

Elul

The Final Month of the Jewish Calendar

This year, the month of Elul begins on the evening of August 8, the month prior to the High Holy Days. Elul is the time when Jews reflect on their lives, then talk to family and friends and repair relationships by making amends for intentional and unintentional slights. We blow the shofar every day during the month of Elul to rouse us from complacency and jolt us into acts of repentance.

Yizkor is a solemn service for mourners to honor and remember their deceased loved ones.

Yizkor is observed four times per year. On Yom Kippur, it is the service in the sanctuary immediately prior to *N'ilah*, the final service at the end of Yom Kippur before the fast is broken.

Our other *Yizkor* services will take place on the University Campus at 10:00 a.m. on the following 5782/2021-2022 dates:

- April 23, 2022, Pesach
- June 6, 2022, Shavuot

These *Yizkor* services are small and include teachings from our Rabbis, uplifting music, and opportunities to share food and memories. Please join us for any or all of these meaningful moments to remember your loved ones and to

connect with other congregants who are remembering their families as well.



REMEMBERING THOSE WHO CAME BEFORE US

Temple members commemorate loved ones by making charitable gifts in their honor and by adding plaques in their names to our beautiful Memorial Walls. We have elegant memorial walls at the Glazer and University campuses, and you may choose where to locate the memorial plaques you purchase.

In accordance with Jewish tradition, we honor the memories of those who have passed away when the *Kaddish* prayer is recited at worship services. We mark the memories of these loved ones by illuminating their plaques during *yahrzeit* (the anniversary of their deaths), and illuminating all plaques at *Yizkor* services on Yom Kippur, Shemini Atzeret, Pesach, and Shavuot.

By memorializing the names of our deceased loved ones, we express our gratitude for the gifts of their precious lives—and the hope that their spirits will continue to inspire us.
