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#### Introducing Wonderbus: Lakota's First Mobile Learning Space

With the rollout of its first mobile learning space, Lakota Local Schools will be giving parents and community members a dose of the Lakota learning experience. The Wonderbus - a former school bus transformed into a "Wonder Lab" or "STEAM Lab" on wheels - will officially roll out at Lakota's Pi Day celebration on March 6.

"This idea has been in the making for quite some time now and we are thrilled to be so close to sharing it with our community," said Lakota Superintendent **Matthew Miller**. "The Lakota learning experience is one marked by exploration, creativity and critical thinking. The Wonderbus will give our parents and the larger community a taste of our commitment to student-led learning."

Besides its external transformation, the inside of the bus has been outfitted with a host of educational tools and resources that promote design thinking, a model used in each of Lakota's early childhood school Wonder Labs and elementary-level STEAM Labs.



#### Meeting Recaps Visioning for Lakota's Future

On Feb. 26 members of the community gathered at Lakota West Freshman to hear the district's most recent update on the Master Facilities planning (MFP) process.

Attendees heard from Superintendent **Matthew Miller**, Chief Operations Officer **Chris Passarge** and Educational Visioning Planner Tracy Richter. "We've spent the past month meeting with the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) to update our building conditions and holding focus groups to hear from our community about what they think education should look like in Lakota," said Passarge.

In December, Lakota's Board of Education approved a resolution to enter into <u>Ohio's Expedited Local Partnership Program</u> (<u>ELPP</u>) through the OFCC. Lakota is eligible to begin receiving partial funding from the state for all projects that are completed in the final Master Facilities Plan from this point forward.

As part of the agreement with the OFCC, Lakota is required to work with a visioning consultant to explore what education should look like in the coming years. And community input plays a critical role. "We appreciate the feedback we heard during our meetings with the focus

groups," said Passarge. Led by Richter, students, staff, parents and community members met in small groups and also came together for a large meeting during the process. Richter also met with district leaders and board members.

#### Lakota Superintendent Testifies about EdChoice Program

#### Heritage First Graders Finding New Ways to Go Green

It all started with some classroom bean bag chairs that had gone flat.

Most people would refill them with styrofoam beans, but not in Stephanie Allan and Rhiannon Wilson's first-grade class.

Allan and Wilson team teach at Heritage ECS. They share a passion for lowering waste in their lives outside of school and decided to collect plastic bags over the summer to refill the 'poof' chairs. When students saw the teachers stuffing the chairs, they wanted to help.

"Naturally we started talking about why you just don't throw the bags away and other things you can do with them," said Wilson. "And the students started bringing in their own plastic bags and now the chairs are nice and full."

That led to more discussions about plastics.



Woodland's Annual Business Day Takes on a New Twist

What does it take to get a business off the ground? It starts with an idea.

Fifth graders at Woodland Elementary School have been learning about running a business for some time now, but this year the annual event known as Business Day took a different turn. Using one of the district's **personalized learning "plays,"** the teaching team turned Business Day into **project based learning (PBL)**. "The purpose of (Business Day) was for kids to share their creativity and learn more about economics (through Social Studies and Math) without even knowing they were learning," said **Angela Haney**, one of the teachers who began the project 14 years ago.

The foundation for Business Day starts at the beginning of the school year. Students apply for a classroom job where they earn a paycheck with fifth-grade money - complete with their teachers' faces on the bills - that can be used later in the year at Business Day and the annual end-of-year auction. The students choose from jobs such as turning the lights off and on, pencil keepers and filling the mailboxes, receiving a paycheck twice a month.

#### **Hopewell Junior Students Return to Recess in Different Roles**

The playground is as much a learning space as any classroom - and Hopewell Junior School students are now the ones behind some of those lessons. With the start of a new partnership with their neighbors at Hopewell Early Childhood School, the seventh- and eighth-graders are experiencing recess from a whole different perspective.

"You can see how they learn teamwork skills and how to work in a group at recess," said Hopewell eighth-grader **Angela Bell**. A few of her classmates and fellow volunteers - **Zoe Surette**, **Samyra Feng**, **Mallory Shroder** and **Olivia Wilson** - added other lifelong skills they're seeing play out on the playground, like problem-solving, acceptance and respect.

Twice a week, the junior school students are giving up their "T-Hawk Time" to go out to recess. But this time around, their role looks quite different than it did one or two years ago. They are helping facilitate games, manage conflict and most importantly, help coach their younger counterparts on how to problem-solve when conflict at recess does occur.

#### Notes from the Nursing Staff about COVID-19

We understand that there is concern about illness in our schools especially with influenza, strep throat and COVID-19 (formerly known as Coronavirus). Please be assured that we work closely with the Butler County Health Department to stay up to date with concerns and illness trends in our area. As a district, please know the following:

- We are closely monitoring the CDC updates and recommendations.
- All nurses currently monitor illnesses, as they always have, to identify flu and other illness trends. If greater than normal illnesses are happening, our nurses work with the health department and will notify parents and staff as needed to monitor their children. Additionally, our nurses are in close contact with the custodial staff so that should there be an increase in any type of illness extra steps are added to the daily cleaning procedures to lessen the spread of germs.
- There are currently no cases of COVID-19 in Ohio, and our US risk of infection remains "low" per the CDC, so anything now is in the preparation phase and not currently an active disease outbreak.
- As always, we continue to encourage hand hygiene, cough/sneeze etiquette and staying home when ill.

#### **Amazing Race Celebrates International Mother Language Day**

Last week, Lakota high school students took their passports and went on a journey around the world – all in just about an hour.

To celebrate International Mother Language Day (February 21), over 2500 students took part in an Amazing Race-style competition to learn more about the languages offered at Lakota.

The Amazing Race had students singing in French, signing their name in American Sign Language (ASL), finding out just how many words are derived from Latin numbers and animals, and learning about the human towers of Catalonia.

The idea came out of a random five o-clock conversation between East and West language teachers. "With French and Spanish classes being taught right across the hall from my room, it's made me interested in different languages," said West ASL teacher **Katie Nicol**. So she brought up the idea of collaborating with other teachers to help spark that interest in students as well. "Until I started planning this event, I didn't know that there were already many students actually taking two languages at the same time."

Each Amazing Race team consisted of at least one student from each of the languages taught at Lakota: ASL, French, Latin and Spanish.
