Debbie Elgas	Please do not do this. My son had to be tested just this week and the nurse tells us they don't recommend testing unless a person has symptoms. What a horrible thing to do to children and forcing it on a regular basis! Plus, the inconvenience for parents! This is horrifying that you are considering this. Covid is not an emergency any longer. It is endemic and we need to live with it.
Joana Diver	If you are going to test, ALL students should be tested and treated equally (with equity). There should be NO allowance for exemption for vaccinated students. 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Ina	<p>This is not consistent with your current masking rules, which work towards non-discriminatory practices (having everyone wear a mask regardless of vaccination status). If you are trying to avoid discrimination and bullying, then do not force kids to get tested regularly only when not vaccinated, while allowing those who do get vaccinated to be off the hook for regular testing. Plus, people who are vaccinated can spread it just as easy, so test everyone regularly if you must go that route. As far as potentially making "independent study" a consequence for not testing regularly, how could this ever be okay?! That's further enforcing bullying and could easily cause extreme emotional trauma for that poor child, as well as for the entire family that would be affected.</p> <p>Furthermore, rapid tests are not accurate for screening and can produce false positives and negatives. The accurate PCR testing is expensive and takes days to result. Children shouldn't be put under medical procedures without their parents present especially small ones. In general, I hope you choose to continue to make testing optional and do not mandate it. This is all too much weight to be putting on our little kiddos who are an insignificant risk (of getting covid, getting ill from it, and spreading it). Brittany	As a parent I don't believe students should have mandatory Covid tests. I do believe they should receive daily temperature checks and I do believe staff should be required to have mandatory Covid

CDC reports show that although children are able to transmit the virus, most school breakouts occur from infected staff. Additionally, vaccination status is somewhat irrelevant to spreading since those vaccinated can still carry and transmit the virus. Fortunately the vaccine protects the vaccinated individual, but offers little protection to those around. Lastly, studies show that children are most likely to develop a fever, so a daily temperature check should be adequate in detecting Covid or any other transmissible virus. Weekly Covid tests both miss cases that occur within each test window (daily is better) and exclude flu and other viruses. If a face mask and temperature check is sufficient for entry to my Dr's office, it should be sufficient and most beneficial for the classroom.</p>
Molly Zurflueh	<p>This is NOT in our students' best interests. I have a young daughter and subjecting her to testing, a medical procedure, in order to be permitted to attend school is unconscionable. I vehemently oppose this proposed mandate and I will fight it with every fiber of my being. We moved here from Oakland this summer where they require testing. Our kids don't deserve any more needless school interruption after 18 months of disrupted learning. I'm all for teachers being vaccinated, but please don't put any more burden on our kids, who've already paid dearly with remote school for 18+ months.</p> <p>Additionally, recurring testing of all students would be incredibly expensive - I'm guessing in the hundreds of thousands. Any available district resources should be directed to help kids catch up on lost learning. I have a child who desperately needs more resources to "catch up" after 18 months of virtual school. I've yet to hear about any new resources available for this purpose. If it's so easy to come up with this substantial amount for testing, then why hasn't this money already been allocated for supplemental classes, more counselors, etc?</p> <p>Lastly, if testing is implemented, then parents should have the ability to opt their kids out.</p>

It would be a big undertaking which would take a lot of time each week, and could be uncomfortable for young children leading to a negative association with going to school. Also, if we do test, the tests should be rapid because 2-3 day results won't be effective in identifying cases before they spread. Thank you.</p>
<p>Jennifer Stockert</p>	<p>I am concerned about the extra time the testing and reporting will take as well as the kids being uncomfortable due to the manner of testing. It can be very uncomfortable for kids and could cause anxiety in some. I am comfortable with the covid protocols instituted by the district and feel like the extra step is unnecessary.</p>
	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Covid test are very evasive and uncomfortable for children at best. 2. The amount of time to give students weekly tests will be taking away from time they should be learning. And I'm sure that time will be considerable. 3. The cost of these tests will be taking away from school budget which should be spent on the children's academia. 4. There are no vaccines approved for children under the age of 12. The vaccines for 12 and up have only received emergency application status. 5. Temperature checks worked fine last year there were no outbreaks. 6. There are studies out that show you start being contagious from .7 days to 2.3 days after being infected. So weekly Covid testing is not a great preventative measure.
<p>Matthew Elblonk</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Support for regular random testing of the entire school regardless of vaccine status to ensure that any cases are caught early and before they are allowed to spread. 2. Required testing every 2-3 days for people eligible for vaccine that have not gotten the vaccine to ensure they do not spread the virus to the children that are not yet eligible for vaccination.

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	<p>3. Report any time there is a positive case for either (I) someone in your child’s classroom, (II) staff or students your child interacts with (including outside and K buddies), (III) someone that was outside with your child (particularly since there is no mask requirement for outside activities that often involve sports- a known virus spreading activity). This helps arm parents with the knowledge to know that an exposure, even if slight, occurred and allows the parent to make the right choice for their family given their family’s underlying health issues to get their child tested at the earliest possible moment to prevent spread to more vulnerable family members. In NY random testing was done at all schools of staff and students and was very successful at finding cases early and preventing super spreader events. In NY you also received reports anytime children or staff were positive and a quick sentence on the potential risk exposure to others. These were very helpful and again, helped provide the information that families need so that they can make the right choices to protect high-risk family members.</p>

<p>Matthew Elblonk</p>	<p>Can we please get a public report showing the percentage of teachers and staff who are vaccinated and the percentage of those who are unvaccinated? No names, just numbers. There is nothing in HIPPA nor in the Americans With Disabilities Act that would preclude such a document from being created and it would be another tool for parents in assessing their child’s risk factor, especially for those who are at high risk or who have high-risk family members at home.</p>
