## New ECS Innovation Hubs Filled with Fun Learning Tools

Virtual reality, robots, green screens, and books? Yes! They are all part of Lakota's newly unveiled Innovation Hubs at its early childhood schools (ECS).

"The K-2 Innovation Hubs provide not only a space for our youngest learners to foster their love of reading through access to books, but now also serve as an extension of our classrooms by providing a space for students to explore, create, and collaborate through a variety of digital tools and hands-on activities!" said Director of Digital Learning **Krista Heidenreich**.

The wait is over for Lakota's youngest learners as they've gotten to explore their redesigned media centers over the past few weeks. What started as a pilot program at Heritage Early Childhood School in the fall has now expanded to the district's five other buildings. **Lizzie Porter** is very excited about all of the building options. "It's really fun and I like to build," she said. The Wyandot kindergartner is also happy that she is able to borrow new library books each week, noting that author Mo Willems' "Elephant and Piggie" series is her favorite.

The new learning spaces include technology tools, tinkering and maker space materials. Students are able to "problem solve, design, build and collaborate with magnets, marbles, wood planks and many other manipulatives," explained Heidnereich.



"Think of all the possible barriers kids might have to learning," said **Lori Brown**, Lakota's director of student services. "Think of a million reasons and that's the million things our counselors combat day in and day out."

National School Counseling Week, always celebrated the first full week in February, is a time to reflect on the unique contribution Lakota's counselors make to our school communities. From hot button issues like mental health and college and career readiness to lesser known responsibilities covering parent education and staff wellness, Lakota's counselors are at the center of a lot of critical pieces in a student's K-12 experience.

#### **Social & Emotional Learning**

"Mental health and social skills have a huge interplay," said Wyandot ECS counselor **Jennifer Gillum**, "and both are undeniably critical to the long-term success of every student."

With the recent rollout of <u>Ohio's new social and emotional learning standards</u>, Lakota remains committed to equipping every staff member with the training to support students in this way. Even so, Lakota's counselors carry the largest load when it comes to social and emotional learning. and facilitate the school-wide programming that supports self-awareness, mindfulness, conflict resolution, communication and other preventative skills that Lakota students are learning.

# Update on EdChoice Voucher Program

#### Lakota Superintendent to Testify Next Week

The debate over the expansion of public schools on the **EdChoice voucher list** continues in Columbus. At this point, the Ohio House and Senate have not come to an agreement on a joint solution as to the prospect of 70-percent of the state's districts having an eligible school on the list.

The enrollment period, which was to open on Feb. 1, has been delayed until April 1, following a vote by the state legislators. On Feb. 5, the House introduced its plan to amend the voucher program in <u>Senate Bill (SB) 89</u>, which passed the House by a vote of 88-7. The bill will phase out district-paid EdChoice vouchers, increase the eligibility for income-based vouchers from 200-percent to 250-percent of the poverty level and, if the student is both income and building-eligible, require the state to fund the voucher beginning in the 2021-22 school year.


The Senate does not agree with these changes and has sent the bill to Conference Committee. The committee is now holding hearings to gather more information about the EdChoice voucher program.

Lakota's superintendent, **Matthew Miller**, will testify next week. "Senate Bill 89 is a good starting point to fix the EdChoice debacle," he said. "Schools that receive passing grades by the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) should not be also considered failing schools." Ironically, Endeavor Elementary, which is one of eight Lakota schools the state says is failing, received the **Momentum Award** from ODE shortly after the EdChoice list was published. "How can a school be failing on one hand, but then receive accolades for exceeding expectations in student growth on the other?" questioned Miller.

Miller believes the problem with the voucher system stems from a deeply flawed state report card. "The state grading system puts a higher priority on standardized test scores than ensuring that our kids are prepared for life after graduation," he explained. "The state says that they want our students to have real world learning opportunities, yet they do not include that as an indicator on the report card." # **Master Facilities Plan: Thought Exchange #1 Results**

Immediately following the first Master Facilities community meeting on Jan. 28, Lakota Local Schools launched a ThoughtExchange online survey to gather feedback about the data shared.

Superintendent Matthew Miller and Chief Operations Officer Chris Passarge shared enrollment projections for the next 10 years and the age and condition of Lakota's 23 school buildings to a packed house at Hopewell Junior School. For those unable to attend, the meeting was <u>shared via YouTube and social</u> <u>media in its entirety</u>. <u>An abbreviated video</u>, which included the same data, was linked to the survey for participants to review.

Community members were asked, "After hearing information we have gathered about enrollment projections and the condition of our facilities, what are your key takeaways and what concerns do you have?" And they answered.

More than 600 people participated in the exchange, which was open from Jan. 28 - Feb. 11. <u>ThoughtExchange</u> is a unique platform the district is utilizing to gather feedback from parents, staff, students and community members on a wide-range of topics, including the Master Facilities Plan. "We value our community's input when making decisions that will affect the entire district," said Miller. "ThoughtExchange is an additional vehicle we are using to gather feedback because we want to be able to give our parents, students, staff and community members many options to share their thoughts."

