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

A history and future of "rocking diversity"

30 years - for our current students, that probably seems like an eternity. For the first five students and teacher who began that first day of Bavarian International School (BIS) in February 1991, what BIS may look like in 30 years was not top of mind. Rooted in tradition, but ready for change

Palo Alto changed his life. In the birthplace of Silicon Valley, the native Swabian earned his first international merits at Hewlett-Packard. Under the Californian sun, he met his wife Erica and breathed the new air of innovation, globalisation and a spirit of change shortly before the turn of the millennium, when Google was still in its infancy ...

The global spirit and the enriching diversity later led to his two children attending an international school. Marc Aghili, who was born in Stuttgart, has now been a community member of the Bavarian International School for ten years; daughter Grace is graduating from BIS in the current school year and son Luca attends grade 8. While his new role as Global Director Solutions Management at UL challenges him in his professional life, the 52 year old has been involved in the Supervisory Board of the non-profit organisation BIS gAG for almost four years, currently as Chair of the Board.

Mr Aghili, you have personally experienced one third of the 30-year history of BIS. What does this anniversary mean from your perspective?

"Growing from five students in the very first class back then to almost 1,200 students from more than 60 nations is evidence of an impressive development. Today, BIS is academically among the top 3 international schools in Germany and top 15 in Europe. But nothing is as constant as change; we must continue to keep an eye on the future, remain innovative and develop the school further. Our roots are just as important as a focus on our strengths."

If you had to explain these strengths to someone outside BIS - what would you say?

"First of all, I do it a lot because, like so many other parents, I feel like an ambassador for BIS. Believe, Inspire, Succeed is not just a slogan, it is lived here every day. The international spirit, diversity, innovative strength, mutual understanding and cooperation are essential characteristics that cannot be emphasised often enough. In everyday school life, I am always inspired

by the students' assemblies. I am always very impressed when I see the selfconfidence and communication power with which the students present themselves in front of a large audience. One last point: the learning support at BIS is impressive and goes far beyond the standards at international schools. And we need to have a two-pronged approach: maintain educational quality across the board while promoting academic excellence."

What are your three words that you associate with BIS?

"Leadership. Community. Future."

What are BIS's plans for the future?

"We are, of course, working on the future development of BIS at various levels. Especially in these difficult, disruptive, fast-moving and digitally driven times, it is all the more important to prepare our children as well as possible for life after school. They should become true global citizens and game-changers who can make the world a better place. This task is closely linked to the continuous development of staff, curricula and, last but not least, the learning environment. As a big goal, we are working to build the new heart of the Haimhausen Campus: the Creativity & Innovation Centre (CIC). To this end, we have begun to launch our information campaign. My great hope is that not only the relevant companies will get involved in this extraordinarily important project for the future. Everyone from the BIS community is called upon to support the financing of the CIC, because it is more or less like a generational contract: we, the current parents, can only enjoy such a strong BIS because previous parents had also made a strong commitment to this school."





Three decades of inspiring global citizens



Strong foundation for the future

The history of Bavarian International School (BIS) began 30 years ago on the 18th of February 1991. In rented rooms of a former elementary school in Goldach/Hallbergmoos, the doors opened for the first time for the first five students: Katie B., Julia and Christopher W., Deborah D. and Sebastian M. At the end of the school year, there were 12 students from five nations. Three decades later, approximately 1,150 students from more than 60 nations attend BIS on two campuses. The school is now one of the leading international schools in Germany and among the top 15 in Europe (source: Education Advisors/UK).

Together with the first teacher, Pamela Sonntag, Brenda Shaw (British) was one of the first employees of BIS as registrar. "I remember very well how each of the first students was given a piggy bank with 50 DM by the board," says Shaw, now 82, who worked for BIS until 1996. "We were a family. As a small group of people, we were very close-knit and held tightly together during the start-up phase," Shaw recalls. Hans-Joachim Klapperich-Andres, then managing director of Panavia Aircraft GmbH, which was based near the Munich airport and played a key role in the idea and development of BIS, became involved as the first chairman of the Bavarian International School e.V. For many years, he pushed ahead with the development of the school on a voluntary basis and stated then, as he does now: "What makes it special is the enthusiasm of the students to be able to live and learn in harmony in a large, international community."

The Bavarian International School developed rapidly. In 1993-94, more than 200 students from almost 30 nations were already attending BIS, which had in the meantime moved to an office building in Schwaig as an interim location. Official accreditation by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) followed in 1995.

