

Install the Scribe Toolbar

A browser extension (a.k.a. add-on or plug-in) adds functionality to your browser. The Scribe Toolbar Chrome Extension adds the Scribe Toolbar to your Chrome browser. When you add the Extension, you'll see a small button with the Scribe "S" logo to the right of your Address Bar in Chrome. While browsing the web, click that button to load the Scribe Toolbar on webpages. Adding the Extension to Chrome is easy. Just click the Install Now button below.





You brush your teeth and stumble into your clothes. You know that by 10 a.m. you will be struggling to stay awake in class.

"No one should have to get up this early for school," you say to yourself.

Click on your library to find the article. Here you can annotate the article.

Annotations save in the Scribe library. Be sure to highlight full words/sentences. Whatever you highlight moves to the annotations tab in the Scribe library.

Opening school later is not a good idea. Schools that start later would have to stay open later. That would mean that students would have to give up other important things.


Plenty of students get good grades when their schools open early. Students who are too tired should just go to bed earlier at night.






