We regularly reaffirm our commitment to continuous growth for every student, regardless of the student's race, ethnicity, background or circumstance.

This instructional focus is our roadmap for that journey, a statement of our commitment to transform our professional practices in ways that address the new realities facing our students, our school and our community. Our roadmap is built on four pillars:

As the Anderson teachers, staff and community welcome each and every student, we believe that our purpose and dedication will guarantee every student empowerment, growth and the confidence to move on to the next level with proficiency and skills for the 21st Century!

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and under the guidance of the Santa Clara Public Health Department and the Santa Clara County Office of Education, Oak Grove School District closed its schools and transitioned to remote instruction on March 16, 2020. This involved the discontinuation of students receiving in-person instruction at schools. Instead, all instruction was delivered through a distance learning model in which students participated in activities at home, receiving instruction primarily through digital means. OGSD’s SPSP plan is in alignment with goals set forth and approved by the Board of Trustees in our Local Control and Accountability Plan and Learning Continuity Plan for the 2020-21 School Year.

We work closely with stakeholders throughout the district and analyze student performance data on an ongoing basis. Six goals, outlined below, have been identified as the focus within our current SPSA plan to improve outcomes for all students.

Goal 1 - All students will be proficient in meeting and/or exceeding all Common Core State Standards.

Goal 2 - We will accelerate the academic achievement toward meeting or exceeding standards for English Learners (EL), low socioeconomic disadvantaged students, Foster Youth, and students of color, as well as increase the language proficiency for EL.

Goal 3 - We will provide an inclusive learning environment for students with disabilities to best support social, emotional and academic development.

Goal 4 - Students will use technology to master the 21st Century Skills of collaboration, communication, critical thinking and creativity. Oak Grove will provide innovative strategies with support for technology implementation that would enhance student learning of core academic subject knowledge, and meet technology standards.

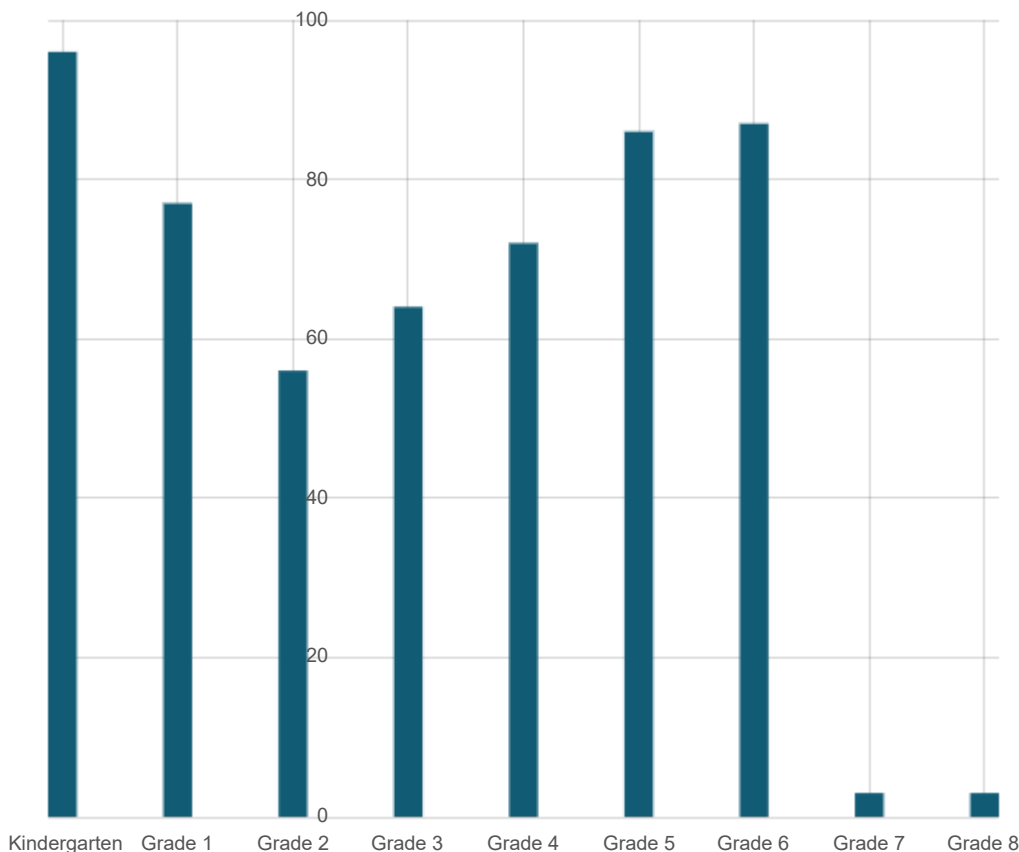
Goal 5 - School and classroom environments support learning, creativity, safety, and engagement.