A milestone: moving to the Schloss Haimhausen

In order to enable further growth, the Executive Board began looking for a suitable long-term location in the mid-1990s. As a result, Schloss Haimhausen was acquired from the couple Hans Daxer and Luise Piëch, and the surrounding land was leased from the Haniel family. Stefan Schörghuber (†2008), owner of the Schörghuber Group and also a BIS parent, played a key role in ensuring that the Bavarian International School could continue to develop on this →

scale. As treasurer and later chairman of the board of BIS e.V., he drove forward the expansion and structuring of the school with equal amounts of expertise and passion.

Two milestones followed in succession during this period: the first IB Diploma Graduation class in 1997 with 17 students and, in August 1998, the BIS community's move to the renovated Schloss Haimhausen, which had been converted for school purposes, for the first time with more than 400 students. "The move to Schloss Haimhausen was a major undertaking. It guickly became apparent that additional new buildings would have to be developed and constructed to accommodate the growing number of students," recalls Canadian Uwe Schweneke, Business Director of BIS from 1994-2011.

Magic numbers and a new campus

Another ten years later, in the 2008-09 school year, the number of students had doubled once again, to almost 800 students. One of the reasons for this was the opening of the new primary school complex on the Haimhausen campus. In 2013-14, the number of students exceeded

1,000 for the first time. With the 2016 opening of the BIS City Campus on Leopoldstrasse in Munich-Schwabing, the school expanded its radius and created an inner-city offering with an Early Childhood Center and primary school. BIS reached its highest enrollment to date in 2018-19, with nearly 1,200 students. That same year, the legal form changed from a nonprofit association to a nonprofit stock corporation.

Currently, approximately 1,150 students from 61 nations attend BIS. 1,150 is a truly magical number - in this anniversary year, because since the first graduating class ightarrow



When it comes to digitalisation, BIS has always been a frontrunner: Educational Technology was introduced in 2002. in 1997 until today, approximately the same number of students have graduated from BIS: about 1,150. A wonderful coincidence with a bit of mysticism ... BIS had the largest graduation class in 2019 - 20 with 91 graduates, and the best IB DP average score was achieved by the Class of 2021 with 37 points – in the German Abitur, this score would compare to an average of 1.8.

Innovation to celebrate the anniversary

To coincide with the 30th anniversary of BIS, the Bavarian International School is presenting a few innovative features: a new corporate design, a new website (which has already won the Communicators Award), the first scholarship in the history of BIS, a new app and soon the first merchandising shop.

Since the 2010 - 11 school year, there have always been more than 50 students celebrating their graduation at BIS - here the Class of 2017.



The BIS community and selected personalities from politics, economy, science, society and media will also celebrate an anniversary event on 4 September 2021 in the Schlosspark Haimhausen under the motto "Diversity Rocks".

"Building on the foundation of our tradition, we are continuously working to create the 'School of the Future, Today'. Together, we are united by the goal of further developing the Bavarian International School as a role model for innovative education and academic excellence, for tolerance and cosmopolitanism, and for the flourishing of responsible global citizens," agreed current BIS Board members Dr. Chrissie Sorenson (Head of School) and Marco Dahl (Business Director).

Top 15 in **Europe**

The Bavarian International School (BIS) has come a long way since its founding, 30 years ago. The transformation from then to now can best be described using the school's motto: Believe. Inspire. Succeed. Today, BIS is one of the top 15 international schools in Europe.



The academic excellence of BIS is demonstrated by the grade point average of the Class of 2021: 37 points is equivalent to the Abitur grade of 1.8 in the state school system.



Collaboration, innovative learning and the meaningful integration of technology are three of many characteristics of Bavarian International School

BIS today is a private, all-day school, serving nearly 1,150 students (in 1991 we started with 5) from age three through Grade 12, across two campuses (Munich and Haimhausen). BIS is a truly international school with students from over 60 different nations. The philosophy of BIS has never changed: to offer a personalised, holistic education that values intercultural competence, innovative learning and of course, academic excellence.

"We provide our students with the intellectual, social, emotional and critical perspectives they need as adults in a global, technology-based world. Our pedagogical focus is on the individual development and potential of each child - from early childhood through to young adult," said Head of School Dr. Chrissie Sorenson

BIS is home to 170 world-class teachers. from 29 nations. It is the quality of our teachers and their commitment that most significantly impacts the success of our students. In 2021, BIS students achieved an International Baccalaureate Diploma

Programme (DP) average score of 37, well above the global average score of 33. This value corresponds to a German state-system Abitur grade of 1.8. Over a third of BIS students scored more than 40 points (1.3 in the German school system). A ranking by the English platform "Education Advisors" listed BIS as one of the top 3 international schools in Germany and one of the top 15 international schools in Europe.