## **Union Sixth-Graders Spearhead Greenhouse Renovation**

Union Elementary School had a dilemma. What to do with their greenhouse, which had been built as part of an Eagle Scout project, when it was badly damaged during a storm. Sixth-grade teacher **Madison Geiger** found out that when you pair that with a lesson about the environment, magic can happen.

Geiger began the enrichment unit on the environment with her students growing a green bean or sunflower from seed. Many were successful, but a few plants suffered from over or under watering. When reflecting on the project, Geiger asked, "with that knowledge under your belt, what do we do now?"

Students took the reins, researching what types of plants grow best in this climate, as well as beginning to design ideas for the greenhouse and surrounding space. **Taryn Delaney** suggested growing different types of herbs for the school's culinary center, as well as rehabbing the existing gazebo to be used as outdoor seating for lunch periods. Other plans included making bird feeders to hang around the school, pulling up dead plants in the greenhouse and planting flowers to beautify the landscaping.



#### Extreme Makeover Classroom Edition Takes Over Adena

To the tune of "Move that bus!" from ABC's former hit home makeover series, Adena Elementary School Principal **John**Mattingly exclaimed to two lucky fourth grade classes on Monday, "Do you want to see your new classroom?"

With that, a stampede of students broke through their two classroom doorways, each concealed by a paper curtain, to find their learning space outfitted with more than \$22,000 worth of new furniture and equipment. A longtime partner of Lakota Schools, School Outfitters gifted the collaborative desks, chairs, mobile tables, whiteboards and storage carts to the district, their team delivering and installing the 125 pieces in just four hours.

"My first reaction was 'Wow'!" said fourth-grader **Kaylee Penny**, who first noticed that almost every piece in the room now has wheels.

Such mobile work surfaces, paired with other tools like trapezoid-shaped desks and whiteboard top tables for example, facilitate more collaborative learning environments and grouped instruction. Moreso, students can easily choose to work independently or in groups, sitting on a stool or standing up, on paper or on a whiteboard - all supporting Lakota's move toward a more **personalized learning experience** marked by student choice. # Liberty, Hopewell Join Forces, Make Friendly Wager to 'Help Other People'

A class project that reaches the point of real community impact is called project-based learning. But when that project lives on the next year without any connection to the original class - *and* in partnership with another school - some might call it pure selflessness.

At last year's "State of the Schools" address, Liberty Junior eighth-grader **Emily Fuller** shared with the Lakota community how Project HOP, short for "Helping Other People," came to life. A simple challenge posed by her Media Design & Communication teacher, **Moriah Walker**, inspired Fuller to actually put her idea for a clothing drive into action. It was her response to the question, "What would make the world a better place?"

A year later, with the support of classmates and friends **Bryn Williams**, **Maddie Henderson** and **Alexa Schatzky**, Fuller repeated the drive benefiting Reach Out Lakota at a whole different scale. She passed the challenge along to Hopewell Junior, to which the school's Student Council, under the leadership of teacher **Anne Caudill**, responded with enthusiasm. They even introduced a wager that the principal at the "losing" school would have to sport the opposing school's spirit wear.

"I'm very grateful to Hopewell and everyone who has supported me, especially Mrs. Walker for not giving up on this crazy idea I had last year," Fuller said. "It was an incredible opportunity to be able to dream it up, but I never imagined actually being able to pull it off."

# **East Seniors Bring Back Student Safety Committee**

School safety is the number one priority at Lakota, and some students at Lakota East are stepping up to do their part to make sure their school is as safe as possible.

Each year students and staff receive ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) active shooter response training, showing them how to respond to different scenarios in the event of an intruder in the building.

"The trainers pointed out the trauma kits found on the walls of the school, saying that if you are able to use the equipment and need to, you can help," said senior **Zach Timmons**. "But then the trainers said most people have no idea how to effectively use the kits. We wanted to change that."

So Zach and fellow senior **Leo Rolfert** set out to bring back the Lakota East Student Safety Committee that had been created back in Feb. 2018 after the Marjory Stoneman Douglas (MSD) shooting. Originally, the committee was established to help support the students that had been affected at MSD by hosting fundraisers, sending a banner of support to MSD and holding a ceremony at East to honor the 17 victims.



Architect Mike Parkinson visited West math classes this week to help with their roller coaster project. He discussed the design process, and the importance of problem-solving and accepting failure as part of that process.

# **West Roller Coaster Project Makes Learning Fun**

What's more fun than riding a roller coaster? How about designing your own coaster?

Students in **Caroline Smith**'s math class took on that challenge, applying concepts like slope, average and angles to an amusement park.

"I have always despised math – and now, of all things, I am a math teacher," said Smith, an intervention specialist at Lakota West. "I learned the hard way that math is tied to 'real life' and I am trying to help my students see that math does play a role in their day-to-day lives. It is really cool to see them excited about math."

West junior Brittany Davis is enjoying the project. "I don't really like math, but this is making it easier. It's a different way to learn math."

Three integrated math classes for student with disabilities are working on the roller coaster projects. The project is an example of personalized learning where teachers try new ways to reach students and encourage them to take ownership of their learning.