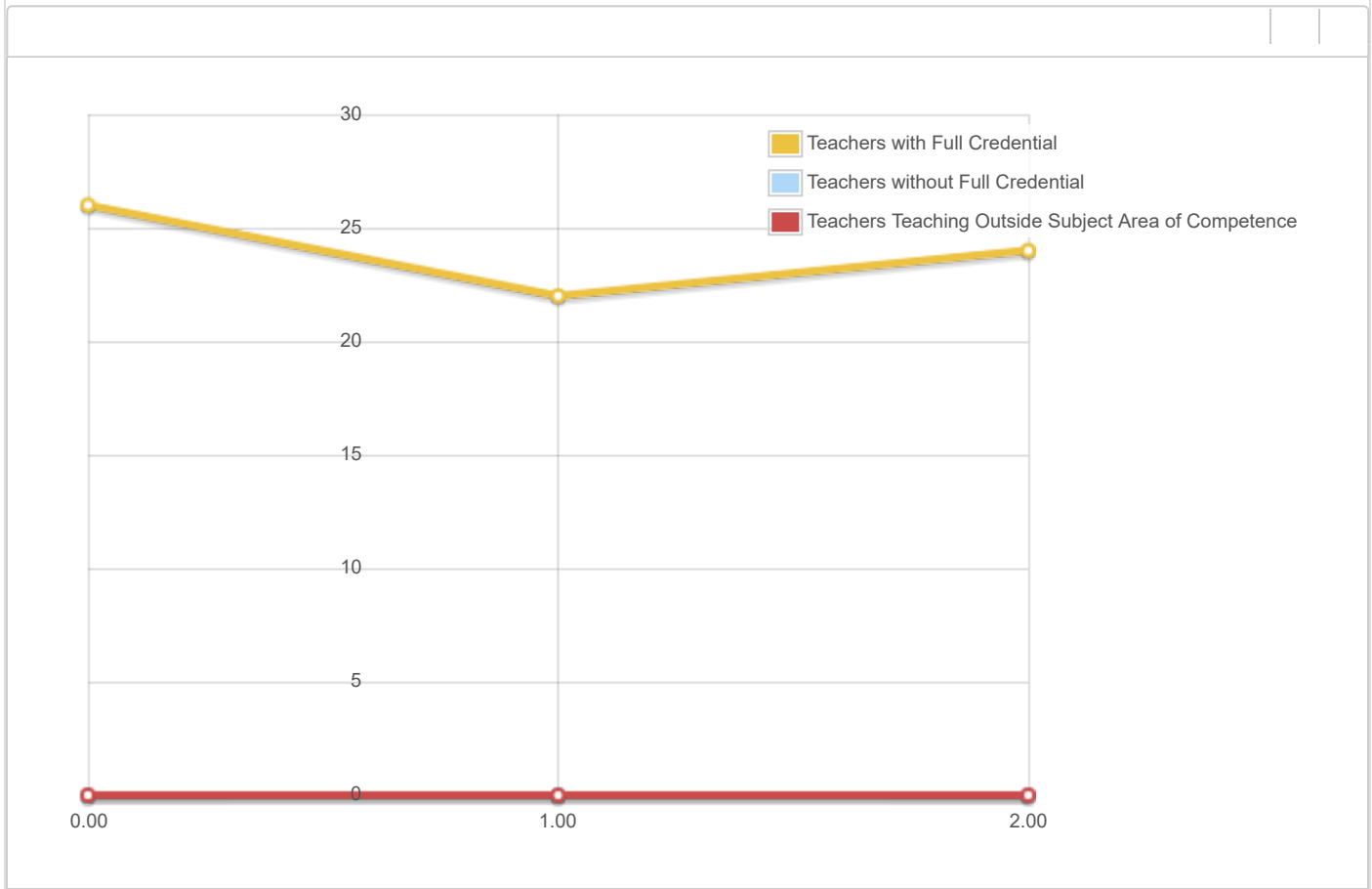

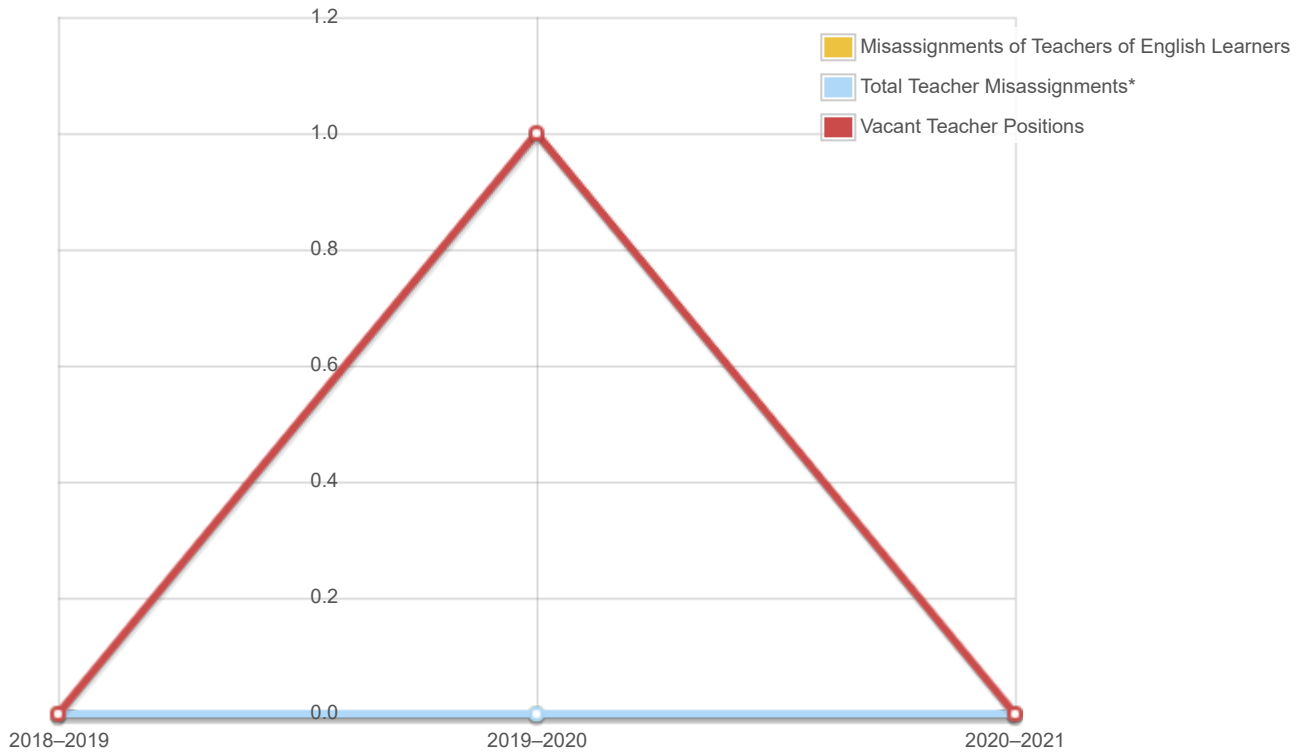

School Safety Plan (School Year 2020–2021)

Alex Anderson remains committed to ensuring the physical safety of students and the school via disaster drills for Fire, Earthquake, and Run Hide Defend. Fire drills are conducted monthly, we participate in California's Great Shake Out, and Run, Hide Defend is also done yearly. Student emotional safety and sense of belonging is supported by our school wide PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention Supports) which are implemented by classroom and with school wide assemblies and rewards for positive behavior. This is further supported by Alex Anderson's newest addition of Restorative Justice Practices. This helps students, and teachers, create a community through the use of Community Building Circles. Further, it uses conflict resolution circles to repair harm and create collaborative solutions to problem solve conflict or other behaviors that may have caused harm to the school community. Anderson's Student Council creates a school wide sense of belonging through spirit days and activities, including Yearbook and little buddies. The School Site Council, which consists of parents, teachers, and staff, reviewed and updated the Safe School Plan in January of 2021.

Anderson has adapted instruction and family engagement during distance learning. All students were provided Chromebooks to connect directly with their teachers during Distance Learning, additionally, hotspots were provided to families without Internet access at home.

The use of Google Classroom, Google Meeting, RAZ Kids, Accelerated Reader, Brain POP, Nearpod, and other online resources have supported learning in this distance model. The district has ensured the continued access to VPA programs for upper grade students including art and music with a professional arts/music teacher. Virtual recess is conducted each Wednesdays for students to engage with the larger Anderson Community.

Onsite coaching supports teachers and students to access online learning in a fashion that was not traditionally part of the learning process utilizing virtual break out rooms. Home and School Club has also offered activities for families including BINGO night, Art Nights, and Holiday activities for Halloween, Winter Holidays, and community engagement.

