

Pequannock Township School District Curriculum Syllabus

Art / Grade 7

Course Description:

In 7th grade students apply and expand their knowledge of the elements and principles of design in the creation of 2-dimensional and 3-dimensional original pieces of artwork. Students will work individually and collaboratively to develop skills in material manipulation, painting, and drawing. Students will develop a foundation of 21st century career awareness and preparation by discussing working artists and careers of today.
