gay Alumni/ae Award.

Wendy de Clairville Kemper, Class of 1954

I am delighted to report that I have kept East Woods School with me in some form or another thru out my entire life. We'll start from 1946 when I overheard a group of men in our living room talking about starting a new private school. The new school started in a house in West Hills my grandfather owned. One dollar a year was paid to use the house. East Woods school was born!

The parents painted the interior walls and supplied items for the nursery through second grade. I was in second grade, my sister in first grade, and my younger sister in nursery. We then moved to a new building which is the present site adding third grade and from then on a grade was added each year until we reached the ninth grade. I am the oldest student at age 82. Years later my husband Claude and I moved back to Long Island and entered our son Tony in kindergarten eventually there were three sons Tony, Stephen, and Christopher and four years of dear, wonderful Jim Gay teaching and parent conferences. Jim became a very dear friend.

At that time the parents committee was a very strong minded, innovative group. We started the clothes exchange, the freezer with casseroles and the East Woods school fair. At the old age of 42 and with my boys gone, I began to wonder who I really was and what should I do with my life. The answer was opening a store with 12 other women in Cold Spring Harbor called *Gilliewrinkles*. Ten years later I decided that it was time to move on, and started another company called Mill Pond Flowers and did weddings and parties around the eastern seaboard. Years later I received a telephone call from another East Wood's mother. She said, "my daughter just got engaged and you must do the wedding." A new career began as a bridal consultant doing weddings all over the United States as well as in foreign countries. After 22 challenging years, I retired and moved to a community called Bishop Gadsden in Charleston, South Carolina.

Again I began to wonder what meaningful way I could use my time and energy, a friend said,

" I have the perfect job for you a mentor in the men's prison". And how right he was. I found my next mission in life and it's teaching the men in orange about the life outside prison. Essentially preparing them for reentry into the community. We use a workbook designed by us and assign homework and after fifteen weeks and graduation, they then can apply to our home which houses over twenty-five men. This gives them a step up in life. We teach them the words you have all heard from your parents and teachers: responsibility, commitment, respect, accountability, and punctuality, just to mention some of them.

I could have never achieved these valuable commitments without the solid foundation I received from my parents and the wonderful teachers at East Woods. Thank you very much for this award I hope you will find as much joy in life as I have.

Christian Havemeyer, Class of 1962

Greetings to the Class of 2021. I'm Chris Havemeyer and I graduated from East Woods in 1962. I spent the next four years at the Choate School in Wallingford, Connecticut. In the fall of 1966, I entered the freshman class at Drew University and graduated in 1970 with a degree in social anthropology.

As I reflect back on my years at East Woods, Choate, and Drew, there were some similar characteristics at each school that I believe made a bigger impact on me than I realized at the time. These influences were not academic but rather the buildings and nature around me and they led me to the activities that have interested me most of my life. At East Woods, I was captivated by the stunning beauty of the main building and its park like setting. The School is a half hour away from my home which was an 18th century farmhouse in the middle of rolling hills, numerous ponds, and woods. The Choate School is full of stately buildings mixed in with 18th century houses. The campus of Drew University is set in a forest at a distance from any signs of city life.

When I graduated from Drew, I move to a farm on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. The farm house was built in 1740 and sits on the banks of a river flowing into the Chesapeake Bay. There are many fish, crabs, oysters, ducks, geese, osprey, eagles and much more. On the farm, we grow grain crops which we send to the nearby poultry industry as feed. If you have ever had a Perdue chicken, it might have eaten some of my farm's corn and soybeans. Over the years we made a tremendous effort to farm responsibly. These efforts limit the amount of chemicals and soil that can run off our fields and harm the health of the Chesapeake Bay.

In the 18th century, the nearby town of Chestertown was an important port of entry into the United States. That means ships sailed there directly from England and had to be inspected by custom agents and pay taxes on their cargo. It is said that Chestertown had an anti-tax rebellion just like the famous Boston Tea Party. Because of the importance of this town, many wealthy merchants built beautiful brick houses. By the time I arrived in 1970, many of them were in bad condition. I teamed up with a group of friends and we restored a number of them.

My greatest passion in recent years has been my involvement with a group that built a replica of an 18th century ninety-foot wooden schooner made named Sultana. She was built over three years by volunteers on an empty lot in the middle of Chestertown. Launched twenty years ago, she now sails as a school ship teaching kids about colonial history and the ecology of the Chesapeake Bay. Too bad East Woods isn't down here so you could all sail with us. (sultanaeducation.org)

So this is a long way of saying that if you have a passion for something that is not traditional, try to find a way to work it into your life's work.

I am extremely grateful to East Woods for giving me a foundation for more than just my academic life and now for the honor of being a recipient of the James E. Gay Alumni Award.