Inspiring global citizens

BIS stands for state-of-the-art education. Design and Educational Technology have been an integral part of the curriculum for many years. BIS students learn and collaborate with interactive whiteboards and Apple TVs, iPads, MacBooks, laboratories for science and technology, and studios for creativity, visual and performing arts. Thanks to our leading approach in technology and conceptual thinking, we offer an exemplary Distance and Hybrid Learning programme, adapting seamlessly to the COVID-19 pandemic. This brought regional recognition

at BIS.

BIS is known for its caring and engaged community. Our Pastoral Care Programme and Student Support Services help to ensure all aspects of a student's well being are being supported. Language Support and Learning Support services also ensure each student is met at their current level and supported in ways that best serve him/ her/they. Our Parent Community Council (formerly known as Parent Teacher Organization) is a driving force of inclusion and engagement for our school community.

to BIS during the pandemic and BIS was cited many times as a digital learning leader. While English is the school's official language, German, French, Spanish and Mandarin as well as 17 other languages are taught in the home language programme

Outside of the classroom, more than 400 students take part in around 80 different After School Activities each week. The BIS Lions athletics programme has developed over the years to produce top-performing teams who enjoy competition.

Since 2016, the BIS City Campus at Leopoldstraße 208 has been the new home for more than 200 children in the Early Childhood Centre and Primary School.

Since 2016, the BIS City Campus in Munich-Schwabing has been an integral part of the Bavarian International School community of learners. More than 200 children from over 30 different nations call City Campus home. The central-Munich location hosts an Early Childhood Centre with integrated Preschool for children as young as three years old, as well as a Primary School offering grades 1-5. Here, too, the slogan "Believe. Inspire. Succeed" is lived and breathed every day,

and is now also clearly visible as big letters in the window fronts facing Leopoldstraße.

The BIS curriculum follows the International Baccalaureate (IB) Primary Years Programme (PYP) and focuses on developing the whole child as an inquirer. The highly qualified pedagogical team of BIS City Campus promotes academic excellence, intercultural competence, collaborative learning and social responsibility while meeting the individual physical, social, emotional, learning and language needs of each child. The modern, spacious campus with an outdoor area, integrated sports hall and a stage for performances, is an inviting environment for every child's development.

Small class sizes for great education

22 is the **maximum class size** in the Early Childhood Centre ("Kindergarten 2.0") and 24 in the Primary and Secondary School up to Grade 10. In Grades 11 and 12 there is a maximum of 18 students.

A new kind of student

Most Grade 11 students don't run After School Activities (ASAs). Teachers usually do that. But Giulia doesn't exactly fit the mold of your typical student.

Giulia Pomponi wasn't always so open about her passion for art. It used to be a dream she kept to herself. The 19-yearold holds an Italian passport and started attending BIS in September of 2020, after being at an Italian public school.

Nowadays, she sees herself as an artist and works hard to help others see the same in themselves. Once a week she leads an ASA, working with other BIS students to learn about illustration and self-expression through art.

She was initially undecided about whether to pursue the IB Diploma Programme (DP) or the Careers-related Programme (CP) at BIS. Not surprisingly, she chose the path less traveled.

"I love the project-based element of the CP," Giulia said. "That's the best way for me to learn, through the process of organizing my own learning."

About 10% of each BIS graduating class completes the Careers-related Programme. The majority of students decide to pursue the Diploma Programme.

"It's really important for schools to offer different paths to students because we're all different, we learn in different ways," said Giulia. "Don't be afraid to do what is best for you."

Diversity and inclusion at work and at school

As part of her CP experience, Giulia is doing a multi-week internship with FC Bayern, working on product design. "At my internship, I'm enjoying a very accepting environment. We can dress how we want and are comfortable with everyone, regardless of position or title. That acceptance is important because it helps me be more productive, creative, open, and not scared to show the team my ideas."

This same type of environment is what Giulia has experienced at BIS.

"I felt included and accepted straight away. That was really positive for me." Giulia knows from personal experience, not all schools are like BIS.

"I've been to a lot of different schools. Some were not diverse at all. It's really sad to see how closed minded and unaccepting people can be of other people."

"Education in a diverse environment is essential. We all are coming to school to learn, not just subject matter, but about ourselves and about other people," said Giulia.

What makes us different makes us special

Giulia tries to take the same inclusive approach with her own 'students' in her comic book and illustration ASA.

Her message to them comes from her own experience: Practice sharing your art, who you are and what you make, and try to be fearless in doing it.

