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School Uniform Reminder

- •The uniform consists of grey trousers, shorts or skirts, white polo shirts, and school jumper, green and white summer dresses, white, black or grey socks and black shoes or unmarked all black trainer with black soles.




Balance Time PE Home Learning

Can you keep trying to improve your performance?

Time to Learn:

- How many different body parts can you balance on?
- Can you balance on your back and tummy?
 What do you do with you arms and legs?
- Can you balance on your hands and feet?
 Can you lift one hand or leg off the floor?
- Choose your favourite three balances.
- Can you add them together to make a sequence. Perform your sequence to someone else. What do they think?

Try balancing on your back, rolling over and then balancing on your tummy. As you create your sequence, make sure you have at least one high and one low balance.



Top Tips

Be Still!

 All balances must be held completely still for at least four seconds. Make your balances excellent by pointing your fingers and toes.

England's First Art GeoTour

Using geocaching, the GPS enabled digital treasure hunt technology, communities from the 7 locations that are part of England's Creative Coast were invited to share their personal stories of their town and local area. These have come together to make England's first Art Geotour, stretching from Harwich to Eastbourne.

Our trail stretches from Hastings Country Park in the east to Combe Valley in the west. Each geocache has been uniquely crafted to tell a story about the site, or the people who have made it.



Download the free geocaching app at www.geocaching.com, create an account and search for the Geotour GT4A5.

Using GPS technology,

navigate to each site and use the hints to find the geocaches. A QR code at each cache links to additional information, images and soundtracks.

> Sign the logbook each time and log your cache in the app. Rewards for those who find all 6.

Culture Shift, our project partner, recruited the artists and groups. They

have worked with us since the gallery opened, starting the first schools programme in 2012 and supporting the development of our early years' activities.

The final cache has been made by Elise Liversedge and Julie Willard, two artist members of the Friends of Combe Valley. Combe Valley Countryside Park Is an area of 1480 acres of woodland, marsh and beach between Hastings and Bexhili. The cache reflects the activities of the group who have been planting meadow turf and sewing native wild flowers as part of a slow process of re-wilding the valley away from municipal grasses which had been seeded as a quick fix for covering landfill and creating sports pitches.

Artist Easthourne Studio Pottery Partner Bough Sleener Initiative

This cache has been created by Eastbourne Studio Pattery working with as rough sleepers who have been rehoused during the pandemic through the Rough Sleepers initiative. It is the start of a longer project supporting people to build confidence, develop skills and explore their own creativity. The group discussed what it leefs like to have a place you can call home and now something as simple as owning a set of keys becomes a powerful symbol of being housed, worn on a linuvertilike a tallismen.

This cache was made by artist Janey Moffatt with school children from Sacred Heart Roman Cetholic Primary School in Hastings Old Town and co-facilitator Anna Atkinson. The children named themselves 'The Sheaky Sketchers' as the project was all about hiding and finding artwork in the great outdoors. The idea for the cache came from the tiny paper logbook scrolls that are often found in small Geocaches. They used a variety of printing processes to create the work, including Cyanotype, heat transfer, rust printing and line out.