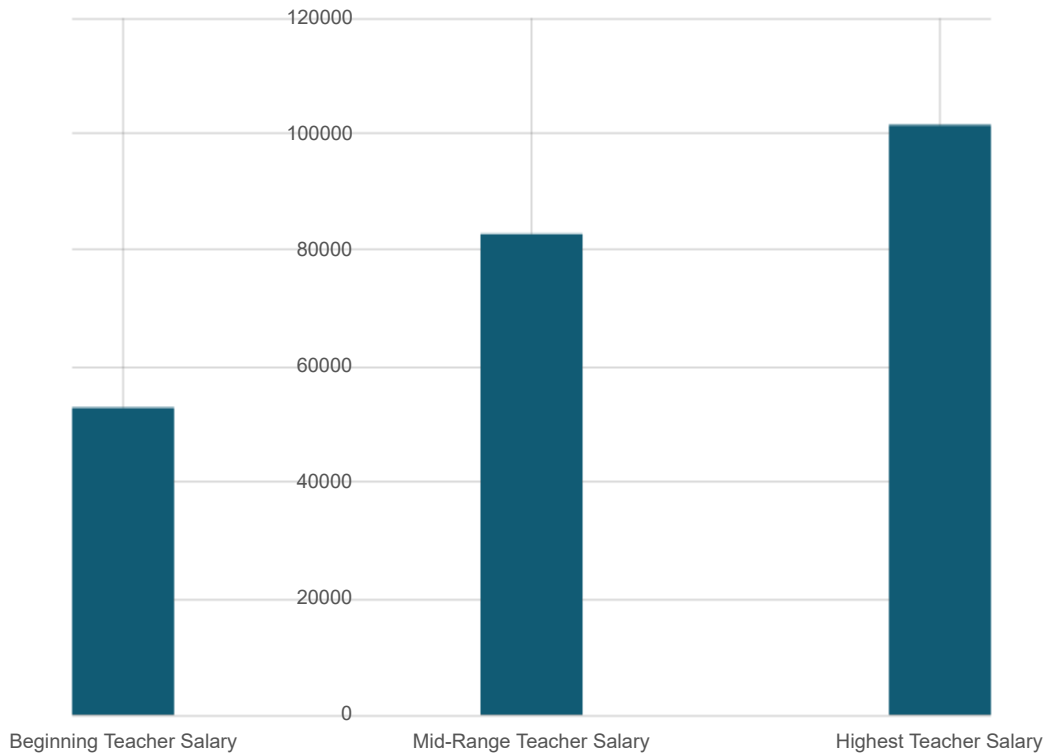

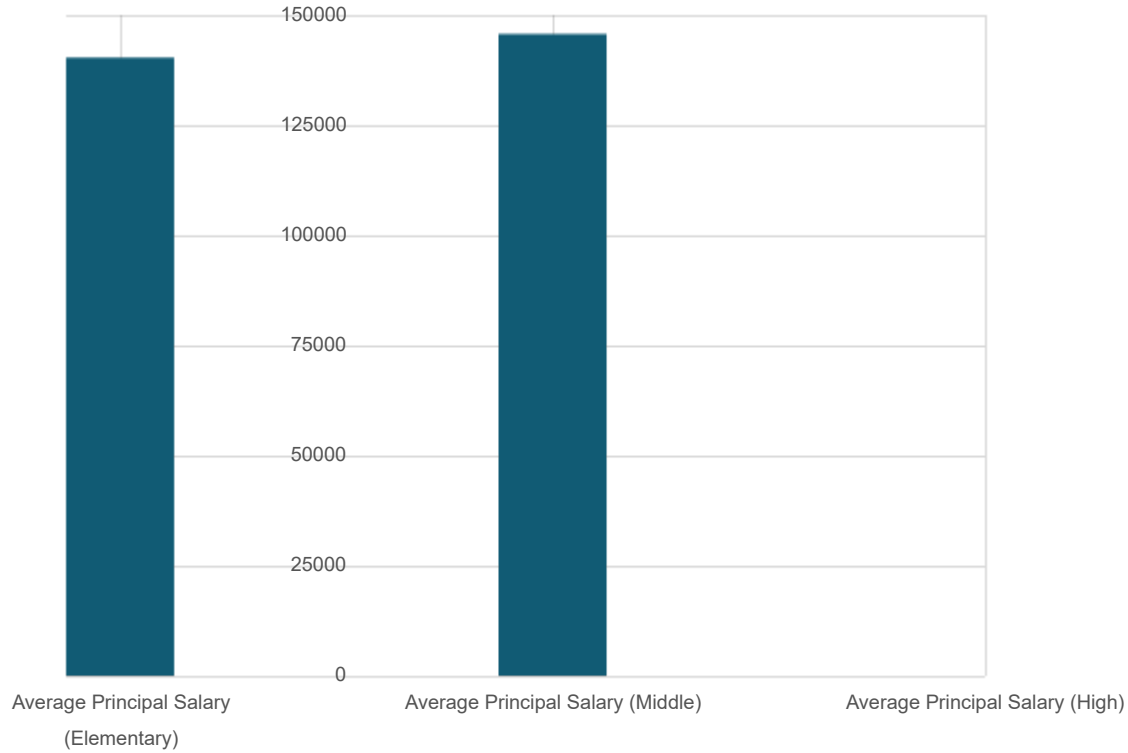
