



2021 OVERRIDE FACTS

A maintenance and operations budget increase, or override, allows Liberty Elementary School District voters to approve additional funding above what the state provides.

Maintenance and operations funds pay for the District's day-to-day expenses such as employee salaries and benefits, utilities, and supplies.

A 10% budget override has been in place since 1983. The requested budget increase would allow the district to exceed its budget by 10% (\$2.4 million), with a secondary tax rate approximately equal to the current rate.

HOW MUCH WILL THE OVERRIDE COST HOMEOWNERS?

The proposed continuation of the override is estimated to be \$10.43 per month OR \$126.00 per year for the average home value of \$176,790.

* Based on an estimated tax rate of \$0.71 per \$100 assessed valuation (home assessed value divided by \$1,000 X \$0.71).

IF THE 10% OVERRIDE IS APPROVED, HOW WOULD IT BE USED?

An approved override would allow the district to maintain support for teacher and support staff salaries to ensure the district can continue to hire the best people.

Art, music, and physical education classes are funded entirely by Override funds. These classes promote critical thinking, creativity, and health.
