Welcome and Greetings

Mrs. Hollstein thanked the Parent Advisory Committee representatives for attending and introduced dignitaries in attendance.

Superintendent Hill warmly welcomed guests, thanking them for their support and taking an active role in their school(s). "A school system is only as good as its community." (unknown)

Dr. Hill acknowledged the Benjamin Stoddert Middle School situation. She expressed her appreciation for the Center for Children and United Way of Charles County. Both agencies have partnered with Charles County Public Schools to provide *Darkness to Light* training for all school system employees. Training opportunities are available for parent organizations, which can be scheduled through principals.

Mrs. Hollstein recognized the new PAC representatives and explained the meeting format. Meetings are informal and include a group activity of which parents are engaged in a guided conversation and asked to provide feedback on a particular topic. Another component of the meeting includes a presentation on "something new" (e.g. ParentVUE).

Parental Involvement and Pathways to Academic Success – Career and College Readiness

Extra-curricular Eligibility Policy

Amy Hollstein, Deputy Superintendent; Linda Gill and Marvin Jones, Executive Directors of Schools

Ms. Hollstein introduced the group activity. Parents received a copy of Policy 6431 General Curricular: Extra-curricular Activities and Athletics Eligibility Requirements for Grades 6-12. PAC representatives and staff worked in groups to identify positive and negative outcomes for the following aspects:

- A belief that adding a discipline factor to the current policy will result in better behavior of students
- Students that are "not eligible" entering high school do not have a connection to school and do not become integrated as well into the culture
- It appears that some students who have good GPAs, but earn one "F" for a variety of reasons are unfairly penalized
- The attendance policy is at times an example of the haves vs. the have nots

If eligibility standards for middle school students were more stringent, would attendance improve and behavior infractions be less? One parent commented that not every student goes home to the academic support they need. Another parent voiced that middle school is a tool within itself. If students get the GPA they need to promote to high school, that is motivation to succeed. Nearly all parents in attendance agree that students should begin high school with a clean slate. How often are teachers required to enter grades? **Superintendent Rule 5132.5** - **Student Information System:** Each school will maintain an online grading system that parents/guardians can use to view their child's school records such as grades, assignments, and attendance. At a minimum, the online grading system will be updated by teachers once every two weeks during the school year. While the online grading system serves as a tool to communicate student records, the interim report continues to be the required notification when the student is in danger of failing for the guarter, the semester or the year.

Parent(s) commented that Charles County Public Schools needs a STEAM program. Don't limit to STEM.

Another parent asked that the following be addressed at next PAC meeting: How do we communicate back to school community? Via Facebook?

Additional feedback (in blue) on current Policy 6431 requirements:

6 th grade	 A student who is promoted from the fifth grade to the sixth grade automatically meets the GPA and attendance eligibility requirements for the first quarter. Apply to the start of high school.
	 Beginning second quarter, students must have earned a 2.25 2.0 GPA from the first quarter with no failing "F" grades.
	Must not have more than 4.5 days absent previous quarter.
7 th – 8 th grades	 Must meet local promotion standards Must have earned a 2.25 2.0 GPA from previous quarter with no failing "F" grades. Must not have more than 4.5 days absent previous quarter.
9 th — 12 th grades	 Must meet local promotion standards Must have earned a 2.25 2.0 GPA from previous quarter with no failing "F" grades. Must not have more than 4.5 days absent previous quarter.

Lower GPA to 2.0 to be more inclusive for students who might struggle academically. Inform sports/athletics that 2.25 is needed for college draft. "F" rule should only apply to core courses.




Questions your group would like considered:

- Grading scales in high school are different. Other external factors that cause low GPA and poor attendance
- When students began ineligible, how many became eligible the next quarter? Which requirement seems to be impacting the ineligibility status the most?
- 4.5 for attendance is tough. If we go home for a funeral (lowa), we will be out 5 days period
- What is the % of kids not eligible? How much is teachers and principals involved in the decision
- Can parents be provided with what training the teachers receive so parents will know what to expect with the growth of our children

Summary of your groups point of view:


- Not enough data to understand the issue
- Start high school with a clean slate. If the student does not maintain attendance standards or grades, student will not be allowed to proceed
- Why not be consistent with one program to use across all schools? Hold an assembly at the beginning and middle of school years
- Change the 8th going to 9th to mirror the 5th going to 6th for the 1st quarter. Fair is fair. We need a review process to weed through the circumstances that don't show up on paper. Why the fight happened, what is home life like? Teachers could advocate along with parents and present a case for kiddos
- The F component should be removed. If a child has 6 classes and has 5-As and 1-F, he/she still meets the required 2.25. By making them ineligible for earning an F grade, it contradicts the 2.25 policy
- Also, 4.5 attendance days should be removed. There are a number of reasons a child could miss those days. If he/she meets the GPA requirement, this should not be a factor ... (keep in mind, every child does not have access to a doctor in order to obtain doctor notes)
- This still needs some fine tuning! Discipline needs to be considered
- There needs to be no change of policy, but there is no way to appeal the cases that fall thru the cracks. If your teachers and principals (assets of CCPS) feel there should be a review committee to review those exceptions
- We believe that high school students should begin on an even playing field and be evaluated by the second quarter for his continued eligibility. We believe that consistency across the board from the parent to the teacher and the Board members are steady and consistent of what's expected of the children with their behavior








Synergy Attendance




Home Screen



The information on the home tab includes:

- All the screens have links to the Contact, Privacy, and Help screens 2.