"Felt like a start-up"

Sara Read (born Sara Talbot) has a special relationship with Bavarian International School. The Canadian was one of 17 students in the first graduating class in 1997.

Her whole family was closely connected to BIS - both parents worked as teachers and her older brother was also involved in the administration, the school garden and as coordinator of the school plays. Even back then, the now 42-year-old alumni felt that BIS was a "home away from home".

When Sara's family moved to Freising in 1995, BIS was still in its early days, housed in a former office building in Schwaig and had just under 350 students. "The school still felt like a start-up, in the sense that much of the programming and initiatives were still under development, and all of the teachers and administration were working collaboratively to figure things out. It was an exciting time," Sara remembers. She calls teachers and staff members of that time, 'founders and pioneers.' The small classes and the sense of community made everything feel like a tight-knit, family-like environment. For example, one Grade 1 teacher was simply called "Aunty Pam" by everyone.

The new chapter in Germany and the attendance at BIS truly shaped the rest of her life, she said. Open-mindedness, diversity, academic and social education, a wide range of opportunities and a broad perspective for the future helped her in life and career. Moreover, Germany became a second home for her. She worked in Germany for a while, her older daughter was born in Berlin and so it is no wonder that both daughters (aged 8 and 11) now attend a bilingual German School in Edmonton, Alberta (Canada).

Sara has spent a large part of her professional life working in Human Resources. Currently, she works at a university in Edmonton where she leads a team that develops programs and strategies in organizational development, recruitment and onboarding, compensation, and organizational design.

Unique and enriching experience

She is still in touch with many of the classmates from the class of 1997 and other students, although they are scattered all over the world, e.g. Canada, Thailand, South Africa, Germany, UK, and Japan. Thanks to social media they are still connected and are thinking about a special alumni anniversary meeting. "The next one would be 2022 - the 25-year reunion. Maybe we can do it!"

For the next 30 years, Sara wishes BIS a "unique and enriching experience". She is sure that the school's core values and spirit will never change.





Kimberly House is one example of around 170 teachers at Bavarian International School for whom being a teacher is much more than a job; It is a passion that comes from the heart and is filled with soul.

Born in Portland, Oregon, she has been inspiring BIS's youngest students, from kindergarten to Grade 5, for over 25 years. The mother of two started out as a classroom teacher and for the past years has been one of the school's Education Technology Specialists. If you ask her for the three most powerful words she associates with BIS, the answer is community, forward-thinking and caring.

Dear Ms. House, looking at you, it is hard to believe, but you have been working for BIS for 25 years. What is your secret or is working with BIS students a fountain of youth?

"I have always loved working with children. They are so enthusiastic and excited about learning. I love creating learning experiences that will engage and inspire them. BIS also has a wonderful community spirit and over the years I've made so many lifelong friends."

What do you remember most about BIS 25 years ago?

"BIS had an amazing can-do spirit. We were a very small school but had such a hard-working staff who also knew how to have fun."

How did you contribute to making the school what it is today?

"Being on the ground from the beginnings of our technology programme has allowed me to remain a constant supporter and advocate as we made decisions about which directions to take. I continue to stay abreast of new developments in education technology and work to bring in new things that will hopefully benefit our students in their futures. I have also worked with staff over many years to improve their skills and help them to integrate technology into their classrooms."



How important was the introduction of Educational Technology in 2002 and how much has its importance increased since then?

"Back in 2002 it was a major step. We were one of a few schools who were looking at 1:1 laptop programmes and how best to implement them. Access to technology is critical in terms of ensuring our students are prepared for the world. It's not just about using a laptop, but being able to communicate their learning through different mediums whether that's a video, podcast, infographics, websites. In addition, ensuring students understand the importance of balance, digital footprint and how to keep themselves safe is also of critical importance."

What do you say to critics who think only older children should be allowed to use computers?

"I would say, come see our Grade I students documenting their learning through a video or creating an animated story! We really create a balance here and it's not about only using tech for tech's sake. We use it when it makes sense and when it amplifies the learning experience for the student or allows the teacher to have a key insight into a child's understanding of a concept or idea."

What do you wish for the future of BIS?

"I hope that BIS continues to grow and respond to the changing needs of our students. Now more than ever, education is really changing – its purpose, its focus and its impact. I hope that BIS continues to be open to the changes and challenges of education today and in the future."

The best place to learn

The Bavarian International School is already a leading international school in Germany and Europe. However, recent times have shown that change is inevitable and we must always be ready for new challenges. BIS has defined three strategic priorities for the future, including investing in the best teachers and the best environments to benefit students.

> The future of BIS is bright and it is centered around three strategic priorities:

1. The highest quality of education 2. A strong financial strategy 3. Positioning BIS as the school of choice for academic excellence

"Creating and constantly developing the best learning environments for our students and teachers is the basis of our strategic priorities," said Marco Dahl, Business Director and Executive Board of Bavarian International School.

"BIS is a leader in high-quality education and is committed to offering the highest quality student experience across the continuum of learning, now and always. As a community of lifelong learners, we invest in our team members," said Dr. Chrissie Sorenson, Head of School and Executive Board of Bavarian International School.

Until now, BIS, a non-profit organisation, was funded largely through school fees and state subsidies. To improve the financial

stability of BIS, a third pillar of income has been created, fundraising and sponsoring.

"We find ourselves in new times, with new challenges, in need of new solutions," said Mr. Dahl. "The financial structure the school had over the past three decades no longer fits today, and certainly does not fit the future. That's why we are making some changes, including accelerating our dedicated fundraising efforts and working to realise state subsidies in the medium to long-term."

The new efforts aim to generate additional income to expand the BIS Financial Aide Programme as well as scholarship opportunities, and to invest in campus planning and sustainable energy improvements. The Innovation and Future Campaign, which kicks-off on September 4, 2021, focuses on the planned Creativity & Innovation Centre (CIC).

Our third strategic priority is positioning BIS as the school of choice for academic excellence. BIS is already known as a caring, nurturing school. And, as a non-selective school, BIS performs very well on outside assessments and is successful in helping the majority of students reach their potential. Now, we want to further strengthen our reputation in terms of targeted support for the full range of students.

"That means, we will continue to support students who struggle, as well as stretching students who may be able to go beyond their grade level, whether that be in one subject or in many," said Dr. Chrissie Sorenson.

Big goal: Our Creativity & Innovation Centre (CIC)

The new heart of the Haimhausen Campus, the Creativity and Innovation Centre (CIC), will be a model of modern learning facilities. The building will be located where the old sports hall currently stands, connecting the primary school buildings and the new sports hall. Under the motto "STEAM" (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts & Maths), the CIC will offer around 8,300 square metres of cutting-edge, open \rightarrow

and interdisciplinary learning space for around 750 students, teachers and guests.

Three floors will host 18 classrooms for art and design tech, 10 flexible learning and maker spaces, 10 science labs and creative studios and, last but not least, a new auditorium to host our student performers and special events. The CIC will meet requirements of the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) and support contemporary learning concepts such as interdisciplinary collaboration and technology and design.

"The CIC is a critical foundation for BIS on our journey to provide state-of-the-art facilities for the best education. The building will also replace temporary classroom solutions such as container spaces, address other space problems, enable related campus renovations and allow for growth in our Secondary School," said Mr. Dahl.

Working together for our future

This investment in the future of BIS requires support from the BIS community as well as companies in the greater Munich area, who value BIS in attracting highly talented expats and their families to Munich. The total cost of the CIC will be around 25 million euros. In order to realise the financing, around 1.5-2 million euros must be raised through fundraising by the end of 2022. Construction is scheduled to begin in 2023, with the CIC opening three years later, in 2026. ●

Friends of BIS aim to financially support the school in reaching its fundraising and development objectives. In addition to supporting the campaign for the planned Creativity & Innovation Centre (CIC), the tasks of the association also include establishing scholarships and expanding the school's financial assistance programme. We are delighted to have Ilse Aigner, President of the Bavarian State Parliament, as the patron of our association.

In 2021, the first ever scholarship in BIS history was secured with DEUTSCHE FINANCE GROUP. In addition, the association saw increased support from the BIS community for various smaller fundraising projects such as air filtration units and other covid measures. In September 2021, the main focus of the association will be the campaign for the CIC and through this engagement we are looking forward to building long-lasting relationships with companies in the greater area of Munich.



Pop art for a good cause

In honor of our anniversary, renowned Munich artist ELIOT theSuper will create four original artworks and 100 limited-edition fine art gallery prints of the Schloss Haimhausen in pop art style. The proceeds of selling these artworks will directly benefit the BIS Innovation and Future Campaign.

"I think auctioning off my art is a creative way to raise funds for the future of the school. I'm happy to be part of building a new place to learn and practice for the young minds of today and of the future," said ELIOT. Pop culture phenomena like junk food are frequent themes of ELIOT's work. He combines the roughness of his graffiti and street art past with stencil, acrylics and screen printing. At the anniversary event, he will guide street-art workshops for kids and grown ups alike, and give a beatbox performance on stage.


